I think you'll find many bits of information about Joseph, born May 31, 1744, son of Peter (Pierre and Marie Godwin). I think your date that you wrote me is correct.

We have a large family tree showing the descendants of Peter III & it states he was born Nov. 29, 1745 and died Mar 20, 1844 which would be the correct dates for the two brothers of Pierre and Marie Godwin).

"On July 23, 1699, De Vervo Four & Children came to Jamestown Va. in English ship, Mary & Ann. The people were Huguenot refugees. Children's names were: Daniel, Jean and Pierre I.

Dear Mrs. Oliver,

I received your letter, sent Mr. Ford last week.

I regret I'm not a genealogist. We have several pieces of Force's history, but I regret it's filed under "miscellaneous"!

My husband, John M. Force is according to our records a great-great-great grandson of Peter Force III, the Revolutionary soldier, for which the La Grange Peter Force DAR chapter is named. I suggest you might contact them for more authentic information.

We also have a history of the Force family compiled by (typewritten) Charles M. Force, Box 438 Harrisburg, Oregon 97446. He visited our home about 1978.

I do not know whether he's still living  
or not. There is a letter in the book  
from Douglas County Museum, P.O. Box,  
Roseburg, Oregon 97470 (Tel. 503/672-5961)  
The letter was written 4/6/79, signed by  
Geo. B. Abdill Director. There is much material  
in the book, but only a general index, and  
lots of personal items about Dr. Charles  
M. Force

# President Bush has connections to

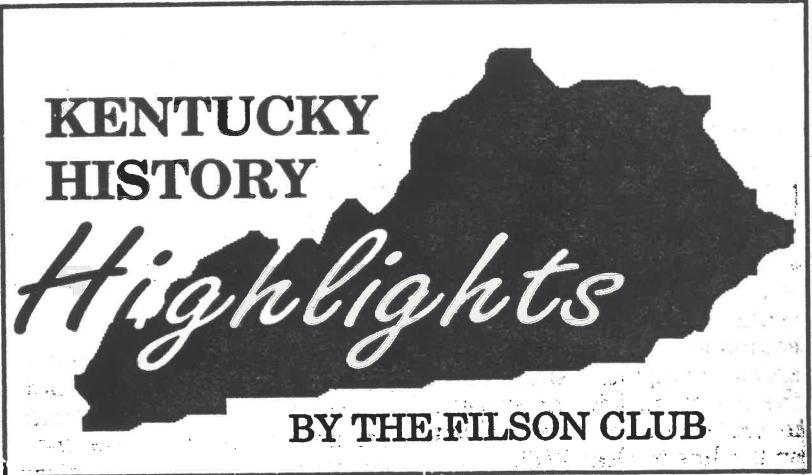
Many of us are aware that some of our past presidents are from Kentucky or have Kentucky ancestry, but it may be surprising to some to learn that George Bush is no exception. Much of the president's ancestry can be traced to New England, the mid-Atlantic states, and 17th century Virginia before his forebears moved on to Kentucky and Missouri.

On the maternal side, President Bush had four ancestors who were born in Kentucky: two great-great-grandparents (Nancy R. McCune and Joseph Holliday) and two great-great-grandparents (Lucretia Green Foree and Sarah Amanda Yancey).

Great-great-grandmother Nancy R. McCune was born in Bourbon County in 1799, the daughter of John McCune and Polly Shannon. Nancy R. McCune married Joseph Holliday.

Great-great-grandfather Joseph Holliday was born in 1789 in Kentucky, the son of William Holliday and Martha Patton Holliday of Cumberland County, Penn. William Holliday was born in Ireland, traveled to Pennsylvania and onto Kentucky. William died in Harrison County in 1812. Joseph and Nancy (McCune) Holliday were the parents of John James Holliday, born in 1819 in Pike County, Mo. John James Holliday married Lucretia Green Foree in Pike County, Mo., in May 1843.

Great-great-grandmother



Lucretia Green (Foree) Holliday was born about 1824 in Kentucky and died in Missouri.

The Foree family was of French Huguenot origin, first settling at Manakintown, Va., before coming to Kentucky. Peter and Marie (Gaudovin) Foree were the first in this family to come to Kentucky. In 1780 they settled with their family at Buddle's Station in Bourbon County.

After they arrived in Kentucky, seven of their children were captured, some by the British and some by the Indians, and taken to Detroit. The sons returned to Kentucky but two daughters remained in Detroit and married British officers. (Peter's daughter, Keziah, born in 1762, married British officer Joseph Wycoff. A transcript of a letter Keziah received from her brother Joseph in 1826 is in The Filson Club files).

Peter and Marie Foree's son, Joseph, born in 1744 in Virgin-

ia, was serving in the Revolutionary army when his parents came to Kentucky in 1780. After the war, Joseph followed his father to Kentucky in 1803 and settled in Shelby County with his wife, Ann, and family. Joseph died in Shelby County in 1835 and is buried in the cemetery on the grounds of the public library in Shelbyville.

Another of the sons of Joseph and Marie Foree was Peter G. Foree, a well-known physician in Henry County and a large landowner in Anchorage. Peter G. married Eliza Dawson in 1816 in Henry County, and they were the parents of Lucretia Green (Foree) Holliday. After the death of Eliza, Peter G. married Mary S. O'Bannon of Jefferson County and by 1833 had settled in Jefferson County near Anchorage. Peter G. died in 1839.

There are numerous Jefferson County records relating to the dispersal of his property at the time of his death. Lucretia

returned to her father's portion of which was Peter G. Foree standing to in Anchorage

Will of Peter Ford.  
(Pierre Faure)

In the Name of God Amen. I Peter For- of the Parish of King William in the county of Goochland being Sick and weak but of Perfect mind and memory and Calling to mind and Duly Considering the Uncertainty of Human life do make this my Last Will and Testament.

First and Principally I commit my Soul into the hands of my Blessed maker, Trusting in his mercies and in the Merits of my Redeemer for the Remission of all my Sins my Body I Commit to the Earth to be decently Interred at the Discretion of my Executors hereinafter mentioned as to my Temporal Estate I bequeath and Dispose of it in the following manner.

First Item. I give and bequeath to my Son James Ford the Plantation whear he now lives to him and his heirs and assigns forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my Son Peter Ford to him and his heirs forever three hundred acres of Land on Mathews Branch whear he now lives.

Item. I give and bequeath to my Son John Ford to him and his heirs forever one hundred and twenty five acres of Land whear he now lives on Jones Creek. Likewise one Negro Wench Jugg to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my Son Daniel Ford to him and his heirs forever the Plantation whear I now live being in the Manakin Ton on the River. I give to my Son Daniell one Negro boy Tom to him and his heirs forever. I give to my Son Daniell one feather bed and Furniture two Cows and Calfs one Sow and Piggs.

Item. I give and bequeath to my two daughters Judith and Mary Ford to them and their heirs forever all the Remainder of my Movable Estate to be Equally Devided between them both. If either of my daughters should Dey under the age of Twenty one Ears or not Marry the Survivor shall heir her part of the Estate.

I do Apint my Son John Ford and Daniell Ford to be Executors of this my last Will and Testament. Dated twenty ninth day of April Seventeen hundred and forty four.

PETER FORE, son of Pierre and Judith, married Marie. He sold his homeplace in 1752 to Samuel Flournoy and moved to Prince Edward County. "He went from there to Kentucky and died there in June 1780 in a Fort at Ruddles Station, on the Licking River about the time it was captured by a force of British and Indians, under the Command of Colonel Byrd. His children with him at the time, seven in number were made prisoners and taken to Detroit. The sons returned to Kentucky leading long and reputable lives; the daughters remained there, marrying officers in the British Army—Wykoff and Smith by name."

PETER FORE, born November 25, 1745, married Sallie Prier, he lived in Prince Edward County, Virginia and later settled in Kentucky. His eldest son Littleberry Fore, born in Prince Edward County, Virginia, October 5, 1767, married Mary Gwynne of Halifax County, Virginia.

SILAS FORE was born in 1770; died 1859, he married Sarah Beasley, she was born in 1773; died in 1839. Silas had been captured by Logan, the Indian Chief and retained for some time.

PETER O. FOREE

was born in Shelby Co., this state Sept. 6, 1838; his father JOSHUA FOREE was a Virginian by birth and came when a boy with his father to Ky., he resided in Shelby Co., on a farm until 1846 when he removed to Ballard Co., Ky., where he continued in agricultural pursuits till his death Feb. 16, 1880. His wife was a Miss Narcissa T. Ogden, a native of this State; she died October 20, 1877. There are but three of their children living; our subject being the youngest. By diligent home study and making the most of the limited school facilities the times afforded he was able to acquire a fair literary and good business education; he remained at home managing the home farm until thirty-six years of age when he came to Woodville and engaged in the dry good business in which he has since been interested also carrying a full line of drugs and general stock and commanding a liberal share of public patronage. Mr. Foree is reputed a gentleman of unquestionable honor and integrity and is held in high esteem by the entire community.

May 27, 1875 he married MARTHA A. RAGLAND of this Co. The union has given them three children - CHARLES O., NARCISSA A., MARY M. *(there were more children)*

During his residence in Ballard Co., he served three years as Sheriff. He is a man of public spirit and has given liberally for church and other public purposes and lent his influence to building the temperance cause.

LEWIS F. MARSHALL (Decd)

was born Oct. 29, 1825 in what was then known as Livingston Co., Ky., now Ballard. He was the fourth of four children born to JOHN & MILLEY (FIELD) MARSHALL who came to the Purchase in 1820 and settled on Island Creek near Paducah, after which they moved to Ballard Co., and settled on the Ohio River just above Mound City. They were natives of Henry County, Ky. JOHN MARSHALL was born September 29, 1774 and died in April 1830. He was the eldest son of WILLIAM MARSHALL who married ANN McCLEOD) eldest son of William Marshall eldest son of Col. William Marshall of Mechlenburg, Va. His wife was born November 2, 1788. She was a consistant member of the Baptist Church and was a woman of great piety and decision of character; those who know her most intimately loved her most affectionately.

Lewis F. Marshall was but four years old when his father died. At an early age he assumed the responsibilities of the family and engaged in rearing and buying stock and produce, and shipping south - also keeping a woodyard. Two years after his marriage he moved to a farm nine miles East which in 1881 fell to his wife from her father's estate - his mother living with him until her death. He was a life-long Democrat - possessed of sound judgment - strictly honest and upright in all his dealing; thereby acquiring the friendship and esteem of the people and was one among the first to raise and drill a Company for the Seventh Ky. Infantry which entered the Confederate Service in August 1861. He was promoted upon several occasions and was Chief Commisary Second Division First Corp Army of west Mississippi and East Louisiana and Major on Gen. Albert Rust's (who caned Greeley in Congress) Staff when he resigned on account of ill health and returned home shattered in body and spirit when he began life with renewed energy - was elected Constable two terms and in 1870 was elected

Sheriff & reelected in 1872. This proved too much for a man of his noble & generous disposition which position requires the "eyes of a hawk & the claws of a lion" to maintain & finding that he could not save a home for his family except by taking the benefit of the Bankrupt law he allowed his property to be sold at a great sacrifice & retire to private life. When his health gradually declined from hardships & want of proper remedies to build up his already infirm constitution, he died February 19, 1877 having been a member of the Masonic fraternity (Royal Arch) from early manhood belonging also to the IOOF & K of P. Although he died in obscurity he never was the man to turn a deaf ear to the wants of a fellow mortal but was ever ready with open purse & willing heart to aid & comfort all who came to him. His widow is a member of the Baptist Church.

By their union they had these children - WILLIAM P. (deceased), JOSEPH (deceased), MARY L., LEWIS F., JENNIE ESTELLA., CHAS. A., A RUST., EDWARD C., and JOSIE O.

L. F. Marshall was married November 9, 1854 to MISS MARY HELEN FOREE, a native of Shelby Co., Ky. & daughter of JOSHUA & NARCISSA YOUNG OGDEN FOREE natives of Virginia and Shelby Co. respt. Her grandfather, FOREE (Forra) was of French descent - his wife being Scotch & her grandfather OGDEN of English descent - his wife being Irish. He was a native of Maryland and descended from the House of Brunswick, was educated in Philadelphia for a lawyer. Purchasing a stock of goods he started West, intending to locate in Lexington, Ky., but all was lost there being no steamboats on the river, the Ohio river then., and upon arrival in that town he taught school, practiced law & acted as Surveyor over a large scope of Country. After his marriage (REBECCA RICE) he settled in Shelby Co., Ky., served as Captain in the late Revolutionary War after which he moved to New Castle, Henry Co., Ky., where he died.

Maj. L. F. Marshall was a direct lineal descendant from the Irish Capt. JOHN MARSHALL who distinguished himself at the siege of Calais & therefore demanded and obtained the restoration of his lost title of EARL OF PEMBROKE which took place as is said January 7, 1558.

CHIEF JUSTICE JOHN MARSHALL except Geo. Washington the greatest & best of all Americans; was of the same stock of Marshalls as is Gov. Chas. Anderson & Maj. Robert (Sumpter) Anderson, their Mother being sister of Maj. Marshall's father & their father Col. Richard Clough Anderson of Louisville, Ky. Lewis Field, grandfather of the subject of this sketch (on his Mother's side) was Indian Scout in the late Revolutionary War & could relate many thrilling adventures of frontier life. Although a staunch Democrat he was an intimate friend & boon companion of the great Pacificator, Henry Clay.

## THE HUGUENOT FAMILY OF FAURE.

Of the Army of William of Orange numbering eleven thousand which sailed from Holland and by whose aid he obtained the crown of England three regiments each containing seven hundred and fifty effective men were Huguenots. To these were added a squadron of horse. In gratitude to these zealous and effective supporters and in sympathy with the great multitude of their suffering brethren driven violently from their home and native country simply for their religion, the King invited them to make their home in his new dominions in America. A large number sought a home in Virginia, and settled along the Potomac the Rappahannock and the James River. In the year 1700 more than five hundred emigrants at the head of whom was the Marquis Oliver de la Muce, were landed in Virginia by four successive debarkations.

"Beverly's History of Virginia"

They appear to have settled at different points; a portion about Jamestown, some in Norfolk, and others in Surry, and about two hundred or more at a spot some twenty miles above Richmond, on the south side of the James River (now Powhatan Co.) where ten thousand acres of land which had been occupied by the extinct Manakin tribe of Indians were given them. They were also exempt from the payment of taxes for a period of seven years, and were allowed to support their minister in their own way. The records relating to the emigration to Virginia in 1700 of the Huguenot refugees are taken from the originals now deposited at the Bodleian Library, Oxford University, England. These originals consist of a Vellum bound MSS. endorsed.

They are undoubtedly the original documents emanating from the Provincial Government of Virginia under Francis Nicholson as they bear the official signature of Dionisius Wright, who was Secretary to the Council. We now find the name Faure under the following heading:

A list of the refugees who are to receive of ye miller of Falling Creek mill one bushell a head of Indian meale monthly as settled at or about King Williams Town, to begin in Feb. 1700-1.

FFAURE, his brother and two sisters -----4

Rolle des Francois, Suisses, Genevois, Alemans, et Flamans embarques dans le navire nomme le NASSEAU pour aller a la Virginie.

Pierre FFAURE, sa femme et un enfant.

From the above it will be seen that Pierre Faure had with him a brother and two sisters, as well as his wife and one child. The brother's name was evidently Daniel, after whom Pierre named one of his sons. The name of the two sisters cannot be ascertained.

## FAUR'E

### (The Foree Family History)

From an Article in the French Historical Magazine Reuve de Gascogne, Vol. 7, 1907 we read. "The Faure (Fo-ra') name has been prominent in France since early in the 12th Century. The family originated in Gascony, France. The first of the name known was Jean Faur'e, Senechal de Arnaguac in 1372.

In the late 1600's the first Faur'es migrated to America. One of the first of these was "Le Veure Faur'e" the widow of Jacques (James) Faur'e who died in France. She sailed from there on "The Mary & Ann" with her four children and five chests of gold, arriving at Monocantown, Virginia Colony, on July 23, 1699. Another son Pier're (Peter I) came with his wife Elizabeth on "The Nassau" with their son John, who died unmarried.

The Faur'es were French Huguenots, fleeing from religious persecution. The Governor of Virginia, by order of the King of England, donated 10,000 acres of land at Monocantown, on the James River for a Huguenot settlement. Each family was allotted 133 acres.

"Le Veure Faur'e, referred to as "The Widow" had three sons:

1. Daniel Faur'e, died in 1735. He had a son who married Mary S. Martin.
2. Jean Faur'e (1678-1709) Married Anne Reno.
3. Pier're Faur'e (Peter Foree I) (1680-1745) married a second wife, Judith Bengali.

Jean Faur'e and Anne Reno had seven children.

## THE HUGUENOT FAMILY FAURE

The Reformed Faith or Protestant movement began in Germany in 1555. The Doctrine of Reformation proclaimed by Martin Luther and John Calvin soon spread to France and made converts among the learned and titled as well as among the common people. At first, it seemed that the evangelical faith might receive tolerance, if not patronage and acceptance by the Catholic crown, but as the converts grew in great numbers Parliamentary enactments pronounced the profession of the new doctrine a crime to be punished with death, and executions for heresy became frequent.

After the Massacre of Saint Bartholomew's Day, when several Protestants assembled for worship were slaughtered, many of the Huguenots, as they were now called, fled to Holland and England. These people were welcomed; for the Protestants of southern and western France surpassed all others in the cultivation of the soil. Huguenot merchants were foremost in commercial enterprise. The foreign trade of the kingdom had been largely controlled by them. Inventive and industrious, they applied themselves with great success to the mechanical arts. The manufacture of wollen cloth, and linen goods, of serge, and silks, and sail-cloth, the iron-works, paper mills, and tanneries that enriched France at this period, were founded or promoted chiefly by Protestants. In every department of labor, they were fitted to excel by their morality, intelligence, and thrift. The truthfulness and honesty of the Huguenot became proverbial.

France attempted to place colonies in Brazil, Florida and Canada. In some cases, Huguenots were allowed to establish colonies in the New World. The colony in Brazil did not flourish. The Huguenots in Florida were murdered by Spanish Catholics. The colony in Canada was successful until the Jesuits were given control of the colony. In

1633, Canada was closed to Protestants and permanent residence was granted to none but French Catholics. This repressive policy weakened the colony and brought doom to the French Colonial System.

Most of the French seamen were Huguenots and they forced all persons transported by them to attend the Protestant service held aboard ship. Catholics objected most vehemently. The most objectionable part of the heretical worship was the singing. It so happened that a priest and a minister died about the same time in the Canadian Colony so the sailors who buried them put them in the same grave "to see if they, who could not agree whilst alive would dwell together in peace while dead".

A few of the French Kings showed some tolerance of the Huguenots and the Edict of Nantes expressly provided for the security of the Protestants in all their lawful avocations. However, almost all Catholic monarchs, influenced by the Jesuits and Franciscans paid little attention to the Edict and were adamant in carrying out their persecution of the Protestants.

Louis XIV. carried out to the letter the counsels of his spiritual advisors, attempting to make amends for his kingly vices by crushing heresy. On October 22, 1685, he revoked the Edict of Nantes. Protestant places of worship were immediately demolished. The "temple" of Milhaud was demolished because some of the Huguenots, on their way by boat to the service, had sung psalms aloud. Children could not be instructed in the Protestant religion and were often taken from their parents. Property and businesses were confiscated, people were tortured and starved. The King quartered soldiers in the private homes of the Protestants. The soldiers, in order to compel these people to turn Catholic, "did all that soldiers are accustomed to do in an enemy's country, for the purpose of forcing their hosts

to give up their money, or to reveal the place where they had hidden their goods. They spared neither, men; women, nor children; neither the poor, nor the sick, nor aged."<sup>1</sup> The ingenuity of a desperate people was taxed to the utmost to devise methods of escape. Those that lived near the sea would attempt to conceal themselves in bales of merchandise, or under loads of charcoal, or in empty hogsheads. Others were stowed in the holds of vessels. The King ordered guards to prevent the escape of the oppressed, but often guards allowed many persons to pass, some out of sympathy, others out of greed. They shared in the profits with the ship masters who charged enormous fares for passage. On the landward side of the kingdom the Huguenots would disguise themselves as ragged peasants, driving cattle, or carrying bundles, as if on their way to market. They attempted by any means possible to flee to Holland and England where they were welcomed and given protection.

The English crown had great need of the skills of the Huguenot artisans and willingly gave them protection. In turn, the Huguenots expressed their appreciation by fighting for the crown and were as loyal as the British themselves.

Of the Army of William of Orange numbering eleven thousand which sailed from Holland and by whose aid he obtained the crown of England, three regiments each containing seven hundred and fifty effective men were Huguenots. To these were added a squadron of horse. In gratitude to these zealous and effective supporters and in sympathy with the great multitude of their suffering brethren driven violently from their home and native country simply for their religion, the King invited them to make their home in his new dominions in America. A large

number sought a home in Virginia, and settled along the Potomac, the Rappahannock and the James River. In the year 1700, more than five hundred emigrants at the head of whom was the Marquis Oliver de la Muce, were landed in Virginia by four successive debarkations.<sup>2</sup>

About two hundred Huguenot emigrants settled at a spot some twenty miles above Richmond on the south side of the James River (now Powhatan County) where ten thousand acres of land which had been occupied by the extinct Manakin tribe of Indians were given them. They were exempt from the payment of taxes for a period of seven years and were allowed to support their minister in their own way.

In the benevolent atmosphere of this King William Parish, Pierre Faure, the widow Faure, and other members of the Faure family worked and made homes and worshiped in their chosen religion. The names of Peter Faure, Daniel Faure, Jean Faure, names of the original Faure children who came on the ships Mary Ann and Nasseau are listed as tithables in the years beginning 1710 through 1738, and in 1718 the Senior Daniel Faure was unanimously chosen to serve as vestryman. On July 23, 1731, Pierre Faure took the oath of vestryman.

The lineage of the Faure family in America begins with the widow Faure who arrived with four children in James Town, Virginia, July 31, 1700, on the ship, Mary Ann out of London and commanded by George Hawes. The ship record reads: "La vefve faure et quatre enfants".  
(The widow Faure and four children)

The fate of her husband, Daniel, is unknown. In the conflicting accounts, one states he was Jacques Faure, born around 1655-65 and died in 1700, before the family

embarked on it's voyage to America. Another says he died aboard ship during the journey.

The widow Faure may have been Anne Tiabault. The following is from Bairds, Huguenot Emigration to America, page 188, "Daniel Faure, son of Isaac and Anne Tiabault of St. Jean d' Angily diocese of La Rochelle, a soldier called Laprairie, made abjuration in April, 1685".

The children arriving with the widow Faure were sons, Daniel, Jean, and perhaps two daughters. In a document emanating from the Provincial Government of Virginia under Francis Nicholson, the name Faure appears under the following heading: "a list of the refugees who are to receive of ye miller of Falling Creek mill one bushell a head of Indian meal monthly as settled at or about King Williams Town to begin Feb. 1700-1

FFAURE, his brother and two sisters ----- 4

No further account of the daughters has been found.

Pierre Faure, son of the widow Faure arrived on the ship Nasseau with his wife, Elizabeth and son Jean. Pierre was naturalized as a member of the Colony, May 12, 1705. On June 1, 1709, (Court Order Book, 1707-1709, page 154) Pierre Faure petitioned for 150 acres of land due him for emportation of himself, his wife, Elizabeth and one child.

After his wife, Elizabeth died he married Judith. They had five children: Jacques, Pierre, Daniel, Judith and Mary. His first son, Jean, died unmarried and left his estate to his brothers and sisters. Pierre was on the Vestry and a Church Warden of the Manakin Church in Parish King William from 1731 to 1744, at which time he requested and was granted a discharge. His wife, Judith died before he made his will, April 29, 1744. His will was proved April 16, 1745, Goochland County, Virginia and was signed, Peter Ford.

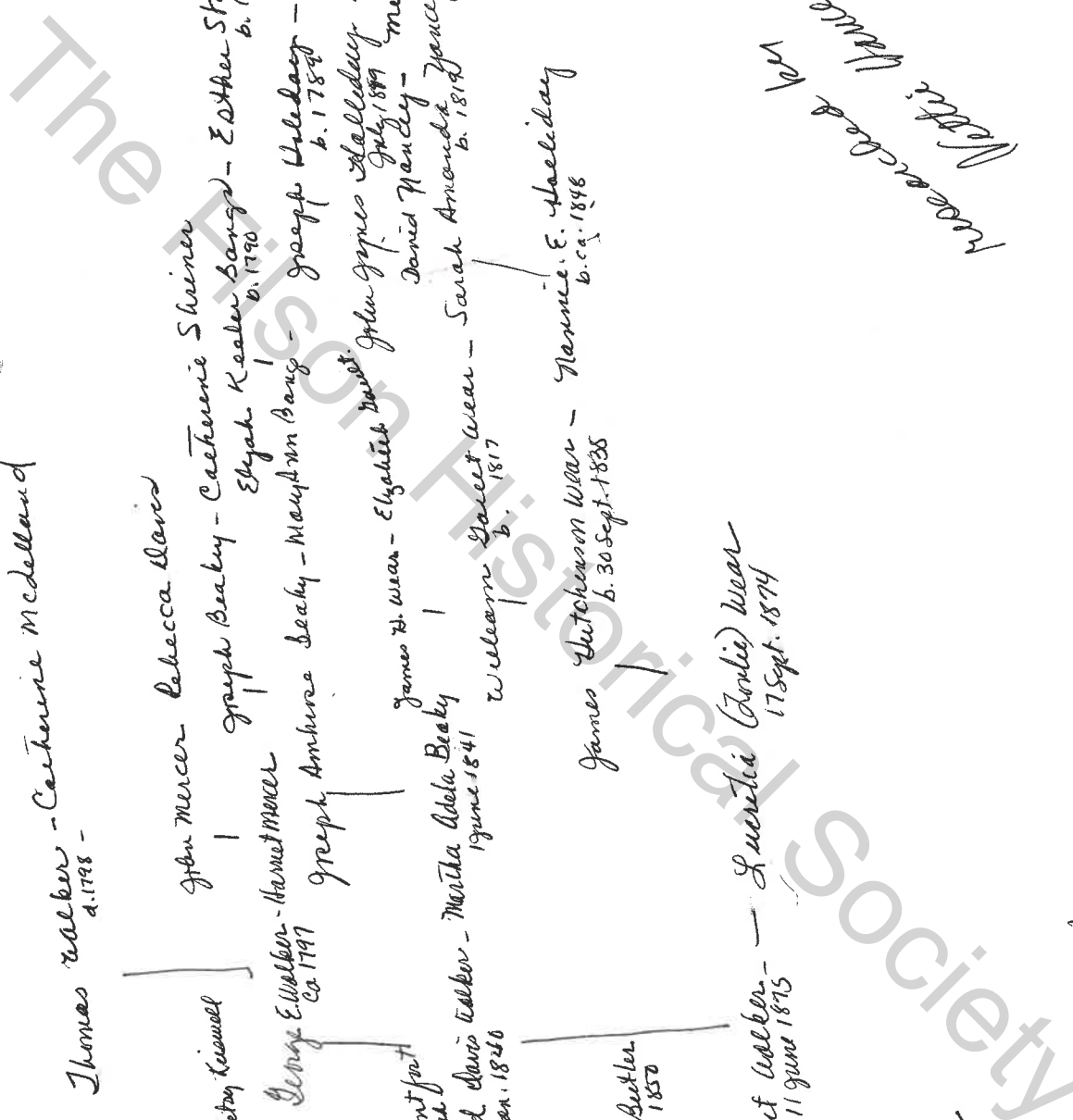

When first platted the city occupied but a small part of number one in the Grant. This was land owned by Isaac Bowman, of Shenandoah county, Virginia. To sell his tract he disposed of this portion through his attorney, John Gwathmey, of Jefferson county, Kentucky, June 23, 1802, to Marston Green Clark, William Goodwin, Richard Pile, Davis Floyd, and Samuel Gwathmey as trustees to lay off a town and sell lots, all monies accruing from such sales to be used in establishing ferries and improving the facilities of the new town. John Gwathmey laid off the town, consisting of one hundred and fifty acres on the lower part of number one of the Grant. The boundaries as platted were as follow :

Beginning at a stake on the bank of the Ohio river, running thence up the river and binding thereon north seventy-seven degrees east seventy-five poles, to a stake on the bank; thence north forty-eight degrees east one hundred and fifty-two poles to a small locust; thence from the river north thirty-seven and one-half degrees west one hundred poles to a stake at the northeast corner; thence at right angles south thirty-two and one-half degrees west one hundred and seventy-four poles to the northwest corner; thence south thirteen degrees east ——— poles to the beginning.

Two acres of this plat were reserved for use as a public square, adjoining lots seventy six and seventy-eight on the west; lots eighty-nine and seventy-seven on the east, lots one hundred and four, one hundred and five, and one hundred and six on the north, and Market street on the south.

In 1836 an association of several persons was formed, called the Jeffersonville association, which made an addition to the town, of land owned by Peter G. Fore. A second addition was made in 1839. The eastern division was platted by the same association in 1841, and Benson's addition was platted by Samuel Church in 1848. The latter two were a part of survey number two, and comprised sixty-one acres. Jeffersonville city now occupies the whole of number one of the Illinois Grant, containing five hundred and forty acres, besides the sixty-one acres already mentioned as belonging to number two.

The original plan of the town was changed by act of the Legislature in 1817, which allowed the alternate lots that were reserved on the Jefferson plan to be sold.

The streets of the city are unusually wide, being sixty feet in most cases, with forty feet

driveway between the curbing, and nearly all paved and macadamized. Court avenue and one or two other streets are one hundred feet in width. By action of the city council an ordinance was passed in October, 1881, requiring property owners to plant and maintain shade trees in front of their respective lots throughout a great part of the city. The old Market square, at the northeast corner of Spring street and Court avenue, was ordered improved, and a thirty foot street laid off on the north side of the park, which has just been done. The park has been graded, walks laid out, fences built, trees and shrubs planted, and has been christened Warder Park, in honor of the present mayor of the city.

The town of Jeffersonville was laid off in 1802 by John Gwathmey and others, its government being vested in a board of trustees, which appointed its own successors. Under this government it remained until January, 1839, when a resolution was introduced in the State Legislature by the then representative of Clark county, Dr. Nathaniel Field, authorizing its incorporation as a city. An act in conformity with this resolution was passed, and on his return to Jeffersonville, Dr. Field, as president of the board of trustees, called a meeting, at which an election was ordered to be held in April for the choice of mayor and ten councilmen. The city was divided into five wards. The election resulted in the choice of Isaac Heiskill as mayor, at a salary of \$50 per annum. The trustees turned their records over to the city authorities, and as a power in the government they ceased to exist.

The population of the city in 1839 was five hundred and eighteen. The present population is something over ten thousand. Previous to the war it was about seven thousand.

In the suburbs of the city proper are several small towns. Port Fulton on the east, Ohio Falls city on the west, and Claysburg on the north. The latter was platted by Dr. N. Field, who owned eight acres of land at that place, Colonel William Riddle two and one-half acres, and Edmund Schon, seven acres. It received its name in honor of Cassius M. Clay. These suburban towns add much to the apparent size of Jeffersonville, but as they are not included within the present corporate limits, do not count in an estimate of the population of the city.

had four named issues. Nicholas Dawson was a private in the Revolutionary War in the Pennsylvania Volunteer Militia from Westmoreland Co., Pa. in the Second Moravian Campaign" against the Indians. L.O. Dawson writes a long story of his war service, especially under Col. William Crawford who was tortured and burned at the stake by Indians. (This Nicholas Dawson is listed in the DAR PATRIOT INDEX, p. 181.)

HENRY DAWSON, Lieutenant, Quartermaster, Virginia, son of George Dawson (3-4) and Eleanor Ann (Lowe) Dawson, b. 22 Aug. 1747 Prince George's County, Maryland, died 11 Oct. 1815 Clarke Co., Ohio. Quoting L.O. Dawson: "It is believed that Henry was married more than once. His first wife was undoubtedly Maria Wells. . . Maria died in 1792, apparently before Henry migrated to Ohio. His next wife seems to have been Constantine Sanford. . . 29th of June 1805, Constantine, wife of Henry died." Ten issues are named but not say who the mother of each was. "Henry served in the Continental Army during the Revolutionary War from 16 December 1776 to 8 April 1783, having been recruited by Col. William Crawford from western Pennsylvania for the 13th Virginia Regiment of which Col. Crawford was made commander. Early in his military service he was made a Sergeant in Capt. Benjamin Harrison's Company, 13th Virginia Regiment, commanded by William Russell. He was commissioned Ensign 31 October 1778 and transferred to Col. John Gibson's 7th Virginia Regiment, afterwards designated the 9th Virginia Regiment. He claimed the rank of Lieutenant from 1 January 1780 to the end of his service, and was given rank of Quartermaster on 4 March 1780. Most of his service was at Fort Pitt." His grave is marked by the SAR. (Charles C. Dawson has no discussion of this Henry Dawson.) (The DAR PATRIOT INDEX p. 181, gives his wife's name as Maria Wells.) (Henry Dawson is listed in Gwathmey: HISTORICAL REGISTER OF VIRGINIANS IN THE REVOLUTION.) The writer of Volume I and Volume II of DAWSONS IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR has found in many years of correspondence with descendants claiming to be from this line, that no one can locate definite records about his wife or wives, nor for sure the issues of which marriage if more than one marriage. Of interest could be the DAR papers of a Mrs. Minnie (Holliday) Nave No. 19316 who joined the DAR in 1897 (note date) in St. Joseph, Mo. from Lt. Henry Dawson and MISS SANDFORD. Except for spelling of Sandford, the few facts and dates and lineage from Lt. Dawson seem correct. . . from Samuel Dawson (5-76), then his daughter, Elizabeth (Dawson) Foree (6-226).

JOHN DAWSON, Private, Pennsylvania, son of George Dawson (3-4) and Eleanor Ann (Lowe) Dawson, b. 23 Feb. 1749 Frederick (now Montgomery) Co., Md., d. 21 Oct. 1845 Urbana, Ohio, Champaign Co., m. Elizabeth (Harrison). They had lived in Kentucky 18 or 19 years. (Was it Bourbon Co.?) Nine issues are named. Lee Orval Dawson is one of his descendants. John Dawson "served in the army from Pennsylvania during the Revolutionary War. He was in the Pennsylvania Militia, having been in a draft from Westmoreland County in April or May of 1778. . . John's discharge came near the close of December 1778 or in early January of 1779." He received a pension (\$8296) in Champaign Co., Ohio, filed 5 April 1834. (This John Dawson is listed in the DAR PATRIOT INDEX, Volume II, p. 54.)

There are four other Dawsons, some definitely from this line and some whose CLAIMED Revolutionary War service should be checked. They are:

EDWARD DAWSON, Private, 7th Pennsylvania Regiment (see his special report in Volume II.) (No mention of Revolutionary War service by L.O. Dawson.)

ELIJAH DAWSON, Private, Virginia (see his special report in Volume II.) (No mention of Revolutionary War service by L.O. Dawson.)

WILLIAM DAWSON, son of William Dawson (3-3) and Elizabeth (Marbury) Dawson, b. 1738 in Prince George's Co., Md., d. 1802 Allegany Co., Md., m. Elizabeth (surname unknown). "She may have been Elizabeth George." Four named sons. Though Lee Orval Dawson discusses him on p. 32-3, he does NOT cite any kind of Revolutionary War service for him. However, old S/f and DAR papers claim descent from (4-16), (5-46) and (6-130); some claim ing Patriotic Service, Maryland, and some saying Private, Maryland. The entry in the DAR PATRIOT INDEX, p. 181: "William Dawson b. ca1738, d. 1802 m. Elizabeth - Patriotic Service, Maryland," is probably from the DAR. Though all the papers definitely are from this line, the claimed Revolutionary War service should be checked.

NICHOLAS DAWSON, according to DAR papers taken out in 1928 by Henrietta Dawson (Ayles) Sheppard who is named on p. 51 of the L.O. Dawson book, she claims Nicholas Dawson (4-8) who married Elizabeth (Bayne) as her Revolutionary War ancestor. Because of what she wrote in her DAR paper she has her descent right, but the writer of Volume II thinks she has the wrong Nicholas Dawson which should be (4-14) Nicholas Lowe Dawson. . . and she NOT descended from him. Quoting from her DAR papers: "My ancestor Nicholas Dawson, patriot in the War of 1776, first sent a substitute in the Revolutionary War, being a man of commercial importance, as shown in the records in the clerk's office of Frederick, Maryland, March 3, 1778, he with others, including his brothers, Thomas, Benony and Robert, took the patriotic Oath of Fidelity and Support." Question: Has she not confused her Nicholas Dawson (4-8) with Nicholas Lowe Dawson (4-14) who had brothers, Benony and Robert Doayne Dawson, and all sons of Thomas Dawson (3-2)? Were the papers carefully checked in 1928? (The DAR PATRIOT INDEX, p. 181 has "Nicholas Dawson, b. 6-14-1750, d. 3-18-1806, m. Elizabeth Bayne, Patriotic Service, Maryland.") Lee Orval Dawson cites no Revolutionary War service for Nicholas Dawson (4-8) nor does Charles Carroll Dawson.

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Quoting from a letter dated 29 August 1982 from Lee O. Dawson: "Y raised the question whether Henrietta Dawson Ayles Sheppard referred to the wrong Nicholas Dawson in her record of descendency from a Revolutionary ancestor. I am sure she was a descendant of Nicholas Dawson (4-8) and her descent follows through Samuel Dawson (5-9), Elizabeth Hack Dawson Ayres (6-9) to Henrietta Dawson. No. 1 and her husband Harper Donald Sheppard.

I have also given to my daughter four negroes and their increase. The above named tract of land and the negroes with their increase are given to my daughter, Mary, to be held by her during her natural life and at her death to pass and belong fee simple to her children.
5. I give and bequeath to my daughter, Alpha, wife of R. Brown, the land I purchased of the heirs of William Derritt supposed to contain about 200 acres and the same tract upon which R. Brown now lives. I also give to my daughter, Alpha, 2 negroes which I value at \$600.00. I also give to my daughter, Alpha, \$1000.00 to make her equal to my daughter, Mary. The land I have hereby devised to my daughter, Alpha, is given to her during her natural life time and at her death to pass and to belong absolutely to her children.
6. I give to my daughter, Frances, about 300 acres of land, adjoining the lands of Augustin Beasley and James Walker and make a conveyance in trust of the same to her since I made the conveyance the land has been sold and the money invested in a tract of land lying on the New Castle and Eminence Turn Pike and I deeded to my daughter by W. N. Gist to be held by her as she held the first land given to her. I have also given my daughter a girl named Minnie and her increase and \$500.00 in cash. All of the above property given to my daughter, Frances, to be held by her during her natural life and at her death to pass to her children and if she should die without children the same to revert back to the estate.
7. If any of my children should die without leaving children or grandchildren then that portion of my estate devised to return and become a part of my general estate.



COPY OF THE LETTER WRITTEN BY JOSEPH FORE TO HIS SISTER, KEZIAH,  
Referred to in the Faure Family History

Shelby County, Kentucky  
June 24, 1826

Dear Beloved Sister,

I am in possession of your address written December 15, which only came to hand the 20th of the present month, and it afford me no small degree of pleasure to receive it, and learn that you are yet spared upon the land of the living. Though there is pain, mingled with joy when I learn of your losses in the way of family, yet I know it is what we all expect, and I hope that you will exercise that cool philosophy which we all are commanded to do. He or she who hath, can only lose, and death we know is the final end to all who live on this earth, and your loss may have been their gain.

I have not heard one word from you for years, and when I look at your address and discover that you have intention of visiting your brother, it make my heart leap with joy in anticipation to it. How happy it would make me feel if we should live to realize the moment. If your family condition would admit of it. I would like for you to stay some considerable time, or to make your home with me for life. I now stand alone as it was the will of the Almighty God to take your sister from me the 30 of J 1823.

My children as yet all living, save my son, Joseph, who departed this life in 1815. My daughter, Nancy, lives in the state of Tennessee, 300 miles distant from us. Rebecca, my youngest daughter, save Virginia, lives in Christian County, Kentucky, 230 miles from me. The balance of my children are all within 15 miles of me and are well, with their families as far as I know. My youngest son, Jefferson, is yet single and lives with me.

This will start for you while I am in health and thanks be to God, in my proper mind, which I pray Almighty to continue with me whilst I remain on earth, and matter and life connected. I hope you will be sure to make your intended visit to Kentucky.

Our brothers, as far as I know, are yet all living. Brother Peter has lost his wife though he lives himself on the farm where you last saw him. Silas lives near Peter and Jesse is where he lived when you were in Ky. Brother John is yet in Georgia, and Frank in Tennessee. Our sister, Mary, is not too far distant from Natchez.

You will be so good to present my love to each of your children as uncle to them, and accept for yourself the undivided love of your old brother.

Praying that we may meet again on the shore of time, but if it should be the will of God to order differently that we may be of the goodly number we will hear our heavenly Father say, "Come, enter in, thou good and faithful servant, enjoy the crown that fadeth not, laid up for thee from the foundation of the earth." O may it be with all of us when we may see and know all of ours. When there will be no further parting. May this be our happy lot is my concern.

Remember each of my children, as they wish, to yourself and family.

and was elected Judge of Shelby Co., in 1854, in which county he remained Judge for 16 yrs. In 1871 he represented Shelby Co. in the State Legislature. July 8, 1846, he married Miss Mary P. Marshall, a native of Va. (Related to Chief Justice John Marshall), who died 1882, the mother of four children: Pryor Jr., Charles Marshall, Susan B., and Sallie J. The Judge is a Royal Arch Mason and in 1874 was elected Grand High Priest of the State of Ky.

Mrs. Lydia Posey was born in Henry County, Ky., a daughter of John P. and Elizabeth Thommason Foree. Her father, a native of Va., came to Ky., with his father, Peter Foree (1744-1844) about 1780 and was a soldier in the war of 1812. Her grandfather, Peter Foree, native of Va., served for a short time in the Rev. War. Her grandmother was Sallie Pryor of Va., etc.

A little more information about a son of Peter Foree III, Augustine Pryor Foree, who after his father died inherited him, wrote the name Foree, as he thought it should be written. As has been stated he studied medicine at the Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia, Pa. The story goes that once enroute on horseback to college he stopped for the night in Greenville, Tenn. During the night the innkeeper roused him and said, "Mr. Philip Hale's daughter, Elizabeth Douglas, was very ill and wanted a doctor immediately". "I haven't graduated," said young Dr. Foree, "but I'll go and do what I can". He stayed several weeks and succeeded in breaking her ailment, but had a harder time over-coming her inertia and lack of interest in living. Finally he hit upon the idea of reading to her each night a chapter of the then popular novel "Evelina". After each reading he would pocket the book and ride away. She became so interested that she promptly got well. When I, as a young girl, read this quaint old book in the Congressional Library, because of this story, I wondered how it could have aroused anyone from lethargy, but perhaps it was a thriller in those days! Strange to say the young doctor did not fall a victim to the charms of his patient, reputed to be very beautiful, but soon Charles Fleming Keith did and married her. Years later Dr. Foree's only daughter, Sarah, married her son, Alexander H. Keith.

Record states his military service was entered from Surrey Co., North Carolina and states that he was born on Oct. 23 of the year 1744 in Cumberland Co., Pa. (This is a mistake) He was born in Virginia. This pension was issued on Jan. 31, 1834. He died March 20, 1844.

Force (Force) Silas- Virginia # 3650

Silas Force was 78 yrd. when he applied for a pension. He states he was born in Prince Edward Co., Va., on Jan. 1, 1766. Said his mother died soon after his birth, leaving 13 children, among whom was Hezekiah, John, Judith, Polly, Keziah, Martha. He came with his father to Ky. in 1777 and settled at Martin's Station, Bourbon, Co., (3 or 4 miles from Paris, Ky.) He volunteered in 1778 (March) to serve against the Indians at the age of 12 yrs. In June 1778 his father died and he was mustered to defend the fort. He became a prisoner to the British and was taken to Detroit and kept there until the summer of 1782. Among others taken prisoner and taken North was Mrs. La Force. Silas he returned to Va. after the Revolution to Prince Edward Co. where he lived 4 or 5 years and then married and moved to Notaway Co., Va., where he lived until 1803 or 4 when he moved to Shelby co., Ky.--stayed 1 year and then settled permanently near New Castle, Ky., Henry Co., Ky.

"T. P. Force was born in Henry Co., Ky., Dec. 1, 1817, a son of Peter and Nancy Toole. Peter was born in North Carolina in 1783. He was the son of another Peter Force who married Sallie Pryor of Virginia. They were of French descent. Mr. Force is considered one of the most extensive and successful farmers in the county, owns over a thousand acres of land near New Castle, Ky. etc., etc."

"Joseph P. Force (some more notes about him)

He was educated at Shelby College and Transylvania University, from which he graduated from the law dept. in 1843. He went to Miss. and became Judge of the probate court in Tallahatchie Co. in 1845 and in 1848 he represented that county in the Miss. State Legislature. In 1852 he returned to Ky. and

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Dr. Pryor Foree, 8th. son of Peter and Sarah Pryor Foree, was unmarried. He served on Andrew Jackson's staff, as a surgeon, in the war of 1812 and died just the day before the Battle of New Orleans. He was buried on the plains of \_\_\_\_\_ New Orleans, La.

Peter Foree IV, born in N. Carolina, in 1783, lived to be 98 yrs. old and his wife, Nancy Toole Foree was 97 yrs. of age. They were my father's grandparents. Joseph Toole, Nancy's nephew, was the first governor of Montana. My mother remembers well her mother's "Aunt Nancy" and "Uncle Peter".

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both lived near his father's home (old McGinnis place). He was a victim of the cholera epidemic then raging in Ky. and died at his brother, John's. He is buried at the old William Foree graveyard, at Christiansburg according to Mrs. Sommerfield, though I wonder if it wasn't at one of the family graveyards on Peter III's, Peter IV's or John Pryor's farms. Old Peter lived until 1844.

In 1906 Aunt Edna Brown and Sister Alpha visited at the old Keith home near Athens, Tenn., then owned by Alexander Keith, grand-son of Dr. Augustine Pryor Foree, which was the spelling he used after leaving his father's home. Marshall Keith now owns the old place and has made a regular show place of it.

Gov. James Frazier of Tenn., is to blame for my getting bitten by the genealogy bug. She wrote some years ago and was so glad to learn what grandmother had told me about Peter III's branch of Forees. She has helped me trace our Foree forebears back to 1699, when our ancestors, L'Veuve Faure, a Huguenot widow, arrived in America. Mrs. Sommerville is a veteran genealogist and I must confess to having caught some of her enthusiasm. I find it an interesting hobby and one which Kitty's and John Foree's children may thank me some day. The Foree, Brown, Chenault lines are all traced back to the first ancestors in America.

Celia was the only daughter of Peter III and Sarah Pryor Foree. She, too, must have died before Peter's will was written in 1839, because the legacy is left to "my grandson, Wm. Jean's children". Maybe some day we can learn something about Celia's descendants.

My grandmother, Lydia Foree Posey, was born at the home of her parents Elizabeth (Betsy) Thomason and John Pryor Foree, on Jan. 12, 1814, on the Drennon Springs road about 5 miles from New Castle, Henry County, Ky. She was the eldest of a large family of children. When she was 17, she fell in love with a young carpenter, William Bullard, as had her grand-mother, Sally Pryor Foree. Incidentally young William made the handsome carved mantles that are at Peter IV's "Old Homestead" farm, now owned by Alfred Foree on the Campbellsburg road, north of New Castle. Lydia Foree married Wm. in 1831 and the wedding party rode horseback to his home at Bullard's cross-roads, Shelby Co. In my mother's memoirs, published in the Shelby News in 1952-53, she tells much of her mother's subsequent life - of how she was left a widow with small children and thirty or more slaves who had to be provided for and directed with tact and firmness. For further information about grandmother Lydia Foree (Bullard, Slaughter, Posey) see "Down Memory's Lane" written by Sarah Posey Brown. Grandmother lived to be 93 yrs. of age - Madison was President (the 4th. Pres.) when she was born. She had many, many friends, both black and white. Because of her business ability, thrift and good management, we enjoy the farm home she left to my mother. She used to despise waste and often said "Save every way you can and you will always have something to give to those in need."

She was most generous always and so hospitable that she always had friends, neighbors and relatives in her home. It was she who had given me much of the family history before I ever came in contact with any family genealogists or did any research myself.

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and didn't have. She and my mother were congenial and we children were highly entertained by their conversation.

One day she said, "Sarah, you are an aristocrat." "No; My mother said, "you are an aristocrat and I am a democrat". Which reminds me of Mother's answer to Roy Martin when he said one day, in reply to her, an assumption that something was not democratic, "Mrs. Brown, don't you know Democracy is dead?" (This was at the beginning of World War II) "Not as long as I live" said Mother. Cousin Elizabeth's eastern accent was highly appreciated by us little country cousins. She would call, over the bannister, "Oh! Posey, come and fasten me up!" and when she had to hold her breath in order for hooks and eyes to meet, she would exclaim, "Oh! that wicked cream!" "I must cut that amount I eat of it in half." When she saw tenants gathering wild greens she said, "Oh! Sarah, do the poor things have to eat grass?" Dr. Henry Garey of Baltimore was nationally and inter-nationally famous eye specialist.

The 2nd. son of Peter Foree III (1744-1844) and his wife Sarah Pryor Foree was Julius Foree, who married a Miss Brashears before the family moved to Ky. In Peter III's will, written in 1839, he speaks of "Marjery" (hard to read the writing) wife of my brother, Julius Foree, deceased. In all the records there is no reference to Peter III having a brother Julius and I believe it was copied incorrectly and should read, "wife of my son Julius". The next item in Peter III's will says, "I will give to Alpha Johnson, my grand-daughter and wife of William Johnson of Tenn. the sum of \$500.00 in money". Julius Foree and his wife, Marjery had a daughter, Alpha, who married William Johnson of Tenn. on Nov. 23, 1818. (See marriage records at New Castle Court House). Julius Foree, son of Peter III had died prior to his father's will written in 1839.

The 3rd. son of Peter Foree III and Sally Pryor Foree was Joseph. He married Fanny Sanford. Marriage records at the New Castle Court House in 1955 state: Joseph Foree, Elizabeth Sanford and give the date 9-27-1869. Could Joseph have married twice or could his wife's name been Frances Elizabeth? Two of the children are named Thomas Foree and Frances P. Foree. We know that Joseph died before 1818 or in that year because the records at New Castle, Ky., speak of the estate of Joseph Foree, deceased, and mention that W.P. Foree is administrator in Oct. 1818. I quote: To John Foree expenses to go to Cincinnati to settle above estate. To Dr. P. Foree for medical services for family of Joseph Foree-\$44.00. To John Rodman for making coffin for Jos. Foree-\$34.00. Joseph Foree's heirs- Wm. Foree, Guardian to: Augustine, Frances P., Preston B, and Thos. S. infant heirs. (Acct. to 1825 of guardianship.)

Dr. Augustine Pryor Foree (so many in the family took the name, Pryor, of their mother, daughter of Augustine Pryor of Virginia) Uncle Augustine wanted to study medicine as a young man. I don't know if his brother, Pryor, was younger or older than he. According to his great grand-daughter, Keith Frazier Sommerville (daughter of Louise Keith and Gov. James Frazier of Tenn., and D. A. R. Regent of Mississippi) Peter III was an irascible old guy and very much opposed to Augustine's being a doctor. I guess he thought one doctor son was enough. Peter's brother, William, however, encouraged and gave financial aid to nephew Augustine, and doctor he was. Peter was so angry that he cut young Augustine with out a penny. A deed book at New Castle Court House records the transfer from Peter to son, Augustine, in lieu of affection etc. "one pewter dish." Augustine left his father's home never to return, went to Tenn. and married the charming young widow, Nancy Pugh Monroe. In 1840 he came back to Ky. to see his daughter, Sarah Foree, then in school at Science Hill, Shelbyville, Ky. While here he visited his brothers, John and Pryor and Peter Foree IV,

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He had a son, Joseph "Lud" Foreep 1812-1863 whose 1st. wife had no children. His 2nd. wife, Ellen H. McComas of Natchez had 5 children. They were Cul Foree (bachelor), Ella, Amy, Joseph L. and Mary who married Seaborn McDowell and died in California in 1904.

Silas Foree youngest child of Pierre and Marie, was born in 1766. I quote from Dr. Greely's Faure chart: Silas emigrated with his father to Ky. when just a boy where he was captured by the British and Indians together, with his sisters, Judith and Keziah, and one brother. The Indian chief, Logan, is said to have taken a fancy to him, he admired the boy's courage, adopted him and took him to Canada. A British Officer, in some way, got possession of him there and sold him to a Scotchman. Altogether Silas Foree spent 7 years among the Indians and British Canadians, and at the close of the war for Independence, came back to Virginia where he married and settled in Nottoway Co. In 1803 he moved to Shelby Co., Ky., and then again to Henry Co. He and his wife reared a family of 4 daughters and 6 sons, all of whom became farmers; he was one of the volunteers who enlisted under Washington to quell the Whiskey Rebellion in Pennsylvania. He received a pension as a soldier in the war of 1812. A great-grandson, Kenneth Foree, lives in Dallas, Texas. His father, Silas, was a son of the first Silas.

Some notes about various ones in the family:

Dr. Pryor Foree, son of Littleberry, was the first millionaire (the last, too, as far as I know) in the family and one of the first in the U.S. He lived in Cincinnati, Ohio. Grandmother Posey that they didn't enjoy their visits to Cousin Pryor's much- the atmosphere too cold and gloomy and I imagine rather formal. His daughter, Mary, married Ed Anderson of Cincinnati, uncle of Nicholas Longworth who married Alice Roosevelt. When our cousin, Louise Keith Sommerville of Miss. met him in Washington, some years ago, he had some interesting things to tell them about "Aunt Mary".

Peter Gwynn Foree, was the last of the Peters in our branch of the family. He was a handsome, charming fellow much in love with his pretty cousin, Elizabeth Garey of Baltimore. I don't know why they did not marry unless the family opposed. He later married Lula Gray and died at the age of 33 yrs.

Alfred P. Foree present owner of the "Old Homestead" farm, 2 miles north of New Castle, Ky., son of Peter Gwynn and Lula. His great-grandfather, Peter IV, built the beautiful brick house around 1810 and it is still a beautiful residence today. We love the old place because it was our great-grandfather's home where our grandmother, Alpha Foree Brown, was born and married and because we have had many happy times there as children.

(Note added to this history by Virginia Foree Smith (Scott) Stivers:

"The Old Homestead Farm" was bought from the other heirs by John Mansir Foree, son of Alfred P. Foree and Lillian Mansir, at his father's death and now (1967) he, John Mansir, his wife (Bina Baird) two sons live there. These two boys, Baird and Robert, are the sixth generation of Forees to live in this old home successively."

Henry Garey of Baltimore, dignified, stern, severe, was father of our beloved Cousin Elizabeth Garey who came to visit us for 3 mos. in 1913 and stayed for 3 yrs. She paid \$5.00 a week board, a good sum for those days, and my mother, with the money, got many things we needed

Thomas Jefferson Fore, No. 11 above married a Tulley. Their daughter, Sarah Ware Fore married Reuben Shaddock. She was a governess in Cousin Lydia's (my grandmother's) family and taught Reuben, William, and Jimmie Bullard. This Mrs. Shaddock had a daughter, Amelia, who married a Hughes and lived near Pleasureville. Mrs. Hughes daughter, Gladys has two sons.

Joseph Fore wrote to his sister, Keziah, in 1826. The letter was sent some years to Mrs. Sommerville by Keziah's descendent, Myrtle Owen, Cable, Warren, Penn. (See typed copy of this interesting old letter, sent to me by Mrs. Sommerville, following the last page of this history.

The reverend Douglas made a mistake (he does sometimes) in the following:

"March 25, 1745, Pierre Faur, son of Pierre and Marie". This is our Revolutionary War Peter and he gives his age in his pension record as Oct. 25, 1744. Also on his tombstone found at old Foree burying ground, N. of New Castle on the Campbellsburg road is this date--"Peter Foree d. March 20, 1844, aged 99½ years. Many of the children and grandchildren say he was 99½ yrs. old, my grandmother for one. His age has been a wonder and admiration in the family history.

He is listed under Heads of Families in Virginia, compiled in year 1782, on page 14 as: "Peter Fore, 11 whites in household, Charlotte Co., Va. These 11 whites are evidently Peter, his wife, Sarah Pryor, their only daughter, Celia, who married a Jeans and his 8 sons. Soon after the above record Peter moved to North Carolina where his youngest son, Peter IV, was born in 1783.

In the 1st. U.S. Census taken in 1790, we find under Heads of Families in North Carolina, page 180, "Peter Fore, 3 white males over 16yrs. of age, 2 white females, 5 white males under 16 yrs. and 5 slaves, Salisbury Dist., Stokes Co., N. Carolina." Peter III brought his family to Ky. sometime between 1790 when he was listed in the 1st. Census in Stokes Co., N. Carolina, and 1799 when there are records of his business transactions in Henry Co., Ky. See Huguenot Magazine #8 Ref, page 190.

June 22, 1747-Archeleus Faure, son of Pierre and Marie. Recorded in the Douglas Register in King William's Parish, Manakintown, Va. We know nothing of Archeleus (I wonder at this name) except that he died early in life.

May 2, 1749- William Faure, son of Pierre Faure. It was about this time the Rev. Douglas left the parish and no further records are available, but we know already the names of the others even if we have not been able to find all the dates of birth. William Faure (Fore) married Magedelaine Loe in 1775. She was born Oct. 9, 1752 in Prince Edward Co., Va. The records of 1783-85 give "7 whites and 2 blacks in household." In 1793 William bought 20 acres of land in this county. He died at New Castle, Ky., in 1810. Their children were:

1. Elizabeth b. April 11, 1776.
2. Dr. Culvin ( bachelor) 1777-1801.
3. Judith b. Dec. 1779 m. John Sanders.
4. Sally b. Oct 11, 1781 m. John Rice,
5. Joseph b. Dec. 27, 1783, married and lived in Shelbyville, Ky.

though the two eldest sons had already married.

They were as follows:

1. Littleberry m. Polly Gwynn of Va.
2. Julius who m. Brashears ( I have always thought the Julius mentioned in Peter III's will as brother really referred to this son , and I believe the money was not left to a sister-in-law but rather to a daughter-in-law, Marjorie (?)--name not written clearly in the will)
3. Joseph m. Fanny Sanford
4. Dr. Augustine Fore m. Mrs. Nancy Pugh Monroe.
5. Celia m. William Jean
6. William m Eliza Major
7. John Pryor m. Elizabet (Betsy) Thomasson.
8. Dr. Pryor- Unmarried. He was a surgeon on Andrew Jackson's staff.
9. Peter IV m Nancy Toole of Christianburg, Shelby C., Ky.

The descendents of these nine children are worked out separately elsewhere in this book. Our Lydid Posey Brown and sisters' maternal great grandfather was John Pryor Foree, No. 7 above, and our paternal great grandfather was Peter IV, no. 9 above.

This information was given in detail to Lydia Posey Brown in 1905 by her grandmother, Lydia Foree Posey b. Jan. 12, 1814 d. March 13, 1907.

What we have learned about the children of Peter II, b. 1706 in Va. , son and grandson of refugees, is recorded in the following pages: Peter II d. in 1780 at Ruddle's Fort, Bourbon Co., Ky.

Pierre Faure II's children--

1. Judith b. 1742 Manakintown, King William's Parish, Va.  
Birth recorded in the Douglas Register thus:  
" Nov. 3, 17420 Judith Faure, daughter of Pierre and Marie"  
Judith was killed by the Indians at either Martin's Station or Ruddle's Fort in Bourbon Co., Ky. in 1780 or on the way North. Silas says in his pension records: "The Indians scalped her because she couldn't keep up." She was 38 and an old maid.
2. Joseph Faure, son of Pierre and Marie, b. May 31, 1744, according to the Douglas Register, but he says in his pension record at Shelby Co. Court House, granted in 1834, that his age is about 92, that he was born in Powhattan Co., Va., about 1742, and that the Indians broke into his father's house and destroyed all family records. He was a Revolutionary soldier, moved to Ky. in 1806 and lived at Shelbyville. His will at the court house mentions his children as follows:

  2. Nancy, lived in Tenn.
  3. Martha m a Ditto
  4. Ann m. a Ridgeway - He mentions grand-daughters sarah and EX Thebe Ridgeway.

  7. Elizabeth m. a Sewzley (spelling is not plain)
  8. Peter G. who had a son, Joseph.
  9. John
  10. Thomas Dawson born Joseph M.

Of course these early records are some times erroneous. Elsewhere in this history there is this location mentioned in connection with Peter II -- "Settled on north bank of the south fork of the Licking in what is now Bourbon County, Kentucky".

Communication was practically impossible in those days and Peter II's family was so widely scattered that it is no wonder they lost track of each other. Silas's pension record mentions besides Judith killed by the Indians, another sister near his own age, Keziah, who was carried North by the Indians. There she met and married Joseph Wycoff. They lived in the state of New York. She later visited her brothers in Ky., Joseph For at Shelbyville, Peter III, and Jesse near New Castle, Ky.

In a letter to his siter, Keziah, in 1826, Joseph Fore of Shelbyville, Ky., speaks of their brothers, Peter III, Silas, Jessee, John and Francis and their sister Mary. ( See Mrs. Sommerville's typed notes, px. List of Peter II's and Marie's children, whom we have already written about.) Those five recorded in the Douglas Register are found on preceding pages in this record. The others born later are:

6. John- lived in Charlotte Va., moved to Ga. after the Rev.
7. Jessee- moved to Henry Co. , Ky.
8. Francis- Nattaway Co., Va., moved to Tenn. after Rev. war .
9. Hezekiah-Rev. soldier.
10. Martha- married a General Smigh, lived in Tenn.
11. Mary- also lived in the South, Tenn. or Miss.
12. Keziah b. 1762d. Aug 14, 1830 , lived in New York.
13. Silas b. 1766, lived at New Castle, Henry Co., Ky.

I wish we knew more about the descendents of Pete II and Marie but we will proceed with the direct line through their son, Peter III, b. 1744 in Virginia.

Peter III, great grandson of the Widow Faure , who was his first ancestor in America, always spelled his name Foree, though his brothers, some of them, spelled theirs Fore. He was a "Minute Man" in the Rev. War and was awarded a medal forbravery by the existing government , at the Battle of Cowpens. He was paid for his Rev. services with a land grant in Ky. (Ref. State Librarian's Hist of Rev. soldiers of Virginia., page 167, and Acct. 18, page 524; III, papers 133: Pension Claim Jan. 31, 1834). Before the war he had Married, In Virginia, Sarah Pryor in 1770. They moved, during the war, to North Carolina where his youngest son, Peter IV, was born in 1783.

"Under Heads of Families in Va., page 14, year 1782, is listed Peter Fore, eleven whites in household, Charlotte Co., Va. Recorded in the first U.S. Census of 1790, we find under Heads of Families in North Carolina , page 180: Peter Fore, three males over sixteen years, two whitefemales., five white males under sixteen yrs. of age and five slaves, Salisbury Dist., Stokes Co, N. Carolina.

Peter III brought his family to Ky., somstims between 1790, when he was listed in the 1st. U.S. Census above , and 1799, when there are records of his business transaction in Henry Co, Ky. (Huguenot Society Magazine #8, Ref. page 190).

Families stuck together in those days, and we find that Peter III and Sarah Pryor Foree brought all their nine children with them,

Pierre ( Peter II, b. 1706 in Va.) married 1st. Judith Bingli, thought to be the daughter of Joseph and Judith Bingli as they acted as godparents to her son, Joseph, b. May 31, 1729. This son probably died in infancy as later another son, Joseph, was born to Pierre (Peter II) and his 2nd. wife, Marie Gaudowin ( Godwin) whom he married before 1742 when their first child was born.

Rev. William Douglas, while he was rector of King William's Parish, recorded carefully the data about his flock, among those records we find:

Nov. 3, 1742- Judith Faure, daughter of Pierre and Marie.  
May 31 - Joseph Fure, son of Pierre and Marie  
Oct. 1744- Pierre Faur, son of Pierre and Marie  
June 22, 1747- Archelaus " " "  
May 2, 1749 -William Faure " " "

About 1749 Rev. Douglas left the parish and no further records are available.. But we know from descendents that Pierre and Marie had other children-13 in all. Besides those recorded in the Douglas Register, there were: Francis (Frank), Jessee, Silas, b.1766, John, Keziah, Martha, Mary (Polly) and Hezekiah.

Now Pierre (Peter II b. 1706) and his wife, Marie, lived in Va. for many years and reared their big family. During the Revolutionary War Peter II, now 61 yrs. of age, decided to take his children remaining at home to Kentucky. The older sons were at war. Records show that Peter III, Joseph, Francis, Jessee, and Hezekiah were Revolutionary soldiers in Virginia and North Carolina. The first two and probably Jessee received pensions in Ky., Peter at age of 90 yrs. and Joseph at 92 yrs. Arriving in Ky. Peter II put his children in the pallisaded fort at Ruddle's Gap, Martin's Station, in what is now Bourbon County on the Licking River. (Note that Marie had died before the Revolution.) This fort was attacked by the British and the Indians under Col. Byrd and a terrible massacre occurred on June 22, 1780. Several of Peter's children were captured and carried North to Detroit and Canada. The oldest child, Judith, was scalped by the Indians because she was sickly and couldn't keep up with the long trek northward. Silas b. 1766 according to the pension record, and the youngest child, gives interesting data in this record. Tradition has it that the father died about this time and mentions the fact that his mother, Marie, had died in Virginia soon after his birth.

I am inclined to believe that Peter II wasn't killed at this time- perhaps later- for the following reason: Recently (1950) I found in the Louisville Public Library a copy of old Ky. Entries and Deeds by Jillson, book no. R 347J 61, page 206. I quote: "Fore, Peter, 400 acres , B.K. A., page 181, date 10-23-1780. Watercourse North Fork of Licking. Jefferson Entries "The massacre at Martin's Station and Ruddle's Fork took place in June of 1780, several months before the deed mentioned above was recorded, and my supposition is that Peter II lived at least past the recording of the deed of Oct. 23, 1780.

Mrs. Sommerville is a descendent of Peter's son , Dr. Augustine Pryor Foree; and Dr. Dr. Greely is descended from Peter III's brother , William Foree b. 1749 d. 1810.

Following the revocation of the Edict of Nantes, 1685, in France, many Huguenots came to America. On July 23, 1699( by a change in the calendar, 1700) an English sailing ship, "The Mary and Ann", laden with Huguenot refugees dropped ancor at the mouth of the James river in Va. Among these passengers was a widow, Le Veuve Faure, and her four children. Her husband had been killed or had died prior to the ship's sailing, as the ship's record lists only this widow, her sons, Daniel and Jean, and two daughters. On another ship, "The Nassau" which landed at Jamestown, Va., in February 1701, came another son of this Huguenot widow named Pierre Faure. He brought with him his wife, Elizabeth, and their infant son, Jean, b. 1697. Pierre Faure joined his mother and the rest of the Faure family who had settled at Maniktown, King William's Parish, on the James river, county of Henrico, Va. This settlement was about 20 miles from the present site of Richmond, Va. The Governor of Va., by order of the English King, donated 10,000 acres of land on the James river for a Huguenot settlement. Each family was allowed 133 acres.

Mrs. Sommerville and Dr. Greely both write at length of the Faures in Virginia, but since we are direct descendents of the Widow Faure's son, Pierre b. in France around 1670 and coming to Va. on the "Nassau" in 1701 we shall pass up the records of his brothers, Daniel and Jean (John) and and follow his direct line down through the years for more than two and a half centuries.

This Pierre Faure was a vestryman in King William's Parish, Va., until his death in 1745. We shall refer to him hereafter as Peter Foree I( anglicized from the French pronunciation and spelling). He and his first wife, Elizabeth, had the following children:

1. Jean (John) b. in France in 1697 d. in Va. in 1753, unmarried.
2. Pierre (Pierre II) b. 1706 or 1719 in Va. d. in Bourbon County, Ky.
3. James- b. 1708 in Va. m. Ann Bondurant (always spelled (1780. Ford)
4. Daniel, no children
5. Judith m. John Leake
6. Mary m. William Fuqua

The will of Jean (no. 1) above , probated Goochland, Co., Va., says: "If my brother Daniel dies without heirs , the property falls to brother Peter." Peter II, above, inherited it and his family paid taxes on it until 1811. So the name Faure (Foree) evidently came down through Peter II b. 1706, as Jacques (James above) was known as James Ford.

This James b. 1708 m. Ann Bondurant and they had seven children as follows :

His wife, Sarah Pryor Foree, was also a Virginian. He moved to North Carolina during the war and his pension record shows most of his service from that state. He was a carpenter when a young man and fell in love with Sally Pryor while building a barn for her father.

Peter Foree came to Ky. in the 1790's and settled with his family 3/4 mile from New Castle, Ky., Henry County, on what is called the McGinnis place, owned in 1953 by the son of Wirt Turner. He brought his eight sons and one daughter with him. His two oldest sons, Littleberry and Julius, were married when they came to Ky.

Peter Foree lived to be 99½ years old and was noted for his activity of mind and body. Six months before his death, in 1844, his horse was led by a slave up to the "style block", in order that he might mount more easily but he led it away and mounted from the ground without any assistance whatever.

Uncle Littleberry married Mary (Polly) Gwynn of Virginia. She was a peculiar person and many interesting stories have been handed down about "Aunt Polly". She would allow her children to prepare for a visit and at the last moment refuse to let them go, saying that she wanted to accuse them to disappointments. When her daughter, Ann, was on the eve of her marriage she asked Aunt Polly for some money. With characteristic obstinacy she refused and Ann said, "Then I will ask my fiance for it". Whereupon Aunt Polly told her she would slap her if she did. One or two of her descendents became insane, and the family always laid it on Polly Gwynn's side of the house.

At one time Peter took his force, white and black, to the home of Littleberry who had settled near his father on what is called the "Berry Foree Addition" to New Castle. Littleberry was having a "barn raising". While the men were lying around the yard resting and waiting for dinner Uncle Littleberry challenged his youngest brother, Peter, who was born in North Carolina in 1788, to a wrestling match. Peter surprised his oldest brother by throwing him, whereupon Berry exclaimed "By blood, Peter, you can't do that again!" But Peter promptly did it again. Littleberry was small and wiry and quick of speech, while Peter was, when grown, of unusual stature and strength. So ends grandmother's account, or part of it, that I recorded. How I wish now that I had asked more questions and copied more interesting data. She and Aunt Betty gave me an accurate record of her grandfather Peter's descendents (down to 1905) which follows later in this history. Since he lived until 1844, when she was thirty years of age, it is not surprising that the information gotten from him fits into the pattern of facts which Mrs. Louis Keith Sommerville of Mississippi, former State D.A.R. Regent and a genealogy fan and Dr. Horace Greely, of New York (grandson of Horace Greely fame) have gained about the Faure family by exhaustive research. Their bibliography is in part-----

FORSEE fam

An article in the French Historical Magazine, Revue de Gascogne, Vol. #7, 1907, on the Faure family says it originated in Gascony, France; that the first of the name was known as Jean Faure, Senecal d' Armagnac in 1372.

Others of the name were Guy du Faur who in 1581 was an admirer of Marguerite de Navarre; Count Antole du Faur de Pibrac in whose case Catherine de Medeci attended a conference, and one Michel du Faur, who in 1622 led an attack on some Huguenots in Capenac. Some Faur's were of the Catholic clergy. Many were Huguenots. Curiously, the Historian, Baird records the conversion in Canada of a Protestant, Daniel Fore, 1685.

The name is pronounced in France to-day (1953) in at least three different ways;

1. The President of France in 1895 was Francois Felix Faure (For) b. 1841 d 1899.
2. Gabriel Urbain Faure, French compose, 1845-1924.
3. Elis Faure (For) French artist and historian.
4. Jean Bartiste Faure (For) singer d. 1914 .
5. A Faure was Premier of France recently- in 1952 and again in 1955, named Edgar Faure.
6. Maurice Faure figures in French politics today. (1953)

#### HISTORY OF OUR BRANCH OF THE FAURE (FORSEE) FAMILY IN AMERICA

One of my favorite experiences as a child was to sit on the hearth rug before an open grate fire upstairs in Grandmother Posey's room and listen to her and her sister, Aunt Betty Jessee, reminisce about old times. Their parents, Elizabeth Thomasson and John Pryor Foree, their grandparents, Peter and Sally Pryor Foree, and various kith and kin, as well as their old home and its environs located about five miles from New Castle, Ky. on the Drennon Springs road.

I spoke to the family down stairs about some of the interesting stories they told, and my father, Thomas Brown (whose mother was Alpha Foree Brown) and a 1st. cousin to grandmother Posey) urged me to write down and keep a record of the things which no one knew so well as Grandmother Posey did in 1905 when she was 91 yrs. of age and possessed an alert, active mind. her account is as follows:

The Forees (name anglicized from the French Faure) were French people- Huguenots who came to America in the late 1600's because of religious persecution. Leaving France as they did, their landed estates were confiscated by the Government of France and they arrived in America with nothing except a few relics, some of which remained in the family as late as 1859 when the brick house on Drennon road, home of John Pryor Foree, was destroyed by fire. Among these relics was an old red trunk made from the hide of a favorite cow in France.

The family settled on the James river in Virginia, and the older people, being well advance in age, never learned to speak English. My grandfather, Peter Foree, (anglicized from Pierre Faure) was a grandson of the original settlers. He was born in 1744. He was a "minute Man" in the Revolutionary War and enlisted in Virginia.

Dear Mrs. Byrne:

The historic home of Peter Foree was built by him more than one hundred and forty years ago. It is located, as I have explained, in Henry County, Kentucky. In History of Henry County there is a brief account of Mr. Alfred Foree who lived in the old home. He died a short while ago. It is said that his great-great-grandfather, Archibald Foree was massacred by Indians in Bourbon Co., Ky., as he and his family were coming from North Carolina to Kentucky. Seven of his children were held captives by savages three or four years. The Foree family came from France to America about 1689.

I suggest that you write Mrs. Elmer Foree, Eminence, Kentucky. She was a Miss Foree and married her cousin. I hope she may be able to furnish you with some very helpful information about the Foree family.

Dr. Peter G. Fore -



ERASMUS D. FOREE M.D., was born in Shelby County, Kentucky, July 25, 1817. His father was a physician, after giving his son the advantage of the best schools in a remarkably cultivated and refined community, had him enter Hanover College, Indiana, from which institution he graduated with honors. Soon after, he began the study of medicine and graduated at the University of Louisville in 1839. He then repaired to Philadelphia, where he spent a season in the hospitals of that city. He added to this a year in Great Britain and on the Continent of Europe, in professional work. On his return to America he began the practice of medicine in New Castle, Kentucky. Soon after, he married Flora V. Jackson, daughter of Honorable Edward Jackson of West Virginia, son of General George Jackson of the Revolutionary War. Mr. Jackson was a double cousin of General Stonewall Jackson and represented a large and intelligent constituency in the National House of Representatives. The union resulted in five children, four of whom, three sons and one daughter survive the father.

One of his sons, a naval officer, lost his life at sea, while executing an act of conspicuous gallantry. His mournful taking off is recorded on a beautiful Cenotaph, erected to his memory at Annapolis by his brother officers. In 1850, Dr. Foree was elected to the Chair of Materia Medica and Therapeutics in the Kentucky School of Medicine, an institution that had been founded in Louisville. He filled the position with credit to himself, but finding that the duties of the place interfered with his practice, he lectured but a single season. About this time he moved to Anchorage, where he acquired a large business. In 1863 he settled in Louisville and at once assumed a leading place in a city noted both for the number and strength of its medical men. In 1874, when the Central University of Kentucky located at Richmond, established its Medical Department at Louisville under the title of the Hospital Medical College, Dr. Foree was made President of the faculty, and appointed to the Chair of diseases of Woman, a place which he filled at the time of his death. Dr. Foree died suddenly of Angina pectoris on Sunday morning February 26, 1882, age 65 years. At a meeting of the physicians of Louisville, held to take action on his death, the following remarks made by Dr. D. W. Yandell, an intimate friend of Dr. Foree's were unanimously adopted, as expressive of the sense of the profession in presence of its great loss.

Ida Foree, daughter of Erasmus D. Foree and wife Flora Jackson Foree married Albert Bolling. They had a daughter Alice Gloria Bolling who married Eugene Hilarian Abade, they had Eugene Bolling born September 25, 1904 and Alice born December 25, 1905.

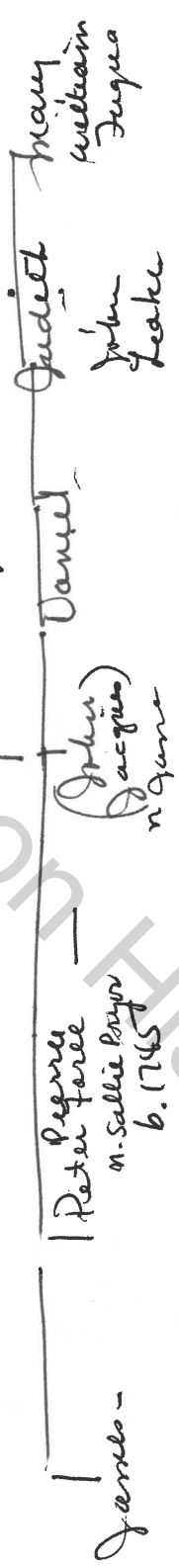
