this morning - should have gotten it yesterday.
I tell you precious I was getting mighty
hungry to hear from you - Darling hess
your old ones I was so glad you can
set a time for me to come home - & it
is just the time I had asked you to let
me come - Darling I ~~was~~ have talked the
matter over with Dr & Mrs Loring & they
think I had better come back from
Rockport to San Antonio and start home
from here - Dr says cant check my trunk
through to Lewisville from Kennedy - and
cant start my trunk from here home when
I leave here for Rockport - and another thing

I will not make connection with the train that leaves here in the morning - but would have to take the night train or lay over one day & night at Kennedy - if take the night train would pass through so much of the country at night that want to see - so on the whole Dr says it will cost me very little more & he thinks it would be best for me to come back & start from here. Mrs Lowry has been quite sick since yesterday - after dinner she had a nervous sick spell like I had - and had another this morning - I telephoned for Dr - she told him when he came that I had made her drunk. it alarmed her very much - but her spells are not as bad as mine. Her son who goes to school at Austin came home this morning & she is so anxious to be up and fix every thing nice for him - but she is not able. Darby has thanked I am that have gotten me all that trouble - my

Throat has gotten well and I am feeling
very well. We weighed yesterday and the
man had made a mistake in our weights.
last week I weighed 148 & Helen 47. but
yesterday I weighed 140 & Helen 44. so you
see we could not both have fallen off three
pounds & he showed me ~~at~~ how the mistake
was made. - am so sorry - was so in hopes
would get up to 150 before left here. I
told Helen to tell her teacher this morning
that she would not come to school next
week. she does not want to stop at all. says
she has commenced another card & she
wants to finish it. I took Todd & Helen
and we went to the supper given by the
Sun set church. the members of the church
are all poor. had a very good supper. I
tried to eat the Mexican dishes but could
not. Helen eat Philicuncarne thought it
was hash. she roiled & groaned all night.
but is all right this morning. I felt
this morning like had been eating rocks.
but feel all right now. Daily pictures

I would so much rather go direct from
here home than go to Rockport - if Allie
writes me that it is damp there and
will not do for me to come yet a while
I will just give up the trip & stay
here until 10th or 11th and then start to
you. Tell Jimmie & Maria that I expect
to see an account of that walk they had
last Sunday in all the papers. Darby
I have not heard from Allie since the
one sent you - am afraid she did not
get my last letter - will write again
this morning. The actress Rhea is here -
Mrs Lanny wants me to go with Dr & the
boys to night to hear her in "From Here"
but I would rather go tomorrow to the
matinee & hear Camille - don't know
yet what will do. Darling I have no
news - hope my body will get over the
measles & mumps before we come home -
love to Ma, Papa & Gus - my love to
my dear children - I know they will
all be so glad when Mamma & Sister comes
home.
