George Herbert Gray's Vision of **Oxmoor**

Soon after George Herbert Gray completed his advance study at the École des Beaux Arts in Paris in 1905, he moved to Louisville. He was retained by William Marshall Bullitt to rehabilitate Oxmoor, his family's long-vacant homestead he acquired in 1906. A collection of Gray's plans and drawings recently acquired by The Filson show how Bullitt and Gray envisioned enlarging the old (1791) frame house and its brick addition (1829) into a permanent residence. Gray's plans were expanded on an even larger scale by New York architect F. Burrall Hoffman, Jr., into the existing Oxmoor house. This illustrated talk will also describe the three phases of Oxmoor's construction.

Steamboats troduced a powerful new technology to the region, changed river travel, and turned small landings into bustling towns. But steamboat disasters—boiler explo-sions, collisions, and

fires—were not uncommon. This program examines the collision of the America and the United States and what the disaster tells us about life and death along the Ohio River during the steamboat era.

The Wabash River is 503 miles long and flows southwest from northwest Ohio across northern Indiana to southern Illinois, where it forms the Illinois-Indiana border before draining into the Ohio River. Starting in Historic Vincennes,

Indiana, our tour will focus largely on Governor William Henry Harrison and his expeditionary force's route northward to The Prophet's Town, and what became the Tippecanoe Battlefield in 1811, and all in close proximity to the Wabash River. A prehistory of that fateful campaign will also be explored throughout, which will date from the 1730's, when Vincennes was little more than a French trading post, and will continue to the creation of the Indiana Territory, when the rumblings of a confrontation with the Confederation of the great Tecumseh became imminent.

The field trip is \$350 for Filson Members (\$400 for non-members). Attendees are responsible for making their own accomodations.

In addition, Dr. Sabato accurately predicted 98% of Senate, House, and Governor winners in, 2006, 2008, and 2010. At home both in the classroom and the television studio, Dr. Sabato bridges the gap between the ivory tower and the real world of politics. A Rhodes Scholar, Dr. Sabato has taught more than 15,000 students in his career at Oxford University, Cambridge University, and the University of Virginia.
