

FIRST REGULAR MEETING, FOODS AND MARKETS COMMITTEE,  
LOUISVILLE WOMEN'S CITY CLUB? April 26th.

The Foods and Markets Committee of the L. W. City Club met at Club headquarters on Thursday, April 26th, at 3:30 P. M. There were fourteen present when the meeting was called to order but many more came in as the meeting progressed.

Miss Kremm, Chairman, announced that the work of this Committee would be the canning of surplus fruits and vegetables, along the same lines adopted in Chicago.

Miss Kremm announced that Miss Sweeney of the State University would send one of her very best assistants to teach or instruct groups of women in canning. This would be done free of expense except the personal expenses of this instructor.

The question of the purchase of cans or jars by the Committee was discussed but it was brought out that this might antagonize the retail merchants who sell this line, so it was moved and seconded that a Committee be appointed to interview the Retail Grocers Association and the Retail Merchant's Association regarding the sale of jars, cans and the materials themselves. Carried. This Committee to be appointed by the Chairman.

The question of having the thirty teachers of Home Economics in the Public Schools volunteer to give one week of their time, if possible, to instructing groups of women was discussed. Miss Simon offered to find out what could be done along this line.

The question was raised as to whether the assistant Miss Sweeney would send would be a faculty or pupil assistant.

Mrs. Halleck moved that the work of the Committee on Foods and Markets for the summer be the marketing and canning of perishable food stuffs. This was seconded and carried.

It was moved that a Committee on Instruction be appointed to see if all-summer instruction could be arranged for. Carried.

It was also suggested that we ask for a Government instructor to be sent from Washington to instruct the teachers.

The question of Place was next discussed. Church kitchens, settlement homes and school kitchens were discussed. It was moved and seconded that the Committee on Instruction also look into the question of Place. Carried.

Mrs. Rivers, representing the Wesley House, said this could be used as a station and representatives from the Babies Milk Fund, the Cabbage Patch and the Hebrew Charities promised

co-operation.

Miss Kromm announced that Mr. Merriman had offered to speak to the farmers as he went through the country and also to put any articles we gave him in the County papers.

Three members joined the Club at this meeting.

It was decided to have regular meetings on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month at 3:30 o'clock in the Club room, and that postals be sent members reminding them of meetings; these postals to be sent by a member of the Committee appointed to do this work.

Friday July 5, 1918

The Foods & markets Committee of the Louisville Women's City Club met in the Club room, Friday July 5, 3:00 P.M.

Dr. Gary reported 500 groceries inspected, 123 of which are in condition to receive "Approval Cards"

A second visit will be made to the other grocers by the inspectors and the grocers warned to improve conditions at once because the "cards" will be supplied by August 1, 1918

Both Dr. Fricks and Dr. Gary invited this Committee to visit the groceries, telephone them and to urge their customers to do the same asking if the "approval Cards" had been allowed by the U. S. Public Health Service.

Dr. Fricks and Dr. Gary then withdrew and Mrs. Morris Gifford and Miss Alexina Booth from the Food Administration conferred with the Committee regarding any cooperation the Foods & Markets Committee might render the Food Administration. *in regard to the War Kitchen Committee's*

The Chairman and Miss Simon had offered their <sup>the</sup> services to operate Food Administration Kitchen. Some misunderstanding had arisen over the question of whether this service was to be rendered as individuals or as members of the Foods and Markets

Committee.

Mrs. Gifford and Mrs. Halleck had visited Mr. Sackett in the morning to clear up the matter and had understood that the services had been accepted as individuals.

It was, therefore, decided to write to Mr. Sackett and formally offer the Committee's services to operate the United States Food Administration War Garden Kitchen.

Meeting adjourned to meet again upon receiving the reply from Mr. Sackett.

Mrs. Halleck explained the work of the Food & Markets Committee and reviewed what has been done in its canning campaign. The work to be taken up at the present time would be to cooperate with the Food Administration <sup>concerning</sup> ~~concerning~~ food and maintaining prices.

It was decided that the Pres. appoint a chairman to succeed Miss Josephine Krenn, resigned. Mrs. Halleck then appointed Mrs. G. C. Newman who accepted. Mrs. Les Parson was elected Secretary but declined to serve on the grounds of inexperience and the chairman appointed Mrs. W. E. Morrison.

Mrs Les Parsons and Mrs Newman reported an interview with Mr Sackett in which he suggested that this committee make every effort to mold public opinion in the support of the work of the Food Administration. He asked that the members be examples of conservation saying that it is the people of moderate means who really have to bear the expense of the war and if we lose the rich will have to pay the indemnity to Germany. He suggested that housekeepers be appealed to to order once a day from their groceries and to use perishable articles of food as nearly as possible. The date for the regular meeting of the committee was set for the 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday each month at 3 p.m.

The chairman suggested the forming of a Vigilance Committee as a sub-committee whose duty it would be to see that the grocers conform to the laws governing weights and prices as issued by the Administration. Mrs. Melle was appointed chairman of this committee and she accepted.
