get to go home till the
excitement is over & it is the
greatest pleasure of the office
that the rebels are so far
back here I had a talk
last night I used to have
to see a rebel as I could
shot but I could not do
so, Well about our moving
we did not move for we
just changed to get a better
camp ground we are in 13
miles of Nashville I guess
we would be glad to move
towards home if we had the
choice, I expect you are
glad that quaking is over
with I know I was once
I am glad you are going
to teach us by H. Clegg
I will have to wait till the
news when I get home.
Well I think it cannot be
a good year for babies
from the way they come
I expect for Keys feels like
a hog bigger some he has
made a mess of a girl
I was thinking last night
while I was on guard how
I would do if I was to get
to your house after night
I could not get it fixed yet
Well I cannot tell you all
my dream it was this that
Margret had a bear one night
he was about the size of
Bill Youk he looked like
he was a cripple & had light
hair he had 2 sisters married
if any such a thing happened



April 11th 1863

Dear wife I now take the present
time to write a few lines to you

I am well as common I hope these
few lines may find you well

I rec'd your letter just now dated the
6th April I was very glad to get it

Well finally I saw the Elephants take

yesterday the 40th Ohio Regt was out in
Pickett yesterday & about noon the rebels

had come up to the 40th & commenced
shriming & a little while they got

at it in earnest the 24th got in line
to wait for orders about 2 o'clock the

rebs drove the 40th in to town the

rest of the rebels ran a right to the

Bridg & he had surrounded & was taking
of his sword when the guards at the

Bridg fired on the rebels & killed one
& wounded 2 more the rest run like

the devils well I must eat some dinner
Well I have eat dinner we had hominy

I tell you it was good Well I must tell
you a little more about the fight turn

Well the Rebs stayed in town a few
minutes & then broke back the 40th
rallied & as they went at they killed a
good many horses & men about 3 o'clock
the 84th started out on the pike that
the Rebs did I saw a lot of dead horses
& I saw 7 dead rebels & two of the 40th
boys were laying one side of the road.
The rebels were the hardest looking men
I ever saw they had beard all over their
face & the most of them were shot in
the head, some fell & laid in the
dust their faces were covered with blood
& dust. There was lots of saddles hats
clothes & other odds & ends laying on the ground
some of the horses socks had corn meal
in them some had corn dough some
had corn deer the men were dressed in
brown fatigues well we went out
about 4 miles & our friends got to
skirmishing with the rebels & kept it up till
about dark then the firing goes as
we lay on the ground till about 10 o'clock
then we started back to camp I saw
4 of the dead rebels laying by the side
of the road I tell you they looked
scary in the dark we got in about

12 o'clock last night, I went over to the 40th this morning after they come in there was 3 men dead in company one was orderly sergeant of co A he was shot in the head. I think is 5 of the art houses. 40th dead 2, some 15 more missing. I tell you our big pig guns howling at the rebels. I think there was about 25 men fired they were 24 pounds. Well I guess I will drop the subject & talk up something else.

Well we did not have Eggs for breakfast but we will make it up when we get home. You need not believe any such a thing as the 34th being taken in for meal & of course we don't catch them so we have to come back. Well I hope that fortune teller don't tell lies but I am afraid it will be a lie.

Well I want to see you as bad as you want to see me but you must wait awhile I think things will work out all right yet so keep in good heart if you could see the rebels & see how they live & then see the 34 & see how we are dressed & our grub & you would

be glad to see me here in the Union army. I don't see how the rebels do hold out so long as they do.

Well I must quit & write some to the rest. Demp got a letter from Solly Army & some to me so I will write to her. Well I must quit for this time write soon as you can direct to Hook Hill, Linn Co #847

Not well care of Capt Carter Isaac Little to the Holly, Little.

Well George you must wash your horses when you have time or they will smell rumbunctious, more if you was here you could pick up feed enough to do so long as you live but feed is only a bother here there is one amount of old & new horse shoes scattered all around if you to pick up horse shoes taken I found 10 fucking them up now, George I am going to clean here yesterday & heard the big ones howl. Well George I bought another coat for 50cts it is most to small for me I will let you have it so good by

all the time or they rebels will
make a attack if the rebels would
fall back & things get quiet we
could get furloughs but somehow
I feel like the thing will be over

& had to come back again is what
I dread if it was not for leaving
again I would care to go every day.
The boys that went home said
it was harder for them to leave than
it was the first time & they won't
be see their folks worse now than
before they went Well the pay master
has just come down we will get our

Dear Wife I now

I am as well as common
hoping these few lines
may find you well & happy
I was looking for a letter
from you to day but I did
not get it I got one from
Sam. H. go. he said he heard
that the 84th had been in
a fight Well I wrote all
about it in a letter to you
last Sunday so it is not
worth while to write it

again I was in town last
night as potroll guard there
12 of us & 3 reliefs I had Demp
Pot Dodd & Bill way for me

relief. There was 3 soldiers
buried yesterday one was
shot on picket. Our Regt
has very good luck there
has been but few deaths.
Cloibon West died at
Hoodville last week he
owed me 5.00 dollars for
a watch but I guess I
will get it when things
are settled up here.

Well we were paid off the
other day we got 52 dollars
I want to send 30 dollars
home when ever I can I
will send 5 dollars in this
letter & E-gray will get a
furlough I think for he cant
do any duty I will send more
by him. I dreamed last
night that I went home
& they did not know me
but I think you would
all know me. I would

like to by it out how
I wrote to you about Gus
Engle getting a slight wound
in his arm it thought by
some it will kill him
yet the Dr. did not half
tend to it & it is inflamed
& is very bad. I had a good
dinner yesterday I and Demp
went to a house & got some
apple pies & the best of all
was a sweet potato pie
I tell you it tasted like
cognac. Oh what a lazy day
this is it is hot & I expect
we will have to go on Bottled
drill but then a soldier
must take things easy and
he will be better satisfied
I notice these fellows that are
grumbling about anything
dont get along half as
well as these that take things
easy -

Camp near Franklin Tenn
Sunday April the 19th 1863

Dear wife I will
try myself to write a few lines to you
to let you know how I am. I am
well & hearty, hoping these few lines
will find you well. I was on
post guard yesterday & last night
I feel a little sleepy. Well the
train is just coming in now I
will write letter I wrote to you
on Thursday I put 5 dollars in the
letter & there is a man here from
Carrollton he is going to take a lot
of money for the 8th & 9th I was going
to send 30 dollars to him to you in
I sent it in case of you. Pop he
can get it at Old John Williamson
at the Depot at town you may lend
it to some body all the ten dollars
to pay our taxes soon the money
to come out I hope will pay it back
when I want it. Well George
Wood has died last night he is in the
hospital at Franklin he had some

kind of fever I don't know whether
he will be sent home or not.
It is strange the largest & stoutest
men are the first to die that is 3
out of our co. I rec'd your most
welcome letter yesterday I was awful
glad to get it the next one you
send to me you must braid some
of your hair for a wristlet for me
I want one to wear. You need not
be scared a bit about us being in
a fight for the 84th don't go out
till after the enemy runs & then we
won't catch them so we don't get
in any fight I wrote to you
a few days ago & let you about
the fight here at Franklin
I don't want you to be so uneas-
about me I don't feel like there can
much danger a soldier don't fear
getting killed in a fight it is getting
sick & dying that a soldier dreads
I did loose a big black ring in
Tun愀carborn one. It had a shield
of brass with stars on it.

Well I bought 2 big apples
this morning for 15¢ they
were very good so I thought.
Well the boys have got some meat
& beans on for dinner but I don't
care much about beans but I
can eat them. Well we are going to
grow little turnips just now for dinner

some to your Pop. so I will
close up. You must write soon

April 30th 1863

Well Sally I seat myself
to drop a few lines to you to let
you know how I am getting along
I am well & hearty I hope these
few lines may find you well.

I reced a letter from Dan to day
& a few lines from you I was glad
to get to hear from you but sorrow
to hear that you had the ague I
hope you will get over it soon
you must take care of your self
& not get sick I think I am
in as good health as I have been
for some time I feel good all the
time I did have the worst cold
a mount or so ago I never had I
could hardly sleep for coughing I am
getting fat again I weigh 172 lbs
we have to get up at 4 in the morning
& stand to arms till sun up so we
get the morning air but it is not
far that that we are called on
it is to be ready if the reb

were to make a dash so we
would be ready for them Well I
wrote a letter to you a few days
ago & toles you all about our country
taking a lot of prisoners. I have not
got much news to write only I
spent 45cts to day I got 2 oranges
for 25cts & eat them I got an apple for
5cts 2 tin fulls of ginger Beer for
ten cts & I spent 5cts for a cup of
Beer for Sofe steel he is sick cop
Carter is sick in the hospital at
Nashville we have got the best ~~but~~
officer in Co H of oz.

now I do wish I could have
been at Dons that night with
you but I am here in Oldenn
playing Soldier but I think it
woont be long till the war will
be over but I cant tell but some
of the people in the south are
ready to start now I cant see
what thos order for giving furloughs
was made for they dont give us
any I think they might let us go
home once in 6 months but as it
is & we will have to grin & bear it

There is lots of men think our time will be up when the 9 months are up for we come out in the boat coll for 300 thousand dropted men for 9 months but we were awarn in for 3 years or during the war so I think they will hold us that long if the war aint stoped but I think we will get to go home on furlough between this & fall I hope so I think of one thing that the longer we stay before we go home our time will be the shorter afterwards so all put together I try to be satisfied.

Well I wrote to you a few days ago so I will quit for this time Write soon and often



Dear Wife I seat myself in
order to let you know how I am getting
along. I am well & hearty & getting fat
I hope these few lines may find
you well of the ague & hearty.

I received your letter of the 28th to
day & was glad to hear from you I wish
I could get one every day from you

I did not expect you would get to read
the dream but I do think it is a joke
on Jeff Davis. that package at town is
some money I sent there is \$0.00
I want our boxes paid out of it & the
rest you can keep it if you want to
or lend it to some one that will pay
it back any time. You wrote about
hearing that we had been taken prisoners
as you wrote it provisions I suppose you
ment prisoners well we have not
been taken prisoners & that aint all we
wont be. Well I have got that broad
you sent on wrist it most to long
I believe I will smoke two of it one

for each wrist Well Lut Steel is very
sick he has been sick for about a week
he is going to the Hospital I think it is
a doubtful case if he gets well he has
got hiccoughs Eli Worworth is sick but
not dangerous Demp has been grunting
for a few days. Demp said tell
Margrett that he would write in a
few days as he did not feel like writing
to day Well we had a visitor last
Sunday a man by the name of
Jones Turnes come to see us he is in
the 1st Ohio Cavalry I was acquainted
with him at home he used to live
in that house of Joes that Cromels
lived in he is a fine fellow the Marshall
has his baby raising he saw Newt
Fruits & Bunk Peire about a month
ago he says Bunk has grown lots Newt
is getting well Turnes was in the
fight at Murfreesboro. Well he started
back this morning he is on a
courier post at Nolenville. Well the
Regt goes out on Pickett to morrow
again we have to go about every ten
days I was on fatigue yesterday & it
was awful hot but it rained last

the Illinois Boys in our Brigade think
our time will be out in 9 months from
the time we come out & some of them
will bet high on it they think all
the troops that come out under the last
call for three hundred thousand are for
9 months I hope our time will be out
but then I know it wont be but
if it is all right & if not all right
for it cant be helped I want to be
at home & I want the rebels whipped
I think I am doing more good here for
our Government than I could at home
so I think our country needs all the
help it can get. But I think
we will get furloughs often

The 9 months is out if we count we
will stay a year then I am sure
we can get furloughs then there will
only be 2 years to serve. Well I must
quit soon Write soon or you get
this. I heard Tom had got home
I saw Rudy Erick to day he said
he was going to start to words home to day
I dont know whether he is going to go
home or to a hospital for he is not strong
if I knew he would go home I would
send this by him but I will send by
mail



Dear Wife I now set
myself to drop a few lines to you to
let you know how I am getting along
I am well & hearty & hoping these
few lines may find you & the rest well
I have not had a letter from you
for over a week & I have not wrote for
a few days so I will commence this even
ing & finish to morrow probably I
will get one from you then.

Well some of us have been put through
for a few days day before yesterday the
regt went out on picket & we were
up most all night & yesterday there
was Brigade drill & last night
Co H was at the fort on guard
there & we did not get to sleep much &
to day we had to go on Brigade drill
again & in the morning at 8 we have
to go out on Regimental inspection
so we will have to brush up & wash
& black our boots & put on clean clothes

I wish you could see us here
Well there is an order here now that
we are not allowed to carry but one
blanket one pair pants 2 shirts 2 drawers
2 pairs socks & the rest of our clothes
we can bundle up & put our names
on them & send them to Nashville &
we can get them again but I would
rather send my things home & I may
do it yet. If I do I will send it
to Union. Well some think we
will move on further now pretty
soon but I don't think we will
go far & we may stay here & guard
this place I will let you know right
away if we do move You may write
to Nashville till I tell you where
to send to. If you could hear
all the talk here amongst the boys
about going home in 9 mo. but I
don't believe a word of it I heard
one man say the the 84th & 85th
Ind Vol were ordered to Indianapolis
on the 16th of June I don't think
there is a word of it so but such
word as that takes with the boys
I can tell you what I think about

no more news to write, Well wheat
has headed out here & it looks like
harvest would be here pretty soon I saw
a lot of nine cobash in Franklin they
were as big over as my hat. Well I
can't tell any thing about that nine
months snoter but there is a screw
loose some where by the way things are
going on. but its no use to make
any calculations about any thing here.

Well the ~~worst~~^{weirdest} thing here is hot weather it gets pretty hot in the day time & at night it is cold.

Well Supt Steel was sent home last week a corpse one all hote to loose him the worst kind he was such a good clever fellow.

Well I must quit for this time if I don't have to go on Brigade drill I must write to ~~Joe~~ Coffin for I expect I shall be on duty to morrow.

Dear Wife I now take
my art to write a few lines to you to let
you know how I am getting along I am well
& hearty hoping these few lines may find you
well. Well in the first place we have moved
we left Franklin last Tuesday & come to
this place it is about 12 miles it was a
hard walk on us with our knop socks &
not being use to carrying them for we have not
carried them much lately. You ought to see
the cloths & blankets that are thrown
away on the road. I dont know where we
will go to but the Major said he thought
we would go to Shellyville. Gen. Bragg
is there with his army of rebels well I will
finish after awhile. Well Jim Burns is
here in camp he came last night so I
thought I would send this by him to the
office Co H had nearly a barrel of coffee
that we had saved so we let Jim have it
for a about 2 bushels to take & sell I wish
you had it at home it would do us a long
time I saw Martin Cox this morning he is

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is not very strong but we are more
Well we are camped on the grounds that
our men drove them rebs at the time of
the fight at Murfreesboro this is about
the out line of the rebels pickets they were
driven from here to Murfreesboro a distance of
15 miles Well I expect there will be some
fighting done somewhere close around in
a few days but there is plenty of our
troops here I wrote you a letter about
a week ago I dont expect Davis got a letter for
a few days till we stop for a while we only
stop here to rest I got a paper
Tuesday from Winchester having a list of the
killed & wounded of the 69th & the 8th
The boys are mostly well Dempsey was not
able to march so he was left with
some more I expect they went to Nashville
Well I will quit for this time
write soon I will write more
when in a few days if we dont
move & if we move I will write
as soon as we stop

I went with Prime Penn
till 11th up Sunday. June the 4th 1863.

Many thanks for your news wife Will Sally I now
wrote to you & payed to seat myself to drop a few lines to
you to let you know how I am I am well &
hearty hoping these few lines may find you well.
I rec'd a letter from you yesterday I was very
glad to get it we are camped close to a little
town called Trine but I wrote a letter the other
day to let you about our move out here
I don't know how long we will stay here but
I think not long some of the Regts has
left now we may go to Nashville but I
don't tell. Well we had a big fire last night.
There is a big barn close here belongs to a man
& he is a rebel but has taken the oath there is a
rebel Major buried in his garden but some
of the boys fired the barn it was fired to
hole! 80 holes. There was a fight at Franklin
the day we left there we had got only about
8 miles from there when we heard the cannon
& all day & most of the next I don't know what
damage was done I heard a ~~Confederate~~ Regt of Cavalry
got cut up pretty bad by the rebels several of the
boys was left there Dumps, Eli. & a few more
we will know how it was soon Well we have
got a nice little tent now we pedaled some people

Trees & got bark & made a floor to lay on
& we cut some clover to cure to make it softer
Well we had inspection this morning & we do the 1st
& 3rd Sundays of each month. Well I am cleaning up
all my paper this is all I have & we have not been
paid off yet so I will have to get on order at the
Butlers & get some paper &c Well I think the
Religious folks are having a good time there
I hope they will all get good by the time I
get home there there will be no mean ones
to go with one so nobody I will improve a little
we don't get mail near as good as we did at
Franklin we are some 12 miles to our Rail Road
when we moved from Franklin we had nearly
a barrel of coffee & we did not know whether
we could get it hauled or not so Jim Ferrino came
to see us so we let him take it & sell it so next
day he come back & fetched the money he sold
it for over 18 dollars so the company has money
to buy something. Ferrino is on a Courier post 6 miles
from here Well I guess I will quit for this time
I will get some more paper & write in a few days
Write soon & visit to Vicksburg & so before
I would not be surprised if we went to
Nashville next but I don't know we don't know
where we are going to hardly even till we get there
I guess the 9 months talk has played out -
I think they will hold us 3 years if the war is
not over but I would like to go home the best
kind it is most dinner so I will a quit Isaac Little

Well we got paid off the other day
I got two months pay which
was 26 dollars I paid 11 for my
watch & 2 to the sutler so I had
13 left I got a dollar worth of
stamps & some paper & paid a
little debt at this so I have 11 left
I thought I would keep that & not
send any home this time but if you
wont say I will send it to you
I did one packages for some
plonk I got it seems to me like
I have settled it but I am not
certain You need not go to any
trouble about that ^{indigo} I can

the news I believe so I will quit
I wrote to Alex & Tom yesterday after
the fight. You can't imagine what
a noise a shell makes as it goes
they squeal most like a pig. We can tell
when there is going to be a fight for the
nigars begin to run the come by us
yesterday in a drove in a run.

Well write soon & often

Dear Wife

I now drop a few lines
to you to let you know
how I am. I am well & hearty
hoping these few lines may
find you well. I am on duty
to day on Head Quarter guard
I went in at noon for dinner
& I got your very acceptable
letter & was very glad to get it
Well there has been some
excitement here lately Yesterday
the pickets were fired on by
the rebels the Artillery went out
& shot shell at them while
the rebels had a cannon & they
shot some shells over us
gosh but they did whiz we
were out in line & were ordered
to load & lay down so we did.

Cooly went out & then
the Artillery run them off
some 5 miles There was a fight
of the 2nd Ind Cooly killed
& several more wounded I don't
know how many was killed all
to gother but our boys seen
several brought in dead.

We did not get in to the fight
but was in sight of it & last
Sunday we had just such a
skirmish only there was no
Artillery that is 3 times there
has been fighting done in
sight of us & we are lucky
to keep out of it. But Co H
was keen to go in Yesterday & so
was the Regt. I expect we
will get enough of it yet

Well I wrote to you since
we left Franklin & told you
about our move there was 2
men hung there since we left
they were rebel Spies they

forged passes & got Union
uniform & went there as
officers from Rosecrans to
examine the fortifications &c
there but somehow Col Beard
of the 85 Ind suspected them
& telegraphed to Rosecrans by
the signal corps which
is by men on the high hills
with flags & wave them so
they can send news. Rosecrans
sent word back to hang them
as spies & so they did. Demp
is there at Franklin yet.
Well You need not put any
confidence in the 9 months
question for I think we are in
for 3 years if the war lasts
but I wish we could
get out at that time they
can hold us 30 days longer than
our time any how. Some of the
boys think we will go home
in a few weeks but I don't,

went with it. I wrote to
Charlotte Marshall to know where
she was & I got an answer the
other day she said she was down about
Viburg & she had not heard from
him for a good while she was troubled

Illinois to Ikes brother. & is
keeping house for him & I am glad
we are not down there about Viburg
for it is sickly there & it is healthy
here. wheat is cut here some places
well I must quit for this time
write soon & tell me if my
likeness looks natural

Camp near Brainerd Minn
Sunday June 21st 1868
Dear Wife

I now seat myself to answer
your very acceptable letter which
I got to day. I am well
& hearty hoping these few lines
may find you all well.

Well there is no news now
here of importance Capt has
got back to the Regt he has got
out again the boys are well
Dempsey is now at Franklin
last week in the hospital he
had been bleeding at the lungs
I dont believe he can stand the
service. Well Mike Ingle has
never come here we dont know
where he is Geo. Bough & Bill
Dick are released & are doing duty
Bough is sick now I dont know
what was done about them I expect

They will take some pay from
them. I got my likeness
taken last week & I will send
it in this letter they say it is
a good picture some of the boys
got theirs taken setting on the
ground with their guns & I
had to pay one dollar for my
picture. I got a letter from
Joe Coats yesterday and one from
John Coats a few days ago.

Well I seen in the paper to day
that they wanted 6 months men
now in Ind if I was there
I would go in, that aint so long
but 3 years is a good while shade.
Well all is quiet here now
I saw in the Winchester paper
about the fight here but it
read so big it was only a skirmish.

I wrote to Gathers the
other day to send me some butter
& such things for I know they
have plenty & I might as well

have some of it as not for
it aint much a soldier gets
to pay him for leaving home
& friends then to think how
the people (I mean the Butternuts)
are doing in the north.

But we will get home some
time & we can attend to them
Well Solly I had a boit of cherries
the other day I was on picket close
to a big orchard there was lots
of cherry trees but the soldiers has
broke them to pieces there will
be lots of peaches & apples & if
we stay here they will go too
we get green apples & stew &
just sugar in & make a good
mess we dont get no fruit only
as we buy or steal it & we wear
something sour for the stomach.
There is lots of mulberries here
but they give a fellow the tarts
Black berries will soon be ripe &
there is lots of them here -

you get me some news
I expect you will be
pleased on account of not getting
any from us but don't
worry I am in comfort & able & I
cannot say a word if I had a wrote
so you need not be uneasy if you
don't get a letter for awhile for
one time we are to meet at
the main road about noon to the 40th
Prisoners there that were 25 or 30
left tonight & there was a few more
3 or 4 just now our train got
there & took us from the 40th to
some place we had got from our men
just in to the prison compound
about 100 Alabama troops. Major
Gresham says we shall not call our
bells or socks out no more for they shall
be forwarded to you as fast as they
can get to you.

The whitest country you are in, some of
the best all of the cedar are so that
will you fairly get through
and letters for us that we cannot wait
till all the day so I will
I will stop & write more

by the shore little
in salt water

Comp 8 miles south
of Mulberriesboro down
say the 39 to 133.

Dear wife I sent myself
in order to drop a few lines to let
you know how things are
going along so far myself
I am well & hearty hoping
these few lines of my love you
well. Will go home this evening
again to take up left home
last Tuesday the 23rd by 30th to
some place we did not
know where we went through
the roads was bad and about
midnight it began to rain & tell
now it is mostly all marshes
out in a boat about mid night
there lay in the woods & it
joined like Boston we could
hear the common roading of
Middleton for our forces were
fighting the rebels till the whip

St. Joe & burned the town well
we camped at St. Joe today
before yesterday we got orders
to go to a gap towards Shellyville
7 miles from here so Col had
our pack horses loaded to
Maffresboro & we 3 days later
& expected to have a fight before
we got back as we started &
went to the gap we could see
signs of a fight all along the
road our cavalry drove them
fight along we stopped at the gap
& got orders to get supper & sleep
at night march so we packed
a few bags & went in for it
but we got to stop at night
and it raining our cavalry failed
in 1880 Mission & 26 examined
but we had to take them all
it's a bad time to get together
well we got all in to camp back
here so our last was to guard

the prisoners but the rebel officers
were in the ambulances &
one company guarded them
& the rest of us strung out
along the road on each side
they were rusty looking fellows
some had pretty bad cuts
on their heads done by our
Cavalry we heard Old Rosey
had captured about 5000
but I don't think it is so
Well we are camped in a house
that is I do my washing in
a porch & have a good place
we dropped some horses in
I guess we will go to
Maffresboro to-morrow
but I don't like it we have
not had any meat for
about a week. Old Rosey has
closed the mail stages a few
days while the fight was on
hounds but the Col said we
