This agreement entered into between E.H. Taylor Jr. & Sons, Incorporated, party of the first part, and Simon Weil party of the second part,

Witnesseth:- That the party of the first part sells to the party of the second part the slop from 500 bushels of daily mash at the OLD TAYLOR Distillery in Woodford County, Kentucky, from October 4th. to May 31st. inclusive, or as much later as water supply will admit, but not later than June 30th. 1906, at the rate of 8 cents per bushel, and the party of the second part agrees to pay for the slop in the manner mutually agreed upon, viz:-

On the basis of a cash payment the first of each month for the slop used during the previous month, as shown by the Government records at the Distillery of grain mashed and run.

The party of the second part has given the party of the first part his notes as follows, on account of said contract, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, viz:

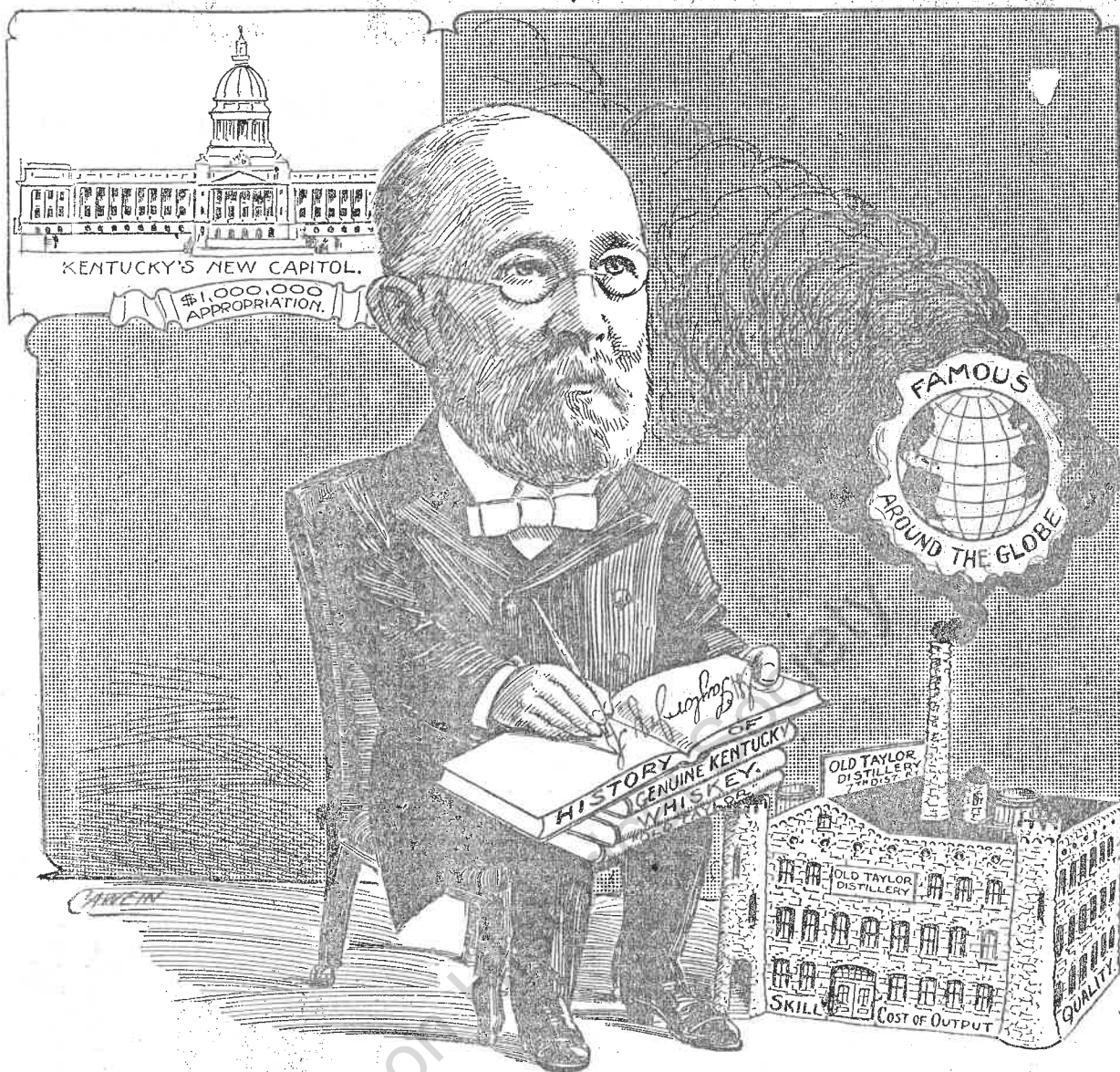

E. H. TAYLOR, JR., "KENTUCKY'S GRAND OLD MAN."

The history of how Kentucky became famous as the foremost producer of fine whisky throughout the markets of the world would find one name written on well nigh every page. That name is E. H. Taylor, Jr., of Frankfort, president of E. H. Taylor, Jr. & Sons, distillers of Taylor whisky. Pioneer builder of the high standards which put Kentucky in the lead of Scotland and Ireland, Col. Taylor has amply won the authority with which he has defended the integrity of Kentucky whisky in the trade and general press against substitution and the practice of misusing Kentucky's famous name to float "make-believe" products in the markets. Scholarly, scientific and thorough, he spent much time in Scotland and Ireland before the internal revenue tax was applied to whisky in the United States. Returning to this country, his methods of distillation made famous, one after the other, the most celebrated Kentucky distilleries of the present day. Soon after the close of the Civil War his name was known as a distiller wherever Kentucky whisky was distributed. For some twenty years Col. Taylor has confined his energies to one distillery and one branch—"Old Taylor." The fact that the English Government is now using a sample of "Old Taylor" whisky in the British courts to prove what pure whisky is, gives some index to its reputation.

Col. Taylor's patriotic labor for a new Capitol building for Kentucky made him a conspicuous figure in the House and Senate for some fifteen years. The \$1,000,000 appropriation and the location of the building at Frankfort were, according to many of the legislators who voted for the measure, almost a personal triumph for Col. Taylor. Senator Byron, voicing the feeling at the banquet celebrating this appropriation, said:

But let her not forget, and I know she will not, that while she owes much to the coterie of polite, affable, dignified and distinguished ladies and gentlemen who continued, in season and out of season, through evil and through good report, to work for the success of the new Capitol building, she owes more—yea, in a word, she owes all for her laudible achievements at this time—to the able and intelligent effort of her princely Senator. Yes, when the new Capitol is finished and Kentucky, proud and grand old Kentucky, shall turn to smile upon the palace within whose walls are to be enacted the laws that will govern coming generations, and within whose archives is safely kept a record of some of the deeds of her most worthy sons—high above all the names of those who labored to give her this Capitol building, worthy of her name and fame—let her write in imperishable characters of shining gold the name 'E. H. Taylor, Jr., Franklin's princely Senator, Kentucky's Grand Old Man.'"

This cause coming on for final hearing on the pleadings, exhibits and proof and the court being advised on the exceptions to the depositions and the record filed to be used as testimony from the United States Treasury department, overruled the exception and objection to the record certified from the United States Treasury department, to which defendant excepts, and also overruled the objection to all the questions and answers in the deposition of plaintiff, which objection appears in the deposition, to which defendants except; the court also overruled the objection to the deposition of J. Swigert Taylor, in so far as it is read as testimony in behalf of the defendant E. H. Taylor Jr. & Sons, incorporated, upon the disavowal of the defendants to read same in behalf of the defendant Sadie C. Taylor, wife of said J. Swigert Taylor, as appears in the caption to the deposition, and repeated in Court, and permits said deposition to be read on behalf of the defendant E. H. Taylor Jr. & Sons, incorporated to which ruling the plaintiff excepts; the court then being advised as to the whole case on the merits, on the pleadings and proof, adjudges and decrees that the plaintiff J. W. Johnson is entitled to the relief sought, and is the owner and entitled to have issued to him, eleven shares of the capital stock of the defendant corporation of E. H. Taylor Jr. & Sons, and the defendant corporation and its officers are directed and enjoined to issue and deliver to the plaintiff

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certificates of stock for such eleven shares, and will permit him to use and enjoy and exercise all the rights of a stockholder to the full extent of said eleven shares, and the defendant Sadie G. Taylor is directed to surrender for cancellation certificates for eleven shares of stock in the defendant corporation, and the defendant corporation and its officers are directed and enjoined to cancel eleven shares of the stock claimed to be owned by defendant Sadie G. Taylor, and the title to said eleven shares of stock adjudged to plaintiff is hereby quieted, and the plaintiff will recover his costs herein expended for which execution may issue.

The Court also overruled the exceptions of the defendants to the cross-examination by plaintiff of the defendant's witnesses E. H. Taylor Jr., J. Swigert Taylor and John Meagher, as noted in the depositions of said witnesses.

No objection is interposed by either party to the Court's consideration of exceptions to the depositions or exhibits growing out of the fact that separate and independent exceptions were not filed to said testimony-

To all of which defendants except and pray an appeal to the Court of Appeals which is granted.
