John J. Klink died near Rio de Janeiro.

Death of a respected German citizen here.

From Rio de Janeiro in Brazil the report arrived here yesterday that Mr. John J. Klink, a Louisviller, departed this life on his farm lying near the city on 24 March. The mournful tidings, which were sent to the mother of the deceased, Mrs. Elizabeth Klink, who lives at 525 E. Gray St., struck the aged lady hard. For 25 years she had hoped to be able to see her firstborn once again, and he had often given her hope of this joyful event in his letters. The grim reaper, who unexpectedly encountered him, eliminated all hopes of the mother's heart with one blow.

Mr. John J. Klink was born here in 1840, spent his youth here, and became a traveling salesman for the firm of Barkhouse & Co. after he attained the age of a young man. When the war broke out he entered the Southern Army, and served with bravery during the same in the 3rd Georgia Cavalry Regiment. As soon as the war was over, he moved to Rio de Janeiro and settled there permanently. His enterprises met with success; he bought a valuable plantation near this city, married the daughter of a respected family, and enjoyed such respect that he was elected for a term as president of the council in Rio de Janeiro.

Although things went very well abroad, he had the most earnest desire, as already mentioned, to return to his home once more to see his aged mother and his siblings (brothers and sisters). But there were always difficulties that developed, and so the desire was unfulfilled. Numerous schoolmates and friends will remember him as they read these lines, although a quarter of a century has gone by since his departure. Besides his mother, Mr. Klink leaves several brothers and sisters here, among the closest relatives. Mr. J. B. Collins of the Louisville Water Works Company and Mr. William Kline are brothers—in—law of the deceased.

And I hereby authorize and empower him to sell, and dispose of said property, either at public or private sale as he may deem proper.

Lips, the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, which said sum I hereby direct my Executor to pay to him if he shall have arrived of the age of twenty one years at the time of my death - If however he should not have arrived at the age of Twenty one years at my death, then I direct my said Executor to pay over said amount to his father, the said Henry C. Lips, for the use and benefit of the said Charles untill he shall arrive at the age of twenty one years, at which time said amount shall be paid to the said Charles by the said Henry C. Lips.

ITEM # 5

I give and bequeath to Charles Klink Chapman son of my friend J. P. Chapman the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, said sum to be paid to the said Charles Klink Chapman by my executor at the time of my death provided he shall have reached the age of Twenty one years, if not said sum shall be paid to the said J. P. Chapman for the use and benefit of the said Charles K to be paid to him when he shall have arrived at the age of Twenty one years.

ITEM # 6

I give and bequeath to the Trustees of the Female Orphans Asylum of the City of Columbus the sum of Five Hundred Dollars.

ITEM # 7

I desire and so direct the residue and remainder of my estate of whatsoever kind the same may consist to be by my Executor converted into
cash at either public or private sale, as to him may seem best, and
the proceeds thereof to be by him equally divided between all of my
Nephews and Neices, whom I hereby constitute the sole beneficiaries
under this item of my will, share and share alike, in no wise excluding
my said Neice Emma E. Lips, to whom I have in the 5 item of this
will made a special bequest, but that all of my said Nephews and Neices

A Letter From Lee

Washington University October 3, 1865

General Pierre Gustave Toutant-Beauregard:

"I hope both you and Johnston will write the history of your campaigns. Everyone should do all in his power to collect and disseminate the truth, in the hope that it may find a place in history, and descend to posterity. I am glad to see no indication in your letter of an intention to leave the country. I think the South requires the aid of her sons now more than at any period of her history. As you ask my purpose, I will state that I have no thought of abandoning her unless compelled to do so....."

(We think it most fitting in this Silver Anniversary Edition of the Adjutant's (all to feature the Confederate ancestor of the Louisville Civil War Round Jable's founding father, Frank G. Rankin, Jr. Following is a short history of the Confederate career of 1st Lt. John J. Klink, Jr.)

As soon as it was possible to fulfill family obligations, John J. Klink, In. hastened South from Louisville through the Federal lines to Columbus, Ga., where his uncle, Charles A. Klink, had already joined up with the 17th Georgia Infantry as 1st lieutenant, eventually to be Captain. Uncle Charlie had come to this country from Germany and had made a fortune in steamboating, ending up owning six. In the fifties, sensing the unpleasantness to come, he sold out and bought a vast plantation in Columbus. John, the eldest son of John J. Klink, Sr., a silversmith and watchmaker, was his uncle's favorite and he wanted to be near his uncle.

John enlisted with the 3rd Georgia (avalry April 10, 1862. The 3rd was known as Capt. Thompson's Cavalry, C.S.A., sometimes known as Dillard's Rangers. His horse was listed at \$250.00 which represented a pretty good horse for that time. He was breveted 2nd Lt. and on April 16 was commissioned 1st Lt. and shown on the rolls as commanding the company. His previous experience in the Kentucky State Guard evidently was recognized. The Company was also referred to as (nawford's (avalry in the Columbus area and had been recruited by Col. Martin J. Crawford. They were immediately sent into service in Tennessee and were part of General Joseph E. Wheeler's command going into Kentucky. A good portion of the company were embarrassingly captured at Munfordville, but were immediately paroled. Uncle John was not in this action, having been detached with another command to make a raid up from Owensboro into Louisville. They came up to Clover Hill on Dixie Highway, camped there, dashed into 18th and Oak Streets, shot up the area and then left hurriedly. This encampment is documented in the Miller Family (owners of Federal Hill) now on file at the Filson (lub. However, Miller thought it was Morgan's men.

John's record shows him on a number of occasions detached for special duty. Because of his familiarity with Kentucky and Louisville, he was in and out of Louisville many times. He visited Abraham Lodge #8 J.A.M. sitting in Lodge with Union officers. The Confederates would leave the Lodge an hour before the Federals left, so there would be no suspicions cast on a brother officer. John was known as a wanted man by the Federals and the family homestead was searched in December, 1864, while John's father lay dead in a coffin.

John fought all through the War in Perryville, Murfreesboro, (hickamauga, and Atlanta. They fought Sherman in Georgia and the (arolinas. We have two of his original reports, one dated March 24, 1865 and another April 3, 1865. They are signed by him showing the numbers of the company down to 45 men, the regiment was down to 150. Although his parole at Washington, Georgia, was dated May 3, he told his family he did not surrender until June 10, as his group was cut off from the regiment and they didn't make up their minds until then.

He made his way back to Kentucky, had a brief career as a drummer while making provisions for taking care of his widowed mother, then took off for Brazil to join his (onfederate brethren there. He became a successful coffee planter with a large plantation. He was also a participant in civic affairs becoming head of the Rio de Janeiro (ity (ouncil. He married a 15 year old, beautiful Portuguese girl, Jesuina Pereira DeSilva. His estate, Nova America, was outside the city of Itapira, State of San Paula. On his death, his sword, revolver, knife, buttons and spurs came home to Kentucky along with a small trunk of (onfederate money.
