Dr Sir

I am informed by Col
Gen Johnson that two Steam Boats Calhoun
and Johnson are detained for non payment
of the Marshal's fees, and that those fees
amount to the enormous sum of \$700 -
that the Judge gave orders to return the
boats upon payment of actual expence
accrued. I cannot see how this charge
can arise except for the custody of the
boat, which although nominal, is legal-
ly chargeable for. But be this as it may,
the charge is such that coming unex-
pectedly Col Johnson is not able to meet
it at the moment, and the detention of
his boats on that account loses him
the benefit of voyages already agreed
for. Under these circumstances I am
surprised that the boats should not be
given up and a reliance placed on
Col Johnson for the Marshal's fees, as
his ability to pay is unquestioned, and

his promise to do, ^{so} fully to be relied on.
I know not what arrangement has been
made between you & Mr Coleman upon
the subject of fees, but I feel, as an
officer, chagrined that the boats should
be detained for Marshall's fees, when the
detention will produce such serious
injury to the owner, and the payment
neither facilitated by the detention, nor
jeopardized by the release.

I have written to Mr Coleman upon
this subject saying that I will en-
gage that the fees will be paid,
although such an engagement is
unnecessary - and I feel it my
duty to interpose my authority to
direct the boats to be restored if
they are detained only for Marshall's
fees: an order to that effect I
have sent to Col. Johnson -

Natchez February 13th 1828.

Dear Sir,

Your favour of the 5th Inst. was delivered to me yesterday by Mr. New Jason on his way to Orleans, and I hasten to reply to your enquiries. The money due by Mr Lyon to the Estate of O. Afflick, has not yet been collected, but will be probably in the course of three months. (Pay by the middle of May.) - I did expect that I should have been able to collect the money before this - but was compelled to institute suit against Lyon; at the last May Term of our Circuit Court Judgement was obtained. And by the present Law of our State a defendant in Execution cannot be compelled to pay before the lapse of two Terms - I we have only two in the year - The first Execution was satisfied by a North-Carolina Bond, which was forfeited at our last Nov. Term - the second Execution is now in the hand of the Sheriff - and the money will in all probability be made by our next May Term, which commences on the third Monday of May. As soon as the money is collected you shall be apprised of it. Or if any

Sir
I have to pay in a few days upwards of a
thousand dollars to brother James as Executor of
my father on account of my purchases at
the sale. A portion of this money will be going
to you as the Guardian of your children. There
is an unsettled account between you & myself
I should like to have it adjusted & the balance
due me if any applied to the payment of
the money which will be due you
as Guardian. My account you will find
stated on the other side of this sheet. By
it you will see the amt. charged against
you after deducting a payment of \$7 you
made to A. Munday for me, is \$398.48.
From this amt. you will have to deduct
the fees which remain in your hands
uncollected and also the amt. I may owe
you for acting as Deputy Marshal. The amt.
which you ought to be allowed for these
services I leave entirely to you. I shall
be perfectly satisfied with any amt. you
may think right for these services & I wish
you not to feel the least hesitancy
about fixing the amt. I wish the account
closed. If any thing is due me I should
like to have it appropriated as above
if not I shall be content

as to the fee bills you have not
collected you can either take them
in part of pay for your services
or reserve them for a subsequent
settlement. We have no
news at all will do you

Colo. Sutton will do me the favour of offering my
Lots in District Inlargement (Ch. 40. 50. & 110) for
lease for five or seven years. I would prefer that
the Tenant should pay a stipulated sum per foot
and make such improvements as he pleased reser-
ving to me the discretion of paying or not paying
for them, at valuation, at the end of the lease.
Should the improvements or the valuation be such
as I would not accept, the Tenant to be at liberty
to remove them; provided, however, that in all
cases a good neat enclosure be made & left
around the lots which may be leased. It would
perhaps facilitate the leasing or otherwise benefit
me, to offer the Lots in halves - each having
52 feet front - In any Contracts for either
of the Lots having water in them let it be
expressly required that the sunken parts be

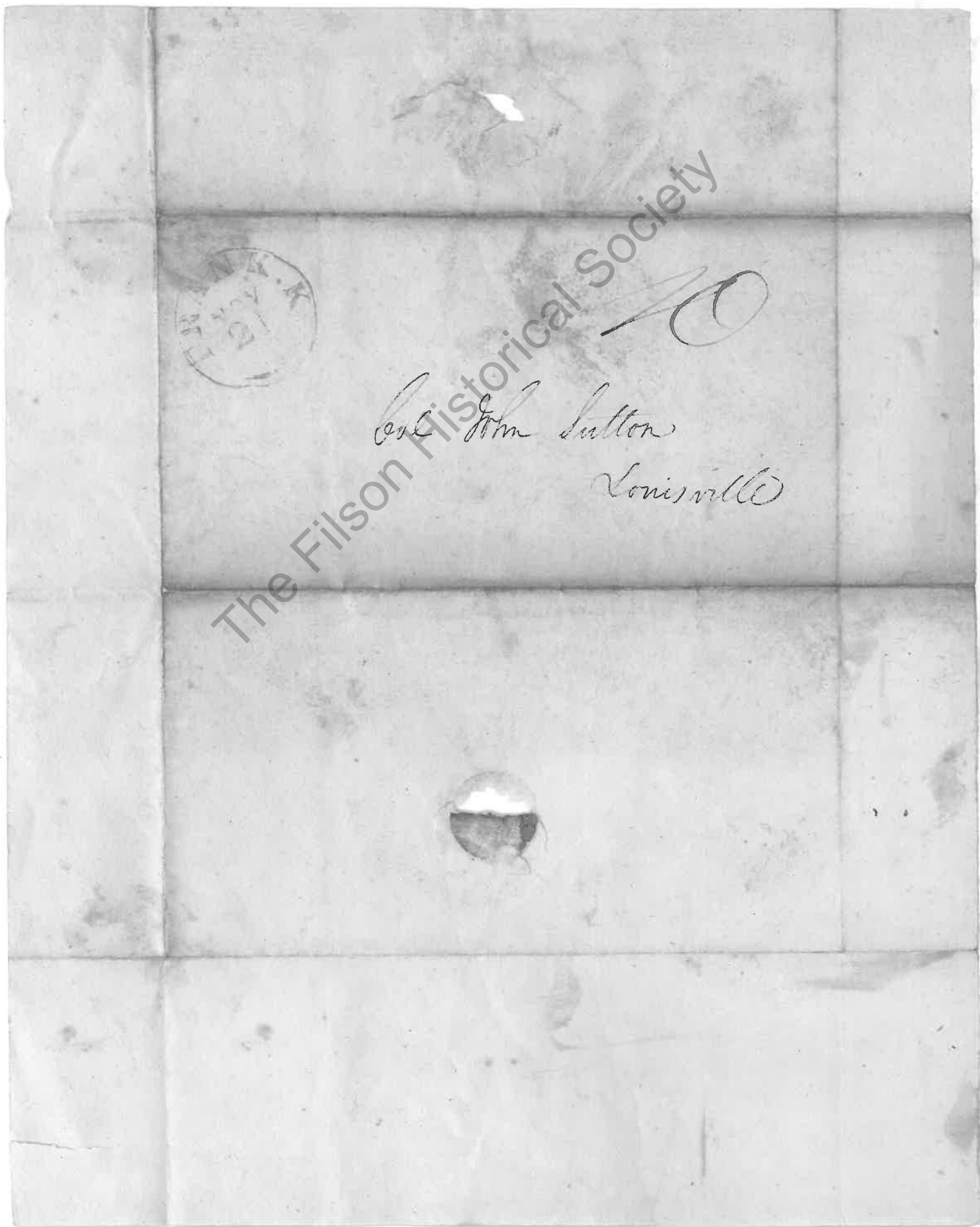
