
Dear Sir your letter of the 8th
June is at hand from which I learn you
have not yet received your tax receipts -
I received your letter of which you speak of
respecting me to see Mr. Yost - which said
Yost informed me that there was money
enough he expected in his hands to pay the
taxes on all the lands spoken of - which
he promised to do - and did so - I forwarded
you your receipt for the tract you had requested
me to sell - which I must certainly forward
you in a letter. It must be lost or misplaced
on the way and further it seems strange that
you have not received no word from
Yost, the collector has told me Yost paid
all the taxes of which you speak in your
letter, I shall be in the neighborhood of
your lands in a few days - I am this year
the County assessor here to visit every man's
house in the County to get a list of taxable
property, I am told there is an individual
in the neighborhood of your tract of land
that will probably give \$125 for you of
a nation and is most likely able to pay a good
portion down - please let me hear
from you soon - whether I ring a bell on
closing a contract.

to Spencer \$10.00 for your directions, making
with amt Recd by me of the camp claims \$360.³⁹/₁₀₀.

of R Bibb Senr & R Bibb jr, and if you have recd
no thanks for your services, it is to me not strange.
In my short career in this life, I have found out
that those we do most for, are generally the least
thankful, and indeed if they do not become our
enemies we are fortunate. This would poorly com-
pensate us for our exertions in behalf of our friends,
and if it was not for the gratification our own
feelings experience, in rendering assistance to our
fellow-men; we might live for ourselves a lone.
That man must be miserable indeed who looks
to this world, for a reward for his kindness &
benevolence to his fellow-men. But there is world
in which, all correct actions & conduct will
receive their just reward.



Dear Master

I take this method of writing you a few lines to let you know that I am well and hope you are enjoying the same blessing. Give my compliments to Miss Sallie & Mrs Jack, and also to Lilly. I received your letter but never met with an opportunity to answer you before now. My Mother has been sick about nine weeks and died the 23rd of May. I have been sick myself about seven weeks but am so I can get about now, the Doctors supposed I had the Cholera. Your girl Sarah was sick in the same way, but has recovered she is yet with me. The Doctors bill for my Mother is four dollars, the shroud cost \$1.90 the Coffin was three dollars. I have not said any thing to Mr Norton concerning it yet. The shoes cost 2⁰⁰ there were two pair. Mr Norton paid me ten dollars last July and it is all that I have received from him.

but have stopped from the fact that some of
the rest claim equal parts with aggey or
her family and say I must pay to them
and so I doant know what to do or wish you
to inform me on the subject I have cut
some \$5 worth of timber more than the poark
came to which I ow some of them or am
ready to pay I give them the same price
for timber that I pay with in one or two
miles of the mill which is the highest price
I therefore hope you will not think that I am
taking an advantage of them Orsburn
says he has a wright to sell the timber from the

fact that you told him to do so or Clean
up the land if he saw proper he said
he has to stay there at home and Support
the family and the rest is off working for
them selves which is a fact and it does
look wright when the family Eats it up
and gets the benefit of the provisions
Now Sir I dont know wheather I have done
wright or wrong in Cutting the timber at all
or not or wheather they ought to have
all the pay or not I shal not proseed
any further til I here from you on the
Subject there is still some \$30 or 40
worth of timber along the Creek which
I will still take and would like to get
as I have to Clean out the Creek for which
I will pay them the Customary price for in
provisions or money as it about the same
if I have done wright or wrong pleas inform
me if wrong I will make it wright and beg
to be Excused wright me what to do in the
future with regard to the timber

The note was for One hundred and ninety Eight dollars and Eighty six cents credit by the forty Eight dollars and Eighty six cents which you directed to be credited on said note in your last letter leaving a balance of One hundred and fifty dollars which I have this day paid to Mrs Frazier your agent. The credit you allowed me on said note was entirely satisfactory as all other transactions between you and myself have been entirely satisfactory to me, now that our accounts are all settled and we are again even I will take this opportunity of saying that I have never done business for any man whom I found to be more liberal, honest and just than yourself and I never knew a man for whom I have a higher regard than you, I do not say this from a disposition to flatter ~~to~~ you but from an honest conviction that it was my duty to say thus much in taking a business leave of an old and trusted friend and one whom I not only love but have been taught to love and respect and to look up to as an honest and upright man worthy of ^{my} admiration and imitation give my respects to Mrs Bibb and believe me to be
