"Fauquier County, Virginia, April 23rd, 1803.

"Dear Brother:-

I received your favour dated 15th of January; a few days past which believe me I was happy to hear from you and family for you was scarce ever out of my mind the cold and the difficulties I expected you would have to encounter. You got home which I thank God you found all reasonable -- (discolored) praised be his mercies; my family is in rather better health than have been this winter; Now brother another melancholy circumstance to inform you the death of our respected brother Spicer who departed on the 27th of March; perhaps you would have felt yourself happy in one instance if you could have spent a few days with him before his departure; James I hope his mind was renewed I had a meeting here which pleased him much and singing and prayer was his delight to the day of his death would cause tears to have trickled down your cheeks; to see his patience under the severe affliction in one sense; in the next to hear his loving conversation and good advice likewise praying to go but willing to wait the Almighty's time; as to his affects he had made a will of all his property except his land which he could not do as he knew, and your portion of moveables is his part of Tess and Bristo and ten pounds cash; he has left all Betsy's, Succa, and Mollys children a certain sum of cash; some more and some less besides the portion of land that will fall to them; and has left me executor; now as quick as you possibly can write and give instructions what you would wish done; but I shall look for you in again this fall so you must make out some trade to bring in with you for a convenience.

I wish you to answer my letter by powel that is whether to sell Bristo on credit or not if you will take him yourself in the way of the land it has been an expense the land by sueing for it and petition the Assembly and paying the taxes is the reason that Richard Payne and self's old as we did; when I left home my family was Reasonable well and I trust this may find you and yours all well in our neighborhood crops are sorry, but on both sides of the Mountain very promising except where the hail and wind has damaged and that very bad in many places. I should be glad to hear how crops is in your country and how friends in general are and what news for for you have give out of giveing me any sutch information now I hope your not afraid of my coming to that country pray write by post quickly; my best respects to you all from your affectionate Brother

Dear Brother / I Recd your Favour of the 7th of sept by
Mr E Bradford which I was glad to receive and hoping
you never will omit an opportunity of writing to me for believe
me it is a great satisfaction to me to correspond with you
by letter if we can not personally; Times are very difficult
here with us by this honourable war produce low salt 15/
shillings & bushel ^{Brown} sugar 2/- per pound and every thing else
in proportion and crops ^{of corn} but soon; the British running
up the Potomac & Rappahanock a plundering of us they got two
of John Payne's negroes & ten from Mrs Rose and a quantity
of bacon from John Lane Quarter at Mattice Creek besides
number of others they have plundered Payne got per-
mission to follow them with a flag down the River and
go aboard and demand his negroes but when got their
the negroes was sent on to bermuda except one of John Day
which was wounded by the Wst ^{land} Militia and was dead, this
happened by his undertaking to pilot them up Mattice Creek to
take out a vessel after he went to them as they all did, but the
militia attacked them in their barges killed one officer and
wounded others they were glad to retreat and all fall to
one side of their barge and throw up the other for breast work
when the musket balls rattled like hail against the barge
side we have had a smart engagement at hamton and killed
nearly two hundred of the British when our loss did not exceed
twenty still we were beaten of the ground by being so inferior
in force; believe me the scene of life is much changed here
by this honourable war with the French ^{had} president and
his war hoop party office hunters; O what a change
what it is to want a Washington to preside over
us; instead of a man that knows nothing of true policy in
war or is fighting for Bonaparte and such a man is not
worthy of the confidence of no citizen of a merica

Dear Brother

I recvd your Favour of the 7th of Sept. by Mr. E.Bradford which I was glad to receive and hopeing you never will omit the opportunity of writeing to me for believe me it is a great satisfaction to me to correspond with you by letter if we can not personally; Times are very difficult hear with us by this honourable war prduce low salt 15/ shillings p bushel brown sugar 2/ p pound and every thing else in proportion and crops of corn but sorry; the British aruning up the Potomac and Rapahanack aplundering of us - they got two of John Paynes negroes and ten from Mrs. Rose and a quantity of bacon from John Panes Quarter at Mattox Creek besides a number of others they have plundered. Payne got permission to follow them with a flag Down the River and go abord and Demand his negroes but when he got there the negroes was sent on to Bermuda except one of Johan Paynes which was wounded by the wstand Militia and was dead; this hapened by his undertakeing to pilot them up Mattox creek to take out a vesel after he went to them as they all did; but the militia attacked them in their barges killd one officer and wounded others, they were glad to retreat and all fall to one side of their barge and throw up the other for breastwork when the musket balls rattled like hail against the barge side; we have had a smart engagement at Hampton and killd nearly two hundred of the British when our loss did not exceed twenty still we were beaten of the ground by being so inferior in force; Believe me the scenetof life is much changed here by this honourable war with the Frenchaid president; and his warhoop party office hunters; O what a change - what it is to want a WASHINGTON to preside over us; instead o' a man that knows nothing of true policy in war or is afighting for Bonaparte and such a man is not worthy of the confidence of no citizen of America.

Now James I want you to be candid and answer me as quick as possible and give me a true statement of the case of what I request; that is I wish to know what Uncle Tarply Willson is a doing and whether there was any disgraceful charges against him, in fact inhuman; if so give me a true detail as it concerns me for family's sake. I was glad to hear from Uncle Joseph and his familys health.

This leaves self & family reasonable well and friends generally tho my wife has been very low lately by the loss of 6 months child but on the mend; and I trust this will find you and family enjoying a reasonable portion of health; so conclude wife and children joining me in sincere respects to you, wife and children.


