Dear Miss Tinkaid:

Will you give me a little information please relative to DUNN family?

EDMUND DUNN (DUN, DUNNE etc) and his son LEWIS DUNN came to Warren County, Ky. from VA. They are both listed here on tax books in 1806 for first time. Both died here, Edmund 1819, Lewis 1848. Edmund married Sally — Lewis married Rebecca —. Where were they from in Va.? Whom did each marry?

In Census of 1790 Va. I find a Lewis Dunn in Sussex Co. and an Edmund Dunn in Essex Co. Have you any records of these counties? If so, do you find any information relative to Dunns? Is there anything in Albemarle Co.?

Edmund Dunn had children: Lewis, William, Polly Brown, Patsy White, Nancy Italy, according to his will, and named a grandson, John Dunn. Lewis Dunn had issue: Spencer, b. 1804; Martha (Patsy); Jane; Elizabeth and others, but do not know names ^{trace} — perhaps Marcellus, William, Edmund, Abner. The ones I know married here in Warren Co.

Do you find marriage of Edmund or Lewis Dunn? May be connected with Spencer family as Lewis' ~~son~~ child named Spencer. I wonder if Lewis Dunn in Sussex is brother or father of Edmund; and if connected with Lewis family?

Lewis Dunn may have married Rebecca Elam (Elms) ^{or Edens?}, for a grandchild has Elam in his name, and there were William, James and Jesse Elam here in 1799, but don't know what became of them. Have you anything on Elam family? Lewis probably married in Va. I find no record here.

Do you find a Spencer Dunn in Va.? I want to find Edmund Dunn's parentage also and Rev. War service of his father. Edmund may have had service also, as I don't know when he was born, or where for that matter. A history states that ~~Ed~~ Lewis Dunn came from

Va. to Warren Co., Ky. in the early ^{settlement} ~~formation~~ of the county (Warren).
This county was formed as you know from Logan 1796. So 1806 would be
during the early formation of the county.

Edmund Dunn, Lewis Dunn, Spencer Dunn are not such common names.
It seems one could find them if had access to genealogical records.
I notice there are Elams in Bedford and Chesterfield Co. Va. One of these
in Warren Co. Ky. may be father of Rebecca. James and Wm Elam were
in Rev. War and had grants of land in Ky. I think. Gillson gives:
Wm Elam - military grant on Big Barren River. Wm Elam had land
here on Gasper River, which flows into Big Barren. Then too I
wonder if Elams were in Georgia. A Jesse Elam was born in Georgia
and married in Warren Co., Ky. 1802. He may be brother of Rebecca.
After Rev. War could Elams have gone to Ga. from Va., then to Ky.
I wonder. And where from Ky. I wish I knew, i.e. Warren Co.

Wish could find marriages of Lewis and Edmund Dunn or
some record to show whom each married; and Edmund's parents and
Rebecca's parents.

There were some Elams in Logan Co., Ky. a little later, i.e. early
1800's. Do you find any connection there? Also some in Butler Co., Ky.

A John Dunn left will 1792 in Allemarke Co., Va. Have you
this, and does it name his children?

If you have the census of 1840 and 1850 of Ky. will you please
give me the data of: Spencer Dunn, Jonathan Tinsley Carpenter,
James Monroe Tucker, all Warren Co. If have census 1850
Ky. please give me Spencer Dunn & James Monroe Tucker, Warren Co.
all above are near Smiths Grove and Oakland, Ky.

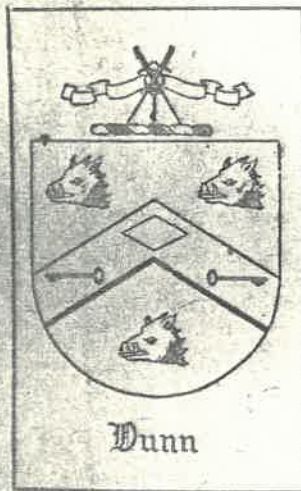


DUNN FAMILY

In 1629 Sir Daniel Dunn and William Dunn were members of the Virginia Company. The same year Thomas Dunn came to America, settling in James City County. Peter Dunn was living there at the same time. A little later we find that heads of families in Virginia were Clement, John and Henry Dunn.

In Essex County, Dunasville was founded by the family. In Surrey and Spotsylvania Counties, the Dunns also made settlements.

Thomas Dunn is one of the first ancestors. He and his wife Elizabeth, whose maiden name is thought to be Gray, were the parents of nine boys. Unfortu-

nately, while there is a record that most of them joined the rank of Benedicta, the names of their brides have not been handed down. All that we know is that Lucy and Mary and Rebecca were Christian names. There were two Lucys and two Marys.

Holtman gives a long list of soldiers of the Continental army, all officers and about all the thirteen states had representatives.

Captain Samuel Dunn, was from Massachusetts; Lieutenant William, from New York; Lieutenant Michael and Major John Dunn, from New Jersey; Lieutenants Abner and Abner Martin Dunn, from Pennsylvania; also Isaac Budd Dunn, and Abner Martin Dunn served from 1776 to the close of the war.

Isaac Budd Dunn was aide-de-camp to general St. Clair with the rank of Major. Captain Peter Dunn's record is given in the Virginia Historical Magazine. Charles

Dunn was in the French and Indian wars on Washington's staff.



It would seem, that those fortunate enough to have Dunn ancestry are eligible to about all patriotic and historic organizations.

In 1682, Pascho Dunn was Justice of the Peace in York County, Charles Dunn was Judge of the Supreme Court, Kentucky, in the early days, and John Dunn, in 1754, was Judge of the General Court,

Virginia. About this time another John Dunn was clerk of Rowan County, N. C., and a Justice of the Peace.

North Carolina, Tennessee and Alabama are old homes of the Dunn family, but each branch traces back to Virginia colonists.

David Dunn, one of the nine sons of Thomas Dunn and Elizabeth, married Frances — in 1745. They are the ancestors of a branch of the Tennessee family. Others

who place David and Frances Dunn on their genealogical chart are the Elliotts, Fosters, Bradfords, and Billups. Dr. Dudley Dunn, of Tennessee, and of the third generation from David and Frances, died in 1848. His wife, Miss Early, of Georgia, was cousin to Governor Peter Early.

The armorial of the allied family of Green is blazoned: azure, three stags trippant, or.

Crest: A stag's head or; motto: *virtus semper viridis—virtue is ever green, or blooming.*

Another favorite motto of the family is *crepe diem—“enjoy the present,”* or *“seize the opportunity.”*

Colonel John Green, born in 1730, in Culpepper County, Va., was the son of Robert and Eleanor (Dunn) Green. Both the Colonel and his son

Robert were in the Continental army, and a connection exists with Captain Ceeley Saunders, also a soldier of '76.

The Goodwins are allied with the Dunn family and their heraldic insignia shows six lions' heads on a gold shield, with a griffin for crest.

The coat of arms of the Grays, another lineage, is comparatively simple with its bars azure, a bend gules and three wreaths.

The Grays are an important family connection. The Virginia property of the family in 1616 was in Surrey County. They also owned plantations in many other places later, and Francis Gray was a Justice and also a burgess in 1656.

The blazon of the Dunn coat of arms is: azure, on a chevron or, between three boars' heads argent, a lozenge gules, between two keys sable.

Crest: Two swords in saltire proper, entwined with a ribbon azure, and a key pendant, sable.

In "Kentucky, a History of the State" by Ferrin, Battle and Kniffin, edition, 1886, page 1106, I find a sketch of Vincent Dunn, saying he was born June 4, 1811, in Spencer County, Indiana; of a family of five children born to Vincent and Mary (Rodgers) Dunn. His father died about a month before his birth. Vincent's maternal grandfather was a native of Virginia, whence he immigrated to Kentucky in the very early times; he made his first settlement at the present site of the City of Louisville, removing a few years later to what is now called near Bardonia where he reared a large family. After the death of his wife he removed to Carter County, Ky. It was there he again married. He was a member of the Baptist Church and frequently acted as pastor. He was a farmer and was about seven years of age when his family came to Kentucky. She died in April 1847.

Dear Mrs. Norton:

Replying to your letter of the 8th, I fear there is a mistake about our having the Dunn Family record from the Old Bible at New Providence Church in Mercer County, for I have not been able to find it.

I do find in some records we have, among them a letter from W.L. Van Noy, P.O. Box 123, Leitchfield, Ky., Feb. 17, 1933, the statement that his grandfather's mother was married to Vincent Dunn in Mercer County (Error for Nelson evidently). After their marriage they flatboat to what was then Yellow Banks of the Ohio and settled in Spencer County, Indiana, this being opposite what is now Owensboro, Ky. (Owensboro is what was known as Yellow Banks.) Vincent Dunn apparently patented quite a large amount of land and settled on it, two years later he died leaving his widow Mary Dunn with five children, two girls and three boys. Mr. Van Noy's ancestor was the youngest Vincent Dunn. The widow two years after her husband's death leased her land and moved to Grayson County, Kentucky, and made her home with Vincent where she died.

We have the copy of the Marriage records of Nelson County and I find in these that James Casey and Polly Lynch, widow of Charles Lynch married Sept. 15, 1792, and his bondsman was William Casey his brother. Matthew Rogers either made the return or was a witness, our copy is not clear on that point. A, so in the marriage records of Nelson County, as published in the Register of the Kentucky State Hist. Soc., vol. 20, page 269 I find where one Charles Lynch and Polly Rogers were married April 23, 1790 by Wm. Taylor. Vincent Dunn and Mary Casey (widow) married Oct. 21, 1795 by James Rogers. You see your ancestor was evidently very charming

In Nelson County in the will book you will find the appraisal of the estate of James Casey, August 10, 1795, recorded Aug. 11th, and the appraisers were James Hakkley, James Brown and William Ables (Book 1, page 291) the administrators were William and Matthew Rogers, account filed Dec. 12, 1797, Book 1 page 337. That may and may not give information, but you could have that copied through the County Clerk of Nelson County at Bardonia, Ky., for the usual fee.

Kentucky kept vital statistics from about 1851 to 1861, and these records are in the Kentucky State Historical Society, at Frankfort, Ky. If you write there they can possibly give you the death record of Mary Rogers Lynch Casey Dunn and in that record there should be the name of her parents and where she was born.

Dear Miss Kinkead:

From some reference, I read you had a copy of the Dunn Family Record from an old Bible at New Providence Church in Mercer County, Kentucky.

This interests me greatly.

I am descended from Col. James Rogers who with brothers built Rogers Fort in Nelson County, Kentucky, but who died in Mercer County, Ky., will dated 1/29/1828 and proved April Court 1828. He was married twice, his first wife and mother of all children, was Martha Blackburn; he married 2nd at the age of 78 to Mrs. Nancy Flourney.

Col. James Rogers had a daughter Mary who married 1st a man by the name of Casey and had a dau. Martha Casey born Sept. 1793; then, as Mary Casey, she married 2nd in Nelson Co. Ky. Vincent Dunn on Oct. 21, 1795. By Mr. Dunn, Mary-Rogers-Casey-Dunn had the following children; Moses, Dunn, born 8/26/1796; Prudence born 3/4/1798; James Rogers Dunn 2/23/1802; Sarah, Elizabeth, Vincent Dunn Jr., b. 6/4/1811, and a dau. Nancy birth date not known, but older than Vincent who was the last child.

Mary (Rogers) Casey-Dunn was born 4/15/1769 and died 4/10/1857 and is buried at Leitchfield, Grayson Co. Ky. Her daughter, Martha Casey, was married to James Downing and were the parents of my grandfather, born Dec. 11, 1812 in Kentucky, and named William Casey Downing. For this reason I think that Mary Rogers married 1st a "William" Casey, and at his death married Vincent Dunn.

I wondered if this old Bible record had anything of the above family and if it showed any Casey connection, since I do not know the name - first name - of the Mr. Casey who married Mary Rogers.

I shall appreciate hearing from you very much indeed and am enclosing a self-addressed/envelope for your convenience in replying.

A graduate of Lindsey Wilson Junior College in Columbia, Ky., she taught school in Casey Co. until her divorce in 1950, at which time she relocated with her children in Cincinnati, Ohio where she has been employed by the General Electric Company for 26 years. Anna Frankie Dunham. Born 9/29/1920, Casey Co., Ky. Married 10/28/1944 to Kern P. Keller, Jr., Casey Co. She is a graduate of Lindsey Wilson Junior College and a former teacher. They own and operate a pallet manufacturing business in Russell Springs, Kentucky. Their daughter Anna Helen Schook lives in Louisville with her husband Bill and children Billy and Sarah. Their son Robin lives in Cincinnati with his wife Vivian and children Angie and Christopher.

4. Frank Perry Dunham. Born 5/20/1892, Casey Co., Ky. Married to Bertha Richards 6/21/1916, Pulaski Co., Ky. Bertha, a teacher, lived with her parents John Benjamin Richards and Sarah Josephine Luttrell on a farm near that of Frank's family. A graduate of one of the earliest trade schools for automobile mechanics, Frank also worked as a teamster and a railroad brakeman before going to work as a buffer for the old Autolite Company in Cincinnati, where he was employed for some 15 years before retiring to his home in Dunnville, Kentucky. He died there 5/22/1962 and is buried in the cemetery of the Antioch Christian Church near Dunnville in Casey County. His widow, who was born 6/5/1890, still lives in their home at Dunnville and remains active and independent at the age of almost 87 years.

Frances Delilah Dunham. Born 3/31/1896, Casey Co., Ky. Married 1/31/1921 to Elmer L. Thomas. Their daughter Winifred (now Mrs. Ezra Watson) was less than two years old when Frances died of tuberculosis 8/1/1923. Frances is buried at Antioch Christian Church near Dunnville.

Leonidas Moore Dunham. Born 7/14/1908, Casey Co., Ky. Married 6/20/1928 to Gladys G. Ewing, Casey Co. He worked as vocational rehabilitation counselor and personnel officer in several institutions for the mentally ill and mentally retarded. His health was impaired during much of his life by the tuberculosis he contracted as a young man. He died 1/23/1967 and is buried at Antioch. He had no children.

5. Oscar Dunham. Born 7/9/1865, Adair Co., Ky. Married 11/16/1890 to Dolly C. Chelf, Casey Co. Left an orphan at the age of five, Oscar was raised by his maternal grandparents on "the brick house farm" near Dunnville. He inherited a small fortune from his grandparents in 1888, but chose to go into medicine instead of continuing the business enterprises begun by his grandfather. An 1897 graduate of the Louisville College of Medicine, Dr. Dunham was a general practitioner in Casey and Russell Counties until his death 5/4/1935 at his home in Dunnville. During nearly four decades as a physician, he earned a reputation which survives in his community to this day; but his practice was not a lucrative one. Most of his patients could give him little but their gratitude. By the time he died, very little remained of the wealth he had inherited as a youth. Dr. Dunham is remembered, too, as a

colorful personality. A solidly built man with bushy reddish hair and mustache, one eye bright and twinkling and the other dimmed by a childhood accident, Dr. Dunham was known for his intelligence, his keen wit and his seemingly endless collection of "street music"--doggerel and ditties and ballads culled from his own community in the foothills of the Cumberlands and gleaned from his travels to the Western United States.

Dolly Chelf, known in her community as a strong-willed and sometimes tempestuous person, was also a teacher by profession before her marriage to Dr. Dunham. She was descended from early Dutch stock and was a cousin of former Kentucky Congressman Frank L. Chelf. She and her husband are buried at Antioch. She died March 25, 1956 at Dunnville.

Besides the three children listed above, Dr. Dunham left another daughter, Orpha, by his first wife, S. Elizabeth Neal, to whom he was married briefly at the age of 21. Orpha spent her entire life in Danville, Ky. and died there in the early '60s. She was never married.

6. Christopher Columbus Dunn. Born 9/11/1831, Casey Co., Ky. Married Anna Caroline Jones 8/7/1860 in Johnson Co., Mo. They had two sons, William James and George Addie, before the marriage ended in divorce. Crit (as he was always called) remarried in 1879 and he and his second wife, Mary, had five children: Mary Frances, Christopher C., Mary, David and Emma. Crit died in Arkansas in 1909 and is buried in the Taylor Cemetery near Bass, Arkansas.

Perry Hale Dunn. Born 10/8/1839, Casey Co., Ky. A frail child, Perry was nevertheless an avid sportsman and loved the outdoors. He received his medical training in Louisville during the Civil War and practiced medicine in Casey County. He never married, and lived with his parents at "the brick house farm" until his death 3/1/1887. He is buried with his parents in the Dunn cemetery on the farm near Dunnville.

7. Sarah Frances Dunn. Born 8/20/1842, Casey Co., Ky. Married 11/9/1863 to James Harrison Dunham, probably in Marion Co., Ky. although this cannot be verified because the courthouse at Lebanon was burned during the Civil War. Sarah was a graduate of a woman's college in Bradfordsville, Ky. and when her husband died in 1866 she helped support her infant son Oscar by teaching what was then called an "English school."

Several families in a neighborhood would hire her to teach their children for a period of several months, with each family paying a part of her salary in proportion to the number of children enrolled from that family. Sarah survived her husband by only four years. Probably both died of tuberculosis. Her death occurred 3/22/1870, his 1/30/1866. They are buried in the graveyard of the Tabernacle Christian Church near Neatsville in Adair Co., Ky.

7. James Richard Dunn. Born 1/24/1805 in Wayne Co., Ky. Married 2/3/1830 to Frances Reynierson Robinson, Casey Co., Ky. Frances was the young widowed daughter (born in Casey Co. 2/8/1807) of Captain Christopher Columbus Reynierson, a native of New Jersey who had come into Mercer Co., Ky. in the early 1790s and then into Casey Co. around 1800 when it was still a part of Lincoln Co. Her first husband, George Robinson, had died, leaving her with a small daughter, Jane. Years later, Jane was to become the wife of T.W. Wash, who served as County Court Clerk of Casey Co. from 1862 to 1886.

James (who always signed his name J.R. and was known as "Pap" or "Pappy Dick" to his children and grandchildren) was a handsome man, judging from the tintype photographs taken of him when he was middle-aged. He was apparently an enterprising and industrious person, and his material wealth accumulated rapidly. By the middle of the century he had several hundred acres of land, worked by slaves who stayed on as hired servants after the abolition of slavery. By 1880 J.R. Dunn had over a thousand acres of prime farmland, a home referred to in the community as "the brick house" because it was the only brick home in the county at the time it was built, a mercantile business, two hotels, and a town named in his honor: Dunnville. He held several minor public offices, including constable, justice of the peace and police judge. He died 6/16/1881 and is buried in the Dunn cemetery on "the brick house farm."

Cassandra Dunn. Born in 1808 or 1809, probably in Washington County, Ky. Married Robert D. Duggan of Sevier Co., Tenn. circa 1830. They raised nine children. A descendant, Mrs. Beulah Duggan Linn of Sevierville continues to research this line.

James R. Dunn's brothers probably included the following (conclusive proof not yet obtained):

Hale W. Dunn. Born circa 1799. Appears in Washington Co., Ky. tax list in 1820 and Mercer Co., Ky. census in 1830. Gave place of residence as Henry Co., Tenn. when he purchased a tract of land in Casey Co. in 1826.

Job Dunn. (2/7/1807-12/27/1896) Wife's name Catherine. In Washington Co. tax lists and census. Buried at Glens Creek Baptist Church in Washington Co., Ky.

Joel H. Dunn. Served as constable of Casey Co. during 1840s. Also lived in Scott County.

John H. Dunn. A minister, he was granted permission to perform marriage ceremonies by the county court of Casey County in 1830.

Marcey Dunn. Signed as witness to a deed for J. R. Dunn in Casey County in 1833.

8. James Dunn. Born 3/17/1768 in Virginia. Married Hannah Hale 2/20/1797, Washington Co., Ky. He first appears in the Mercer Co., Ky. tax lists in 1796, the year before his marriage. His wife Hannah was the daughter of John Hale, who had owned land in Mercer Co. since the late 1780s. Hannah's mother, Mary, was the daughter of Joseph Willis, Sr.* who also came to Mercer Co. from Virginia circa 1790. Hannah's father John died in Mercer Co. in 1798 (Will Book 2 p. 74). Available information suggests that he was probably descended from the Nicholas Hale who came to Virginia from England in 1652, but the line of descent has not yet been established.

James and Hannah raised eleven or twelve children on a 100 acre farm on Chaplains Fork (now called Chaplain River) in Washington Co. just over the Mercer Co. line. They sold this land, which had been inherited from Hannah's father, in 1821 and moved first into Tennessee and then, in 1827, into Casey County.

James, as if wishing to set apart a common name, developed a very distinctive signature, with the first and second initial merged and the "as." of an abbreviated "James" enclosed within the initial. This unusual signature, which scribes tended to copy as they found it into deed books, etc., has been an invaluable tool in tracing this ancestor through two centuries of public records.

James died 3/13/1843. Hannah, who was born circa 1776, died 2/24/1855. Place of death and place of burial not yet established for either. Since Casey Co. has no record of their deaths and no will for either, they may have died at the home of children living in Tennessee.

* See will of Joseph Willis probated Mercer Co. July 1809 (Will Bk. 4, p. 68).

Margaret Dunn, born circa 1770 in Virginia, was James Dunn's sister. She married Robert Duggan, son of Hugh Duggan and Margaret Wilson, in Greene Co., Tenn. 3/7/1792. They were the parents of at least eight children. Mrs. Beulah Duggan Linn of Sevierville, Tenn. continues to search for information on this line. Margaret's son, Robert D. Duggan, married Cassandra Dunn, daughter of James and Hannah Dunn. Mrs. Linn's older relatives recall stories of visits between Margaret's family in Tennessee and James' in Kentucky. A late 19th century kinsman of Mrs. Linn's testified in a letter that Margaret was a cultured "English lady" and that he had letters written by her. Family tradition among James' descendants, however, is that the Dunns were Irish.

Mackey Dunn who married Mary Ann Shields in Mercer County in 1808 and Jesse Dunn who married Lucy Bohon in Mercer County in 1800 were almost certainly brothers of James and Margaret, but proof is not conclusive at this time. Mackey died in Washington Co. in 1818 and Jesse died sometime after 1834, the date his name last appears in public record in Mercer Co., where he lived.

Note: Most birth, marriage and death dates up to and including the death of Dr. Oscar Dunham are taken from Dr. Dunham's Bible, now in the possession of Mrs. Bertha Dunham of Dunnville, Kentucky, who is the widow of Dr. Dunham's son Frank. This Bible was passed to Dr. Dunham from his maternal grandfather, James Richard Dunn, after whom the town of Dunnville is named. The birth date of James Dunn, father of J.R. Dunn, is taken from his obituary in the December, 1843 issue of The Bible Advocate, reprinted in the April/June 1975 issue of The Kentucky Genealogist (p.67). Marriage records for persons prior to 1935 not listed in Dr. Dunham's Bible are taken from the marriage bonds of the counties indicated. Birth and death dates for Job Dunn are from his tombstone at Glens Creek Baptist Church. Birth, marriage and death dates after 1935 are taken from my own unpublished family records.

I have found George Dunn listed in the "Commissioned officers list" in the Henry Co. Ky. Regiment that was formed Dec. 11, 1799. He was a Lieutenant in the 38th Regiment Aug 21, 1800. This is referred to as the "Corn Stalk Militia".

In the Henry Co. Marriages I see where a George Dunn married Peggy Sullinger Dec. 30, 1810.

I have checked the 1850 Carroll Co. census and do see a George Dunn 72, born in Pennsylvania, with wife Margaret 65 born in Virginia. (Peggy is a nickname for Margaret).

I have also found a Will recorded in Carroll Co. Ky. dated Aug. 30, 1849 by George Dunn, and reads: Property to be divided as if he died intestate. Sole object of the will was to emancipate slaves. Codicil to the will was giving land to his slaves. Executor: John Dunn and Wesley See. The probate date was not given.

WILLIAM N. DUNN, son of William H. Dunn, who was born in King and Queen County, Va., near Rapahammack River in 1801. He came from Virginia to Kentucky and settled in Montgomery County, and there married Miss Susan Ann Dunnekee, who was a native of Kentucky. He remained there for several years and opened a business in a small town called Ticktown. Here he opened a hotel and ran it for years. He was born of wealthy parents, his father, Newbolt Dunn being a large plantation owner in Virginia. William H. Dunn was well started in life and on three different occasions received slaves from his father's plantation, being brought here from Virginia. Owing to misfortunes in life he died a poor man. In 1828 he moved to Daviess County and remained here about five years when he bought a farm in Ohio County near the line of Hancock and Daviess Counties known as the John Shivley farm. He lived here about ten years and then sold his farm and moved to Hancock County, where he lived the remainder of his life. He died at his son-in-law's in Spencer County Ind. in March 1858. Mrs. Dunn died May 7, 1867, at her youngest son's, Francis M. Dunn, in Hancock County and was buried in the cemetery at Hawesville, Ky. They reared nine children, five sons and four daughters. They also lost one who died in infancy, William N. Dunn, the eighth child OF HIS FATHER'S family, born in Daviess County, June 6, 1837 in a place then called the Alex McDaniel farm between Pellville and Knottsville. He was raised in the county and lived with his father till he was nearly twenty years of age. He was married Nov. 11, 1856 to Eliza Jane Stinnett daughter of Joel Stinnett an old settler of Daviess County. After he was married he rented a farm about two miles north of Pellville, Daviess County and worked it for three years. He then moved six miles southwest of Pellville, on what is known as the Jack Stout farm where he remained three years. In the fall of 1862 he purchased his present place and moved April 4, 1863, where he now resides. In 1877, October, member of the Baptist Church.
