

### **The Shipwreck That Saved Jamestown: The Sea Venture Castaways and the Fate of America**

In *The Shipwreck That Saved Jamestown: The Sea Venture Castaways and the Fate of America*, author Lorri Glover, will discuss the fate of the *Sea Venture*, the ship sent from London to rescue the settlers at Jamestown in 1609. This historical narrative describes the shipwreck off the coast of Bermuda and the resulting mutiny when the 150 castaways, who had been seduced by all that the island had to offer, were ordered to continue to Virginia. After building their own boats, the castaways sailed to Jamestown and faced the challenges of rebuilding America's first permanent colony.

Lorri Glover is a Professor of History at Saint Louis University. She is the author or editor of several books and is currently researching a book detailing the familial experiences of leaders in the American Revolution.

### **Creating a Confederate Kentucky: The Lost Cause and Civil War Memory in a Border State**

Rather than focusing on post-Civil War politics and economics, *Creating a Confederate Kentucky: The Lost Cause and Civil War Memory in a Border State* author Anne Marshall centers on the activities of Kentuckians and traces the Confederate identity in Kentucky from 1865 to 1925.

This book studies the political dialogue that encompassed both sides of the conflict: the white Unionists and African-Americans who drew on the defeat of the Confederacy, and the Confederate sympathizers. While Kentucky as a whole forgot their Union loyalties, this book looks into the active political and cultural dialogue that shaped this period. Come and hear from author Anne Marshall about this pivotal period in post-Civil War Kentucky.

Anne Marshall is an associate professor of history at Mississippi State University. In addition to *Creating a Confederate Kentucky*, she has published many books, articles and book reviews and given numerous presentations on her research.

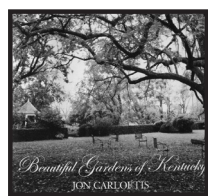

### **Two Centuries of Black Louisville: A Photographic History**

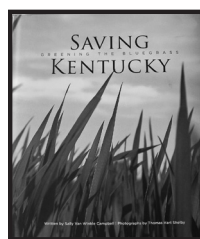

### **A Voice in the Box: My Life in Radio**

For over thirty years, Bob Edwards has delivered the news with his trademark sincerity, intelligence, and wit. From his years on National Public Radio (NPR) to his more recent tenure on Sirius XM Radio, Edwards' mix of long-form interviews and news documentaries have resonated with the American people, winning him several prestigious journalism awards.

In *A Voice in the Box: My Life in Radio*, Edwards tells the story of his career in radio broadcasting. He started out pounding the pavement during college, knocking on station doors. From there, he served in the U.S. Army, working for American Forces Korea Network. After his military service ended, he worked for radio stations in the Washington D.C. area before moving to NPR in 1974. In 2004, he became the first radio personality with a national audience to move to satellite radio. His book offers a unique view of the evolution of American news and public broadcast journalism.

Bob Edwards is the host of "The Bob Edwards Show" on Sirius XM Radio and "Bob Edwards Weekend" which is distributed nationally to public radio stations by Public Radio International (PRI). He was born in Louisville, where he got his start in radio before serving as a U.S. Army broadcaster. Prior to joining Sirius XM, Edwards hosted National Public Radio's "Morning Edition." He is a graduate of the University of Louisville and received a master's degree from American University in Washington. *Reservations are suggested.*

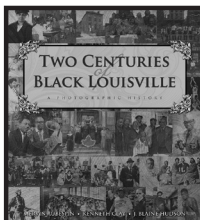
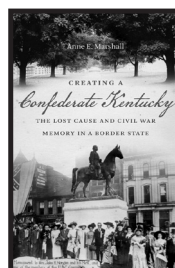
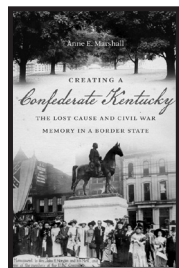
