As Tuesday the 19th is noted, this would have to be after her babes were born in 1897 or 1909. Since Lizzie Smith documents a visit in **October 19, 1909** I will place it here. Notice Ingels she spelled Ingles. Just a few of the first pages are filled. Sadly, the rest of the pages are blank – not quite the diary skills of her mother, Amanda. 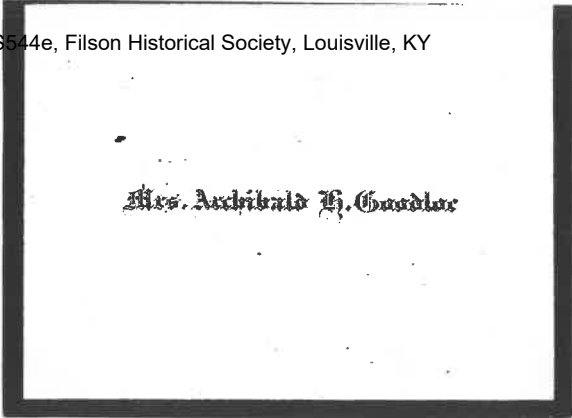

Easter that year was **April 10, 1898**. It is made to stand up and the back reads: For dear Margery Bruen, with Aunt Busy's Love (N. Y.) 1898



NOTE: Susan Hart Shelby Carter Magoffin, only surviving daughter of Gen James Shelby, died just eight weeks after this letter was written, on January 13, 1901. This letter sadly reflects the fall of many Shelby's. Susan Shelby Magoffin is listed in Kirkwood, MO Grace (Episcopal) Church, Confirmation Book #2, page 150 (I think date 5/2/99) – and yet she heavily gifted the Presbyterian Church of Kirkwood at her death; “Fifty (50) acres more or less to the Presbyterian Church at Kirkwood Mo. to be held by said church perpetually as a Source of revenue for the relief and benefit of the wornout clergymen of this Synod and direct that the rents and profits arising therefrom be used in the behalf in such a manner as said church may direct.” I call the church and they had no idea what happen tothat land in 2003! **Dating 1900 11/25**

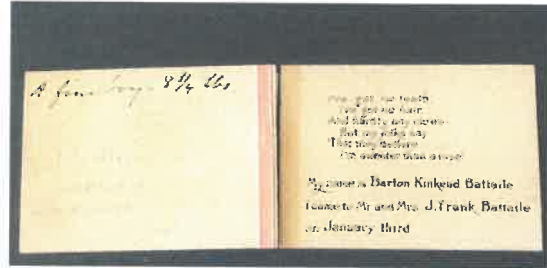
