NOTE: Sarah (Busy) Bruen Cronly traveled extensively after her husband's death in 1871. Prior to 1880 she often traveled with her niece, Mary Pindell Shelby. After she married in 1880, Busy continued to travel and Episcopal functions. This attractively bound **Autograph Book** is laced with divines of the Episcopal Church from Rectors to Bishops. She was an avid reader of "The Churchman" and obviously attended conferences & convention often. It appears that there was a gathering in Denver for women who would support Mission work for women in 1878. Other signatures appear to be during Episcopal gatherings in Baltimore/Amherst in 1879, New Mexico in 1883 and Sewanee, Tenn. in 1886. She also traveled for pleasure; Adirondacks 1879, St. Louis in 1881, Bahamas/Florida in 1882, Europe in 1884 on the sailing, steam assisted ship Bothnia*, Yellowstone in 1885, Alaska in 1890. She carried this little book for twenty years. I will date this **1877-1896** with the earliest entry being September of 1877 and the last being June 16, 1896. Also included here are pictures of the ship Bothnia that I found on the internet.

Aunt Busy's Autograph Book in Chronological Order

- Madge Lamb** (She was the first to sign this book) September 22, 1877

Sr. Eliza came first to Denver in 1871 and was hired by Bishop Spaulding to do mission work in the area. She worked out of a cottage at 1154 Broadway and started a county hospital in a tent with straw beds and gunnysacks. Her mission was known as the Mission of the Holy Comforter. She was a Sister of Charity and appointed first woman missionary in Episcopal Church in 1882. She organized the Sisters of Mercy.
- Bishop Potter** – Memorial House Philadelphia, PA May 27, 1878
Bishop Potter's Memorial House in Philadelphia was a school for women evangelist. He was in charge of all that instruction and also of the instruction at the hospital adjoining it. It still stand today.
