Louisville Ky, April the 23<sup>rd</sup>  
1846

Dear sister i now take my pen in hand to inform  
you that i am well and i that these few lines  
may find in like manner i am hard at work  
the time are vrey good there is a grate deal of building  
there is more than has ben for four or five year  
the wages are geting better than they have ben  
there one dola a day for coman hands there has  
ben three murderd here in a few days there has  
nothing ben sudon with the men yet and there  
found draunded that is all that has hapned this  
marketing is vrey good better is twenty cents a pound  
and eggs ten cents the river has ben vrey high  
Pransom and his folks are well. manda says that she  
would like to see you vrey much and wants to  
hav ransom go up there this winter he is at  
work at the mill he is as fat as he can be they will  
soon hav a little one i think Amasa and his folks  
are are well he is doing vrey well for him she is a  
grate deal better than i ever draw her she  
Amasa send to you his best respects and  
to all inquiring friends and wants you to ret  
to y him as soon as you can for he wants  
to hear from you

Dear Sir I now take the opportunity  
to write you a few lines in answer  
to your letter of the 29<sup>th</sup> June  
we are all well at this time  
and I hope that those few lines  
will find you all the same  
I intended to write last Sunday  
but I was not at home I left  
home early in the morning for  
for Nashville Ten to <sup>see</sup> Othello I  
heard that he had got shot and  
I went down to see him and I  
found him in a hospital in  
Nashville he was slightly wounded  
in the neck and left hand. it  
was an accident shot of a Pistol  
in the hand of one of the members  
of his company. it was a very  
narrow escape the ball taking

apert in the left side of the  
neck immediately over the Juglar  
vein passing under the skin for  
about 2 1/2 inches but he will soon  
get over it he is at home and  
doing very well he will remain  
at home till he gets well  
you wish to know if I have heard  
from Brother Johns folks I have  
not heard any thing from  
them for a long time I do not  
know where they are

I should like very much  
to see you all but I cannot leave  
home to make you a visit without  
a considerable inconvenience as my  
business requires my whole  
attention but if I ever get an  
opportunity I shall come and see  
you I inclose in this letter my  
likeness it is a good one and I  
think that sister will be very  
glad to see it

tell the children to write often  
for I like to hear from you  
all very much  
the times are very dull here and  
very little doing  
I now conclude with by sending  
my best respects to all inquiring  
friends yours truly

I now take the opportunity to write you  
a few lines in answer to your letter  
of the 4<sup>th</sup> of last month which  
came to hand in due time but which  
I have neglected to answer as soon  
as I should have done but I hope  
that you will excuse my neglect  
we are all well at this time and I  
hope that will find you all the same  
I hope that the little boy has got  
over his illness for it is a grate  
deal of trouble when the little ones  
are sick. I have bin talking  
about coming up to see you all  
but it seems like I cant get a  
chance to come for I have no one  
to attend to my business when I  
am away but if I can possibly  
get an opportunity to come I will

do so we heard from Otello a  
bout a week since he was well  
and at Clarksville. I am on the  
Cumberland River he says they  
for some time he says that they  
are well fortified at that place  
and could stand a hard fight they  
have a good fort I have but  
little news to write you the times are  
rather dull here at present I was  
glad to learn that you have heard  
from Harrison and that <sup>he</sup> was well  
I suppose that they have a plenty to  
do down the ~~North~~ River as there  
is a plenty of Rebels down there  
I will now conclude with my  
best respects to all inquiring  
friends please Right soon

Dear... I now take the opportunity to write you a few lines, to let you know that we are all well at this time and I hope that this will find you all in like manner yours, of the 9<sup>th</sup> inst came to hand in due time but I hardly know what to write you in answer to it we deeply lament with you in your sad bereavement by the death of Harrison but therein by one consolation he has laid down his life for his country as a Soldier and a Patriot. it is a sad thing to part with a beloved Relative but we shall all have to part sooner or later

I hardly know what to  
rite you about Amy Delano  
I have not heard from her  
since I wrote you before Mary  
and Amy, have now arrived at  
an age that they can do as  
they please and I suppose that  
we will have to let them do so  
as they are beyond our control  
I will rite to Mr. Hurdly and  
if she should send Amy to  
Louvville if I can find her  
I will do the best I can for her  
and if she is not satisfied  
with that she must do better  
if she can but I wish that  
you would try and keep Mary  
from coming back here for  
I don't think the city is the  
proper place for her for there  
is to much wild company  
her for her to run with and  
if she was here I am afraid

that we could do nothing  
with her and that she  
would soon do as pleased and  
if the girley were baath her  
they would soon find their  
mother and the next thing that  
she would do with them would  
be to go to keeping house  
with them to make a living  
and if ware to do that I know  
very well what the consequences  
would be so I hope that you  
will try and prevail on her  
to stay in the country, at  
least for the present  
I now conclude with the my  
best respects to you and all

Dear maam I now take the  
opertunity to rite you a few  
lines to inform that we are  
all well except our litte girl  
she has bin quite ill for  
a day or so but I think that  
she will be beter in a short  
time I hope that this will  
find you all in good health  
I Received a letter yesterday  
from Otello he wrote on  
the 3 inst he was at Stevenson  
Alabama he rites that he is  
well and hartly they call  
their camp Camp Hard  
Bread and that they <sup>now</sup> pretty  
hard times down there I have  
but litte to rite you at this  
time but I will try and

make my letter as interesting  
as possible the times are quite  
dull here in my line business  
and every thing is very high  
in prices and the Ohio River  
is very low and that is one  
cause of things being so Dear  
coal is selling at from  
~~\$15.00 to \$18.00 per hundred~~  
Baskets of coal is selling for  
from \$60.00 to \$70.00 Dollars  
per hundred Baskets. last  
year at this time I could  
buy good coal at \$12.50 per  
hundred Baskets but is very  
scarce now at any price and  
if the <sup>river</sup> should freeze before  
the coal comes down it will  
make very hard times here  
for fuel wood is worth \$8.00  
per cord and scarce at that  
Potatoes have bin selling for  
\$3.00 per Barrel and all most

every thing else in proportion  
I have never wrote to your  
Brother John yet and do not  
know where to direct my letter  
to him I should like to come  
and see you all this fall if  
I could make it convenient to  
do so I have a large stock work  
on hand and if I could sell  
it of this fall I think I would  
try and come and see you  
but I dont know what to say  
about it I should like to <sup>see</sup> all  
of the old folks about Worthington  
very much please write and let  
me know how and where John  
is if you know give my  
respects to all inquiring friends

we may be a free people and  
I hope a happy people when  
this cruel war is over  
therefore we must bare with  
those afflictions I have not  
heard from Otello since I  
rote to last Sunday he was  
well when I heard from him  
last he is away down in Alabama  
at a place call Stevenson and  
same time, I feel as though I  
shoud never see him again  
but he always rote as though he  
was in good spirits and well and  
happy I have not writch to rote  
at this time but will conclude  
and may the Blessing of God Rest  
on your Fathers little family and  
may it be many a long Day before  
another sad bereavement shall  
ocur to Mar the happiness of your  
little circle please rote soon

Dear Peace I now take the opportunity, to write you a few lines, in answer to yours of last month which I received through the politeness of Mr Charles Morgan he came to see me on his arrival in the city and gave me your letter and I was very happy to make the acquaintance of persons from the neighbourhood of old Warthington Mr Morgan has called to see us several times he was at our house for Piner on Christmas day we had a very fine day for Christmas, the day was very pleasant a lively time with the people I encarely, but the nice weather is over now for it began to rain a Christmas night and has been raining ever since I intended to answer you



letter sooner but I have a good  
many letters to write and I neglected  
to answer yours but I hope you  
will excuse me for it  
Uncle Amos & Amanda went down  
to Nashville Tenn last week to  
see Otello he wrote to us that  
he was there and so she went  
down to see him and found him  
she staid 3 days there with him  
he is well and hearty and grows  
finley we sent him a big Box  
of sick socks for Chrismas  
his hol thinks they will leave  
Nashville in a short time and go  
to Huntsville Ala we are all  
well and I hope that this will

Dear Ma'am I now take the opportunity to write you a few lines in answer to yours of the 14<sup>th</sup> of last month which came to hand in due time we are all well at this time our little Halley has bin very sick with the scarlet fever but she is quite well now and I hope that little Rose has got well again I got a letter last Monday from Othello he wrote from Rosville Georgia on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of last month he was well and happy then he wrote that they would start the next morning for Tunnel Hill to fight the Rebels at that place I see by the papers

that his Regt the 28<sup>th</sup> Regt  
was in the fight and they  
had 4 men wounded but  
Ottello was not among the  
wounded they fought on the  
25 and 26<sup>th</sup> of Feb we are very  
anxious to hear from Ottello  
for I expect he was in the fight  
he wrote that he had Reimbursed  
for 3 years with and nearly all  
Regt had Reimbursed  
Mr Charles B. Morgan was  
at our home several times  
he took dinner with us on  
Newyears day but I have  
not seen or heard of him since  
that time I don't know what has  
become of him he appeared to  
be a very nice young man  
I would like to see you all  
very much but can't tell  
when I shall be able to come to  
see you we look for Ottello

have soon if he is ~~all~~  
above and well as the Regt  
has Reimbursed  
the times are very dull here now  
and very little doing in my  
business. Currier Frank Allen  
came to see us when he was on  
his way home about the 10<sup>th</sup>  
of Feb he said he wanted call  
and see you if he was in that

may be settled soon  
but rather

better write

I am tired of war  
now give  
to

Rebels  
I will serve ten years  
more. Well cousin, I am I am  
I have no news of much interest to you  
for I know you would love to hear about  
the war news down here but there is none now  
only we are fortifying this for we are and our  
heads all winter and I hope for I  
am sick of marching in rain but anything  
can be gained by so doing I am ever ready  
you must write us soon as you get this  
letter and let me know how you all  
are. I am here at present but remain
