Morton's Gap is in Hopkins Co. Looking at such records of Hopkins as we possess. I see a number of Almon references, and this suggests that you would learn more about the family by seeing as much Hopkins Co. information as possible.

With particular reference to Samuel, I see in Hopkins Co. marriage records that a Samuel Almon Marr. Mary W. Gunn Jan 31, 1839. Sam Aldmon is mentioned in the 1816 county minute book. M.K. Gordon's Hopkins Co. History notes that Samuel Almond owned 2 horses and 400 acres on Pond River in 1807, and was one of many county road section surveyors about 1813.

Samuel Aldman is listed in the 1810 Kentucky census in Hopkins Co; Samuel Almen in 1820; Samuel Almen in 1830; and Samue Almen in 1840. In the latter year, Thomas Almon is listed also in Hopkins.

The ENahimeal Archives and the Library of Congsess are legical places for you to search. Ask there, or at you local library, for Last We Porget, a guide to genealogical research in Washington D.C., Revised edition published in 1976 in Annandale by the Norman Church.

Your letter has been turned over to me from Trace Kirkwood of our manuscript Dept. for reply. I am the in-resident genealogist, and try to answer inquiries such as yours.

One hour does not allow extensive searching, but with what time that I have had, let me tell you of what I have found.

In J. Stoddard Johnston's <u>Memorial History of Louisville</u>, Vol. 2, I have found a good biographical sketch of Angus Rucker Allmond. (I enclose a copy) From this I was able to verify the parents as Alfred Dismukes Allmond and Jane Allen Blakey, which you had given in your letter. It goes on to say that Alfred's father was a Mann Allmond.

Angus Rucker Allmond married in Nashville Tennessee 1895 Stella Eakin. Stella was the daughter of Spencer Eakin and Ms. Ewing, daughter of Andrew Ewing and Rowena Williams. Another daughter of Andrew and Rowenca married Henry Watterson.

In your letter, you had stated that the brother of Angus was a Marcus B. Allmond of Louisville. I have found a death record of Marcus and it gives his parents as: Marcus Blakey Allmond and Virginia Cary Meade.

In checking in our burial registers for Cave Hill, I do find Marcus Blakey Allmond, and he died 11-30-1937. (a copy of his death certificate is enclosed) His father Marcus Blakey is listed in Cave Hill and he died Sept. 3, 1909 and his mother Virginia Carey. Virginia died 6-15-1921. I do not find a death for Alfred Dismukes Allmond in Louisville, but a Jane Allen Allmond is listed in Cave Hill and she died in 1892.

I am unable to find a burial or death record in Ky. for Angus Rucker Allmond. Even though it appears he was in Louisville in the late 1890's. Perhaps he went back to Tennessee where his wife was from.

I do hope this will be of some help to you, and if I can help you again, let me know.

You must think I'm crazy for writing you again, but I realized that I neglected to include my check in my previous letter to you. Please find it enclosed now.

As long as I needed to send you another envelope, it occurred to me that I should have asked you a couple more questions.

As you look for materials on my great-grandmother, I should have told you her married name was Mrs. Angus (Stella Eakin) Allmond. They lived in Kentucky for awhile at the turn of the century, so maybe there's something on her or her husband, Angus. His brother lived in Louisville and ran the Male High School, I believe. He was Marcus B. Allmond, a scholar of ancient languages and an author of several books. Their parents were Alfred Dismukes and Jane Allen Blakey Almond. (Note that Marcus and Angus added a second l to Allmond, while their father chose not to change his name.) They moved there just after Civil War and are buried in Cave Hill Cemetery. It would be neat if you could find anything on any of them.

One other request; this time regarding old books. Do you know of <u>Memories Over the Water</u>, an account of a European trip in the 1850's? It has an introduction by Judge Edwin Ewing, another ancestor. It was written by Wm. Randall McGavock. The paper I have says it has been republished by Dr. Herschel Gower under the title <u>Pen and Sword</u>. I would be thrilled if I were able to read these publications. Is it possible The Filson Club has either OR knows how I can get either??

I can't begin to tell you how happy everyone in our family will be if you are able to uncover any hidden treasures on our ancestors. Thank you immensely.

The following is clarification of the connection between the Ailmond family of fentucky, and the Alcond family of Fixginia:

I guote from a letter just received from Harry F. Allmond of Washington, D. G.

"As you know, your father came to louisville first, and after being called Mr. Penon and other pronounciations of the name 'Almond', and being an educator, he decided to officially have another 'I' put in the name and thus to be able to get the proper pronounciation 'Allmond', then the rest of the family followed him, we decided he was right. Father agreed it was all right, but he being 67 years of age and his father and brothers still living in Virginia would censor him for it.

"When father died, his name appeared as Alfred D. Almond, Secretary of the Saptist Theological Seminary, and your father's name as Marcus B. Allmond who is the writer of the Sketch of Eather's life.

"Our ancestors came from England over 200 years ago, and settled in the tidewater country of Virginia, and the name was always pronounced as it was spelled with two ll's. When your great-grandfather, Mann Almond and his brother, Edward became of age, they decided to go over the Slueridge Mountains and begin their business life. They reached the sits of what is now Luray, Virginia. Mann Almond decided to open a general merchandising store there and Edward decided to build a mill about a mile south. They both prospered and the country thereabout rapidly became settled. This was in the year 1316. Both of the brothers merried daughters of prominent farmers. Your grandfather was born in 1818, and was followed by six brothers and two sisters and his brother, Edward, had five children. Soon the valley was practically owned by them. Most of what I have written can be found in the Baptist Seminery Magazine of April, 1897.

"In reference to the present Governor Almond of Virginia, he is a distant cousin of ours. His great-grandfather and my great-grandfather were brothers. He is a fine gantleman, and I am glad to have him related to me."


