DIRECTIONS FOR FERTILIZING & BRINGING BACK TO LIFE

AMERICAN HOLLY

Three times a year take 4 tablespoonfuls of Sulfuron to each plant.

(Any other finely powdered sulphur will do)

Spread around Holly plant and rake or water in.

At the same three times, March 1st. April 15th & June 1st,

put a handful of Vigoro for trees & shrubs or its equivalent (approx. 10-8-6) in holes 10-15" deep, (if the tree is large) placed at outer edge of roots.

If the plants are small, fertilizer can be spread around base of plants, without making holes.

One application of cottonseed meal a year is good.

Miss Haldeman Teaches For Farmington

THE trees, flowers, and shrubs that are right for your home are the ones that look as though they

belong there. According to landscape architect Miss Anne Bruce Haldeman:

"The right plant for the right place . . . that's the thing that makes an attractive effect. If it looks as though nothing has been done, then you have got a successful thing.

"People are so apt to overplant."
The owner of a new house must restrain himself and realize that it takes time to achieve the proper landscaping, Miss Haldeman believes.

Some people, too, tend to use the tall plantings that were more appropriate for an earlier style architecture than they are for today's ground-hugging houses, she said.

Show Front Door

Also, in some modern houses there is a confusion about which door is the front door, and "the planting should tell you which is the front door."

Miss Haldeman currently is distilling her years of study and experience in the field into six how-to-do-it lessons for amateurs.

"You could spend a lifetime on each facet, but I'm trying to pick out the things most useful to the most people to make their own places more of a joy.

Miss Haldeman is conducting a course in landscape design for the benefit of Farmington, the historic Speed home just off Bardstown Road near Gardiner Lane. The first class Monday dealt with general questions -the next five, tomorrow and on the four succeeding Mondays, will be primarily on planting design.

The classes at Farmington begin at

10:30 a.m.

Miss Haldeman is a member of the board of Historic Homes Foundation, which operates Farmington and Locust Grove, the house in Jefferson County where George Rogers Clark spent his last years.

Started 'Accidentally'

A tall, graceful woman with silver-gray hair, Miss Haldeman said she begray nair, Miss Haideman said sile became a landscape architect "accidentally." When her parents, the Bruce Haldemans, were building a "country" house in Glenview, they had trouble getting expert help for their landscap-

"When I got through school (Kentucky Home and Bennett College, Millucky Home and Benne brook, N.Y.), I decided I would just like to know about this, never realizing it was going to be my life's work. I never could get interested in anything

She studied at the Cambridge School of Architecture and Landscape Architecture, now a part of Harvard, in Cambridge, Mass., and later worked with a prominent Boston landscape architect, Fletcher Steele. In 1934 Miss Haldeman moved back to Louisville, and for a number of years she worked

It was Miss Leland who designed Miss Haldeman's house of old brick, built in 1940, atop a hill in Glenview near her parents' large house.

(Miss Haldeman's grandfather was Walter N. Haldeman, who established the old Louisville Courier in 1844. It was under his ownership that it was merged with the Journal and Democrat to form The Courier-Journal. He also established The Louisville Times in

"We planted these tulip poplars . . I have watched the beech trees grow

up."
Miss Haldeman also has watched the elms go, which she considers a great tragedy. The beetles from the diseased

trees infect the live trees, "and it's just a matter of time . . . they'll all go. "It's too late. It's gone too far. It's like stopping a fire. No other tree takes the place of an elm."

Bardstown Road.

In any landscaping project, Miss Haldeman believes that "trees are so important." In addition to shade, trees "give you shadows, and the pattern of the shadows changes all day

Miss Haldeman's companions in her warm and charming home are a pair of Cairn terriers, Scamp and his sister, Monica, on whom Miss Haldeman lavishes time and affection.

Monica was named for a relative of hers, who was in turn named for a girl that Louisvillian Bodley Booker met in Wales during World War II. Booker was with Miss Haldeman's nephew,

Charles Price, in Europe at that time and he talked a lot to Price about Monica.

But Booker wasn't just talking. He went back to Europe and married Monica, "so the real Monica's here now," said Miss Haldeman.

When she travels abroad, as she has done a great deal, Miss Haldeman's main interest is in gardens. Her favorite ones are in England, which she considers "the garden spot of the world."

She has been to China and Japan (during the 1923 earthquake) and most of the countries of Europe, but she is "saving Scandinavia for my really old

"I don't know, though, I'm getting so I like home so much."
