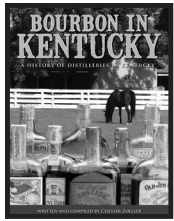

Kentucky Bourbon Barons Chet Zoller

When you think of Kentucky, bourbon is one of the things that comes to mind. In the past, there were close to 1,000 bourbon brands from small and medium distilleries, many of which are no longer in existence.

In Kentucky Bourbon Barons, author and bourbon aficionado Chet Zoller will discuss the unknown distillery brands found in his popular book, *Bourbon in Kentucky*. Covering the peak bourbon period from 1836 to prohibition, Zoller has compiled what is thought to be the first and only authoritative catalog of bourbon distilleries in Kentucky.

Chester "Chet" Zoller is a native of Louisville. In 1998, he along with his son Trey established the McLain and Kyne Distillery Company, home of Jefferson's Reserve, Sam Houston, and Jefferson's bourbon.

The exhibit, which commemorates the sesquicentennial of the beginning of the Civil War, will focus on the war in Kentucky and the Ohio Valley region. The exhibit takes a thematic, rather than chronological, approach to the war, starting in the 1850s and focusing on the growing division between the North and South.

Blood Shed in This War: Civil War Illustrations by Captain Adolph Metzner, 32nd Indiana

Author Michael A. Peake pays tribute to the talents of Captain Adolph G. Metzner in his



latest book, *Blood Shed in this War: Civil War Illustrations by Captain Adolph Metzner*.

In this wonderful visual diary, Metzner used art to record his impressions of army life. Metzner, a German-born druggist, joined the 1st German, 32nd Regiment Indiana Volunteer Infantry in 1861. At first, his renditions were humorous, but after the loss of comrades at the Battle of Rowlett's Station, Kentucky in 1861, his art takes a darker turn and shows the turmoil and struggle faced by the remaining soldiers.

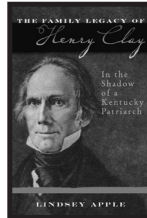
Michael A. Peake is a Louisville native with roots dating back to the early 1780s. In addition to *Blood Shed in This War*, he has published several articles and released two books on the 32nd Indiana.

As Americans urge Congress to put aside party ties to solve the country's growing problems, we are reminded of Henry Clay, the prominent politician nicknamed "The Great Compromiser."

Lindsey Apple's *The Family Legacy of Henry Clay: In the Shadow of a Kentucky Patriarch* reveals the story of this highly influential family, whose importance has been largely overshadowed by the fame of its most celebrated member. Apple brings to light this neglected story, highlighting the generations of Clay descendants as they enjoyed success and worked to overcome obstacles, leaving behind a legacy of their own.

Lindsey Apple is a retired professor and chair of history at Georgetown College. He is the editor of *Scott County: A History* and author of *Cautions Rebel: A Biography of Susan Clay Sawtzky*.

The Hannibal of the West: George Rogers Clark and the American Revolution in the West

George Rogers Clark's efforts to defend Kentucky against the British and their Indian allies resulted in one of the greatest military campaigns in American history. In the

early years of the American Revolution, pioneers were barely hanging on under repeated Indian-

British attacks. The possible fate of the American cause hung in the balance.

A natural leader and bold soldier, George Rogers Clark devised a plan to take the fight to the enemy. The result was Clark's epic 1778-1779 Illinois Campaign. Clarks' success helped secure the United States' claim to the vast area north of the Ohio River that eventually became five states, including Indiana. In this illustrated lecture, Filson Curator of Special Collections Jim Holmberg will discuss Clark's life and his famous Illinois Campaign.

Holmberg is a long-time member of The Filson's staff. He received his BA and MA in history from the University of Louisville.

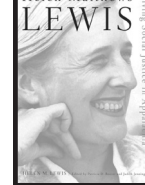

Helen Matthews Lewis: Living Social Justice is a collection of Lewis' writing and memories. Documenting her life and work, editor Judith Jennings, along with Patricia Beaver, highlight Lewis' extensive achievements, bringing us the story of one woman's quest for activism and social justice.

Judith Jennings is the executive director of the Kentucky Foundation for Women. She is the author of *Gender, Religion, and Radicalism in the Long Eighteenth Century: The "Ingenious Quaker" and Her Connections*.
