My dear Miss Ingram:

Miss Whitson has asked me to write you in answer to a letter which you sent asking about what material we find most useful in doing camp music with our Junior Campers. We have a family of girls and boys between the eges of ten and eighteen with whom I have been doing singing during the past month.

I find that this age is particularly interested in having their own Hudson Guild Farm songs and out of several they have written (mostly adaptations of songs they have heard, or their own words set to popular tunes) we have gotten two good ones with original words and music which we hope will live through other seasons.

We do not use song books or sheets when the whole group meets to-gether. I believe that for the most part, songs learned by rote are more accurately and permanently memorized. Also I do not know any one book that fits all moods and occassions. I meet a group of girls daily for singing and we have been using with great satisfaction a new song book (called "SING TO-GETHER") published by the Girl Scouts. The price of that book at the National Girl Scouts 570 Lexington Avenue, N.Y.C. is twenty cents per copy and their is a reduction in the price when a dozen or more books are purchased.

"FOLK -SONGS of MANY PEOPLES" is almost a necessity for the worker in camp music. The tunes are authentic, the translations are good, and I find these books particularly useful in combining Dramatics and Music for proprams and parties in camp.

We abev used several songs ina collection of Schirmer's called "TEN FOLK SONGS". The ten songs can be bought for ten sents. The ones particularly enjoyed and most enthusiastically sung were "Morning Comes Early", "The Keeper", "Tiritomba".

For Southern Mountain songs and Cow-boy songs, I have used several books including Sandburg's "SONG BAG", and "THE COWBOY SINGS". "Down In The Valley", "Home on the Range", "Old Faithful" are all favorites.

"BOOK of AMERICAN NEGRO SPIRITUALS" by Johnson has afforded us considerable pleasure. These songs are at their very best when done out-of-doors and without accompaniment. We do other negro songs which are not to be found in these books but which have been gleaned from

Hampton Institute and Tuskeegee song books of years past.

There is a small paper-covered book called "KEEP ON SINGING" by Kenneth Clark which we have used some. I have used "KENT COUNTY SONG-BOOK", "CONCORD SERIES", "FOLK DANCES and SINGING GAMES" by Burchenal.

We are always on the hunt for new rounds and action songs. "Shusti-Fiddli" (a Czech musical game) is one of our favorites. Our boys likes chanteys and the girls have enjoyed trying descants with familiar letter here at quiry. If you have wely, I shall be gla tunes.

Since I do not have your letter here at the moment, I am not sure that I have answered your inquiry. If you have need of a list of songs which we have used effectively, I shall be glad to send you one.

Space should not be taken to mention more separate songs, but we must call attention to the descants on familiar songs that have been published by the Oxford University Press (CF), Edward Arnold & Co. (CF), and by Novello and Co. (H. W. Gray Co.). A descant is an additional tune that is to be sung, usually by a higher voice or voices, while the original tune is being sung. The resulting two-part singing is great fun, is usually easy to carry on and often lovely. Catalogs are available from the publishers.

Vol. II contains 35 general songs, as they are called, 20 sea chanteys, 10 convivial songs entitled "Frivola," 14 Rounds, and 52 "Fiddle Tunes and Fragments," among which there are several with words.

Both volumes have "leanings toward robustness and conviviality"; they are great collections for men.

The New Fellowship Song Book

This collection of 100 songs, having an inexpensive edition and being

The 33 songs in this book are associated with certain festivals and folk customs, each of which is quite fully and interestingly described. It is especially because of these descriptions that the book is included in our list. It was designed for children and teachers.

The best from England, unsurpassed by any collection from any other country.

Folk Songs, Chanteys and Singing Grmes

Edited by Farnsworth and Sharp. Complete music edition, \*1.50;

This is an admirably representative collection of 33 English folk songs and ballads, 7 singing games and 9 chanteys.

The best collection of seamen's songs. Part I contains 30 shanties (another spelling for sailor songs), and Part II contains 35, all with excellent accompaniments. Part I, we think, is the better collection.

A collection of 90 "songs of American sailormen" (without accompaniments)
that are placed in their proper environment by an explanatory text.

Capstan Bars

By David W. Bone, \$2.00.

The 23 chanteys in this book (without accompaniments) are among the best known and best loved, and the extensive comments on the seamen's singing of them and of the actions accompanying them are extremely interesting and enlightening. We must mention also the eight delightful woodcuts that illustrate the text.

On Roll on -

Canadian Folk Songs

Compiled by J. Murray Gibbon, \$2.50. This is the most useful collection of French-Canadian songs with English translations. Several songs of the "voyageurs" are especially good for community singing. Some of the accompaniments are too "sugary." The accompaniments should be simple and straightforward, free from any "barber shop" influences.

They are typical of the Latin fullness of feeling expressed in graceful rhythms and turns of melody. Most of the songs are not so well suited to groups as to individuals, but a group that is not too large can always enjoy even such a song if it is genuine and otherwise attractive.

Compiled by Carl Sandburg, \$3.50. Here are 280 songs and ballads from all parts of the United States, a musical pageant of pioneers, comboys, sailors, mountain folk, Negroes, hoboes, railroad and other work gangs, soldiers and lumberjacks. The compiler evidently felt no constraint due to musical standards. Some of the songs are a sad commentary on their phases of American life, but nevertheless an interesting one; and there are also some admirable songs in the book.

"This is a representative collection of 42 songs of the cowboy: old songs that sprang up in the days of the Chisholm Trail, and modern songs of the fenced cattle range and the dude ranches; work songs, love songs, dance tunes, dirges, humorous ditties, narratives of daring deeds." The introduction and the many explanatory notes are very enlightening. Some cowboy songs are not so well suited to group singing. They were usually sung by lone men.

N (HWG) Folk Songs Collected in the Appalachian Mountains (Second Series) By Cecil J. Sharp. Novello and Co., Ltd., London (American agent, H. W. Gray Co., \*1.50) (First Series -- published by G. Schirmer, Inc.) The Second Series, we think, is musically the most attractive collection of our mountain songs. "The Two Sisters," though it was a very gruesome text, is a superb tune. The folk singers of these mountains, like the cowboys, usually sing alone. But some of their songs are well suited to group singing. The First Series is also very valuable.
