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



This cause coming on for final hearing on the pleadings, exhibits and proof and the court being advised on the exceptions to the depositions and the record filed to be used as testimony from the United States Treasury department, overruled the exception and objection to the record certified from the United States Treasury department, to which defendant excepts, and also overruled the objection to all the questions and answers in the deposition of plaintiff, which objection appears in the deposition, to which defendants except; the court also overrules the objection to the deposition of J. Swigert Taylor, in so far as it is read as testimony in behalf of the defendant E. H. Taylor Jr. & Sons, incorporated, upon the disavowal of the defendants to read same in behalf of the defendant Sadie . Taylor, wife of said J. Swigert Taylor, as appears in the caption to the deposition, and repeated in Court, and permits said deposition to be read on behalf of the defendant E. H. Taylor Jr. & Sons, incorporated to which ruling the plaintiff excepts; the court then being advised as to the whole case on the merits, on the pleadings and proof, adjudges and decrees that the plaintiff J. W. Johnson is entitled to the relief sought, and is the owner and entitled to have issued to him, eleven shares of the capital stock of the defendant corporation of E. H. Taylor Jr. & Sons, and the defendant corporation and its officers are directed and enjoined to issue and deliver to the plaintiff

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certificates of stock for such eleven shares, and will permit him to use and enjoy and exercise all the rights of a stockholder to the full extent of said eleven shares, and the defendant Sadie G. Taylor is directed to surrender for cancellation certificates for eleven shares of stock in the defendant corporation, and the defendant corporation and its officers are directed and enjoined to cancel elevan shares of the stock claimed to be owned by defendant Sadie G. Taylor, and the title to said eleven shares of stock adjudged to plaintiff is hereby quieted, and the plaintiff will recover his costs herein expended for which execution may issue.

The Court also overruled the exceptions of the defendants to the cross-examination by plaintiff of the defendant's witnesses E. H. Taylor Jr., J. Swigert Taylor and John Meagher, as noted in the depositions of said witnesses.

No objection is interposed by either party to the Court's consideration of exceptions to the depositions or exhibits growing out of the fact that seperate and independent exceptions were not filed to said testimony-

To all of which defendants except and pray an appeal to the Court of Appeals which is granted.
