house but they had just moved in.
The owner of the house had left with
the rebels. The roads was full of chairs
nearly I wish I had a dog at home
There is some talk that we will
be paid soon for 6 months. There
will be 88 dollars for me, corporals
get \$8 a month now private \$6. from the
1st of May. Well I guess I will
close for this fine write soon Direct
the same to you as ever Isaac Little

Dear Sallie I sat
my self this evening to write
you a few lines to let you
know where & how I am. I am
well & hearty & hope these few lines
may find you well. I rec'd a letter
from you a day or so ago I was very
glad to get it. It was just such a
letter as I like to get, well we are
in a different place from where I
wrote before we moved last
Monday night now we are on
the East of Atlanta & can see some
of the horses from our works the
rebs has their works in plain view
about a mile of we can see them
on their works plain & their flags
to they have skirmishes out & so do
we, I am writing on a our table we
made out of a cracker Box & I cut a

mine shady bush & stuck in the ground so I have a nice cool shade to write in. Well the best news I know is the talk here is that we & all the Indiana Troops will get to go home this fall to vote if they dont let the soldiers vote I think that Indiana will go Buttermut & most of the people here think so to Gov Morton is in favor of it & Lincoln is interested for the president is to be elected this fall. Well one more just 13 months from today to see if the war lasts & if we have to wait till then to go home I reckon we will take it quiet but if we get to go this fall it will be all right. Well I'll bet there would be hugging & kissing &... if I was there it is to good to talk about that is being at home. Well I reckon if Semps gets home he will take care & draw his load. Well I got a letter from B Hill & C S B down ^{day} yesterday. They said your Pah was there after George

that was the first I knew where he was they said your pop had gone back but did not get George with him Benoni said he fitted George for he looked so bad I wish he could get home his Capt will give him a discharge if he can I was over to the 124th the other evening Elihu Abbott was well & Harry Eli Harris was sick, there is more boys & old men in that Regt than I ever saw I believe There is some as small as Joel there. I believe our Regt would do as much fighting as two such Regts. John Rhodes was here yesterday he had ^{just} got back from a sort of tearing up Rail Road & burning rebel trains & he said rebel Wheeler drove them in & got them surrounded but he said after a lit Wheeler sent in a flag of truce for them to surrender when our boys crossed their line & broke out they cut their way out & most of them got out safe I guess the rebels thought the

The lot is very large in H.A.
with other men it would not
be hard to get a man to mow

no a bus & I would not be able to
morrow but it is my turn to
work to go around Belmont, I am
going though, as you were so kind
as soon as I did this we are

msg of this morning to drop a
few lines to answer a letter
Mr. White, I recd this evening
from Goldsmith, for you, and
had been a good while since I had
heard from you. I am well &
had a long walk this morn,
out in a place here who has
been for about 3 weeks, & I
had to take his temper, &
he is a big animal by God's
good grace who comes down at
the end of the day we had only
fifteen days out this far a
and left the last ten days
on the night, night for last
all over a long road the city on
over a long distance all night & the next
in the cities built on hills
etc, well if ever man has to run in

15 p.m. I got off. It was not long
but I doffed it, off the right. This
is when a man is when one side
makes a charge & the other, on the
charge gets the worst of it you
don't get your backs up
up & then is run over to make it
start all the horses in line with
rebs shot in back competing with
my bullet one man in a front
shot shot him through the head
I did not shoot a man. He & the
man been working here
some time now back from
down south & made me give a
wife & children to him. I am not
angry with IKE in a way
but I did not get me a shot
for it will soon be over & I con
demn you to IKE for me to do
so on the 1st at 1pm C.S.A.
and this I am now my last go at
it & I am not going to

well I went to the place early
& washed my hands. But I shot
you won't believe me to see
me bleeding in my shirt back &
wetting my front. At 1 you
can't see me very steadily
yet a few of them went
up & I sprang you down.
C.S.A. I am the 1st line
that I passed yesterday & probably
it can't be the first to do
the 120 yards to come with more
than I do what the present for
that's why I did it. I have
11000, 11000 & we got to go down
the road to the coast to beat the
tide. I don't like to say
what gives us such a m
to day. I know I can do it
and turn out fine though
you didn't start second but
I made it our greatest
success so far I think.

of the boys that I know now
Elijah is dead he was sent
through the weak & died in
few minutes he was helping
carry a log to put on breast
works he was killed south
west of the city about 5 miles
Ab is back sick it is
reported that some of our
forces (the 20 Corps) are in the
city but I don't believe
it we are getting around them
& they will have to get out
or fight us soon but

it is the general opinion
that they are provoking the
the city. the 36th 3rd times
is out & are going to start a
block soon likely to move
I will send this by them
to Winchester, well it was
fun to see the Johnnies run
this morning oh how far
they did yell at them we
got some prisoners I don't
know how many our Regt
was in the front line of
battle & got up good works
ready for a fight then come here
then has been troops passing
us for 2 or 3 hours & I can
hear them skirmishing some we
made a line of works last
night where we stopped we
are getting the trace pretty good
but works is a nice thing in
a fight well this will be

Dear Sallie

I sent myself this evening to day
you a few lines to let you
know how I am.
I am well & heart & hope
you the same. Well about 12
days ago Gen Sherman took up
his army from around Atlanta
& struck out the rebels thought
for the rear so next day they
had a big time there they had
done 3 dinners &c & put out on
extra paper that day that the
yanks had fell back & had a
great time in general but so
in a day or two old Hood
found that Sherman was on
the Macon R.R. & then they
cut to head us then left on

corps there to hold the city
while the rest tried to head us
our Brig struck the RR at
rough & ready station & commenced
tearing up the track & burning the
ties & leveling the rails & bending
them we tore up some 10 miles
we got in a fight one eve
near Jonesboro station & killed
a lot of rebels & got a few men
killed our Regt was in the front
line of battle the rebels left that
night if it had not been so
near night we could have took a lot of
prisoners we had 2 men wounded
in w^{ch} I thought was on the 1st of Sept
on the 3rd we got in another
fight near Jonesboro station
our Regt & the 84th Ill were on
the front line & charged & took
their skirmish line & our Regt
got 28 prisoners we had to charge
through an open field up hill to
it was about plain for us there was

15 wounded 1 killed & 3 missing
Co H did not have a man hurt
we got 8 prisoners out of one hit one
of the rebels shot at one of our boys
& hit his knapsack & then 9 & 2
more shot & I guess one of us
hit him for one had a bloody
shoulder the rebels would not
stop at us till we get right
on them then they will surrender
we were in about 40 steps of them
when he shot at Kegries. Well
night before last we fell back
to Jonesboro & this morning we
started & are now in about 9 miles
of Atlanta where we will rest
for awhile I think we will go
there tomorrow. Well we have not
had any mail for sometime I have
not heard from you for a good
while I have got a letter that
told about you getting thrown
off of a horse & getting your ankle

Towards Chattanooga on the R.R.
I hope we will go there it is a nice
place. Well it is a sight to see
the ruins of the trains that the
rebels had at when they left Atlanta
there was about a hundred cars burnt
& 3 engines we got a report that there
was 80 car loads of ammunition and
I believe it to be the truth at the
sides of the track are nearly full of
shells & coke & there is several hundred
gun barrels there that has been
burnt, well the Campaign
is over now for the present &
as soon as we will get to West & the
war off I will a ring and a dollar
the other day so I have a little more
I am going to have something good to
eat if you get it, well we
begin to think now that the
Confederate soldiers will get to go home to
vote now, well I wrote a sheet yesterday
day & told you all about our hard

is getting Old Hood out of Atlanta
& I have told you about our march
back to the city, well I got a
Winchester paper & a pocket book
& a day book to day by mail that
Nate sent me but I don't see
why I don't get a letter from you
well 3 years ago to day we left
Concord Wayne & to day we made
through Atlanta.

Well Capt you come to you
now as is about well the boys
are well, well I will get you
the present & write again when
I get a letter from you which
I think I will soon for we have
not got the books now yet that
we can put up while on the train
well write soon for I won't
be hear from you, so Good By

I sent myself this evening to
drop you a few lines in answer
to your kind & welcome letter
which I rec'd this evening.
I am well & hearty & hope this
may find you well. Well I
wrote a few days ago & I don't
remember all I wrote so I will
write over if I do write the
same again you must excuse
me. In the 1st place we have gone
in to camp for to rest awhile &
I am shur we needed rest for it
was over 4 months since we left
Blue Springs & started on this
Campaign & done some hard fight
so I dont know how long we
will stay here but I think we will

stay here & get paid off I don't believe there will be any regular fall campaign for it is getting to late now it will soon be raining & the roads will get to bad to move Artiller. Some of the men think we will get to go home to home but I am afraid we will not. Well I guess we and I'm will not get to be track guards for other troops have left & we had orders to fix up regular camp we went & got lumber & have got good bunks with shades over them I have made me a chair & have been shopping some I have got about 5 dollars back now for shoes at 5cts apiece. Well I sent that ~~THE~~ King in the last letter I sold one I had made for Note for one dollar with us as is well I got a package of paper that Honoh sent me I got 12 sheets & 12 envelopes I got a pocket book & day book that note sent me

Well we drew clothing to day I got pair pants socks. Well now we are not years men now every month counts fast I wish it was out. Well I am going to get a pass & go to town on Monday tomorrow we are to have inspection of our guns. Well ther is an awful sight women in Atlanta now I reckon the 20th Corps will have a good time but I would rather kiss you than all them I heard that Gen. Sherman had issued an order for all the secesh women to go South through our lines there is to many to feed I guess Well it is getting dark so I will have to stop soon. Put stumps on your letters when you can for this one I got this evening had been stopped at Chattanooga & marked Dec 4th but it come through

Dear Gallie I sent myself this morning to drop you a few lines as Col Neff is going to start home this morning he having resigned. I am well & hearty & hope this may find you well. We are having good times now a nice camp & duty light. Well if we get to go home to vote we will have to start now in about 3 weeks. I heard that one fellow in 2^d Regt Ky offers to bet \$50 against one that the confd soldiers would get to go & vote the Col thinks we will & I guess it rests with Sherman if he thinks he can spare us we will get to go. Oh if we do get to go at the apples I will eat I have not eat an apple for near 3 months & then they were green I have eat 3 peaches that were begining to turn some. But we have had more sanitary this summer than altogether before we got a lot of pickled Onions & a lot of fresh ones & we got a lot of potatoes to I tell you they were good some times we get dried apples but I guess they are scarce now. Well our mess & Dick Kemps has bargained for 25 lbs of meat in the morning then we will have corn cake & well I manage to keep a little money all the time by shooting I made 2 sets in on hour last evening I shot Col Neff for nothing besides some times I shoot & to 11 men at sets. Well I want to get a pass & go to town some of these days & see where we were shooting so much. Well we had a vote taken in our Regt to see Lincoln & Morton stood & will give you a list the 9th and voted & all went for Lincoln & Morton but one. we are having some of the prettest weather. I never saw such nice mornings a little cold at night

well it has not been but a few days since I wrote to
you & I have no news to tell you now but tell your
Pap that I will be very thankful if he will soon get
wheat for me Col Huff says he thinks the wheat will be
over in 6 months any how I hope it will but we have
only 11/2 months till our time is out & the most of troops
that their time is out start home a month before their
time is out well 4 more days will be a year since
we were in the Battle of Chickasawnee I think we
will not have such a time this fall well I will
have to close for Col is going to stop soon

this far the rebels have been here
& tore up the RR from Big Shⁿ
to near Acworth but Gen^l Thomas
gave them a thrashing at ^{Atlanta} Big Shⁿ
& yesterday they over 10 or 12 miles
from here we could hear the noise
of what we thought was their
ammunition train being blown up

I guess old Hood is trying to
get back to Alabama now.
Well I dont know where we
will stop at but I think we
will stop on the RR somewhere
& stay awhile well I guess we
would got to went to the election
if this trouble had not come along
& I would not be surprised if
some of the soldiers would get
to go to the Presidents election yet
well we have not had any mail
from North of Chattanooga for
about 2 weeks the road was cut
there between Chattanooga & Nashville
but I guess the road is clear now
Well we are on ^{the} high ridge called
Pine Mountain Gen Polk was
killed about a quarter from here
we can see so far 50 miles some
places Well I will not write
much for Capt is going to take
this to the 40th & will soon
go so I will

not write much just to let
you know that I am all right
& I want to hear from you
too but I dont expect I will
tell Y. Metts come back.

Camp near Galesville, Alabama Oct 25th 1864

Dear Sallie I eat myself to day to write a few line to you. I am well & hearty & hope these few lines may find you well. It has been some time since I got a letter from you & a long while since I wrote to you I sent the last I wrote by a Col of the 40th Ohio we have been raiding around here in Georgia & Alabama & driving food out of here, we are 59 miles south west of Chattanooga & 25 miles west of Rome Ga which is the highest P.R. road point & no mail is scarce we got small ones at Kingston & once here I guess we will get mail in a few days again I am looking for Frank Metz every day I think I will get a letter soon there was a train of Wagons went out the other night & they sent mail out but I had none wrote & I had not time to write so I will write this & home it ready well we are foraging all through this country I was out yesterday with Dick Kemp & B. Butterworth & 3 more men killed 2 sheep & 2 hogs & come in to camp C.S. Brown got a lot of sweet potatoes so now we have mutton hog & potatoes oh yes & some molasses to ther is lots of molasses in here & the boys just go for them we got a lot of dried peaches the other day at 20cts a pound oh but they were good come & get dinner for me will have fried mutton & sweet potatoe well we did not get to go home to Aote but Mortons is all right any how & I hope old Abe will be to well ther will be 10 months pay due us now in about a week & I guess we will stay here & master for pay again, well ill finish after dinner

Well I have just eat my dinner & feel full as a tick,
& we are fixing to make some hominy we have got
the corn & I am going to get some ashes to make
the lye of them we will founder I expect well I must
go now & get ashes for they are ready for them.

Well now I will finish my letter I heard
that Phoebe Metz pointed when Crounk went
home well I would like to get a long letter from
him I want to hear the news from there.

Well I sold a watch the other day for 22.50 in
green back I give 7.25 for it I wish you had
some of the money if I was sick it would get
through now I would send you ten dollars

Well I would like to know that woman now
was that wanted to rent our house & I would
like to know whether the north wall of the house has
been fixed up yet it ought to be finished up.

Well I reccon B.C.P looks fuzzy she is as short on how
but I reccon she dont care now.

Well I am going to learn the watch trade this
winter if we go in winter quarters & I expect we will
winter near Rome ga this winter we have had a few
big frosts this fall & the Persimons are getting good
they almost here they fall well I must
get soon & I will send her the first chance
& get you must write soon & often & you must
excuse me for not writing sooner for we could not
get to send it out. I remain as ever yours

Dear Sallie
I seat my self this morning
to drop you a few lines to let
you know how I am, I am
well & hearty & hope these few
lines may find you well, Well
we got to Chattanooga & camped
at Ross ville then on to smokies
through Towns & camped at the
foot of Look Out Mt. Well Monday
morning we got on the cars for
Decatur Alabama but went to
Athens got there just before day
& went out to the fort & found
it dominated the 13th & the
18th Ohio was stationed but got
a disfatch that Hoods whole force
was in 10 miles of there & they
had skedaddled & burnt a lot of

clothing & notions. We went
in the fort & went for the
things they had left we got lot
of crackers beans peos & sugar &c
so we had a fine time. the rebels
captured a lot of our men
& a lot of niggers at that place
a while back well day before
yesterday we left & struck out for
this place we crossed the Elk River
at Elkton Tenn It was up to
my pocketts & cold to we went
about a mile in a field & camped
& burnt more rails than there
is on one farm there well yesterday
morning we started in the rain
& got here last eve & camped
here on a hill we can look
right down on the town the
^{7th} Ind cavalry is here all. Hoffe
is at Cops tent now he is ~~badly~~
sergt, we are 1/3 or 80 miles south
of Nashville & on the pike that

through Franklin to Nashville
it is about 60 miles to Franklin
where we stayed so long one
our waggon train has gone to
Nashville. We mustered for 10 months
pay at Chattanooga & some of
the offciers has gone after the pay
rolls the pay master is here & come
with us from Chattanooga so
I guess we will get paid over
there \$160 dollars coming to me
from the Government I want to
send \$150 home, Well I got
a letter from you a few
days ago I wrote to you at
Chattanooga there has been the
poorest arrangement about mail
lately never saw but now
they say we will get mail every
day I hope so. Well I wish
Mets would come for I want
to hear from you again.
Well 10 months more from
yesterday & we will be out

get some shoes I guess we will
have clothing in a few days & I
guess we will get paid this week
8 months pay there is ten due
us well we did not get to go
home to vote I would like to a

the 3rd of next mo will be 9 months
more for us it will soon roll
around I guess I'll not try to get to
go home of furlough tho won't
for there is some of the rest won't

to go that have not been
yet so I guess I'll wait
well I told you all the news

for some of us but they got mashed

smooth cider apple it was good

Camp near Nashville
Dec 2nd 1864

Dear Sallie
I set myself this morning to drop
you a few lines to let you know
how & where I am, I am well
& hearty or was a few minutes
ago at breakfast. Well we are now
camped about 2 miles south of
the city of Nashville but I guess
we will move some where to day
likely to a different position
so as to fortify. Well I wrote
a letter ag^o before yesterday while
at Franklin & put it in the
mail sack & Billy Way lost
the mail sack & all but I expect
some body will find the letters
a mail them I put in a 50 cent
for you & one for Alister & I put
in 6 buttons for Alister's coat or

rest but I dont know where
you will get them well I will
give you a history of the fight at
Franklin we left Columbia on
the night of the 29th & marched
all night got to Franklin about
10 clock next morning got breakfast
& went to fortifying got done about
2 o'clock I wrote my letters then
& about 3 o'clock our skirmishes
was drove back then it commenced
& one of the horlest kinds of
fights come of the 23 corps was
on the left where we use to
stand picket the rebels charged them
9 times & got repulsed every time
it is reported that we took some
from 2 to 4 thousand prisoners
& I have heard no estimate of
of the killed but Capt. Leal
said they advanced the skirmish
line after night some time

& they said they could walk
a good ways & step on the dead
& wounded it is thought they were
drunk one thing certain they lost
an awful sight well the fight
commenced about 3 o'clock & lasted
till 10 or 11 o'clock that is the rebels
would try to get up & charge
the works our Regt had 2
wounded I believe one Frank
Bragg of Co. C. & one in Co. I
we were south west of town &
were not in the fight much we
fired some on the rebel skirmishers
some & drove them back, well about
midnight we left our works
& fell back to Brentwood &
got breakfast then came here
& went in to camp & put up our
tent & got a lot of dried bread
& oh but we did sleep so good
we marched from Columbia to

by a lotment roll but I dont
think you will get it till near
christmas I wrote to you how
to do it &c, I have got 37 dollars
yet I have a notion to send 25 or
more but I will wait till we
get paid I think we will get paid
in Jan for 4 months there is 3 more
due us now Oh yes now we are
9 months over now & one day over,
well I am out of stamps & I dont
know when I can get any please
send me a quarter worth.

Well all bet that charlotte
fired when she told Margaret tho'
about you, well I am about out
of my things to write so I will stop
& write the more next time

You must write soon & Tell
all the news
