Simon Bolivar Buckner [?]. Undated. MD, 2 pp.

Two page handwritten document, probably on the Mexican War, possibly by SBB "The first day's march from Vera Cruz – by encouraging the men – assisting them by putting knapsacks on wagons, remaining in the war occasionally taking and old soldiers musket too heavy for him to carry, the 6th reg Co [brough?] up at the encampment that night every man but four who arrived fifteen minutes later. This regiment was one of the best marching

companies, in the army, having marched five or six hundred miles in northern Mexico with General Wood.

"The mounted dragoons having lost all their horses on the journey to Vera Cruz, were on this march obliged to march, their Colonel was some what of a martinet, Sumner by name, insisted on every man carrying his knapsack etc as they were plowing along through the hot sand an Irishman called out Pat don't you wish you were a mounted rifleman so that you could carry your knapsack and walk!"
