AN ORDINANCE to prevent hogs from running at large.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Columbus, that no animal of the hog kind shall be kept in any yard, enclosure, street, park, square, common or public place within the City of Columbus, unless the owner, agent or any person who has the custody or charge of any such animal, and who shall suffer or permit the same to run at large as aforesaid, contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, shall, in conviction thereof before the Mayor, be fined in any sum not exceeding ten, nor less than two, dollars, for each and every offence.

Sec. 2. That any such animal found running at large within the City of Columbus, shall be impounded in the pound kept by the City of Columbus, and the fee for keeping any such animal so confined shall be delivered to the owner or his agent. Nothing for the same, upon the payment by him to the keeper of the pound of the sum of two dollars for every such animal, together with the expense of taking care of and subsisting the same for the length of time any such animal or animals may have been impounded, to be estimated at a reasonable and fair rate, which estimate shall not exceed ten cents per day.

Sec. 3. That any such animal or animals not released as provided for in this ordinance, within three days from the impounding thereof, shall be sold at public vendue at the pound gate by the pound keeper, after giving twenty-four hours' notice of the time and place of such sale, by written advertisement posted up at the pound gate; but no pound keeper shall be directly or indirectly interested as a purchaser at such sale on penalty of ten dollars and the forfeiture of his office: provided, the owner of any such animal or animals may, by giving notice to the pound keeper, redeem the same by paying to him the sum of ten dollars, and the expense of keeping and subsistence of the same as herein provided.

Sec. 4. The pound keeper shall receive for all his services under this ordinance in addition to his necessary expenses in executing the same, the sum of fifty cents for every animal by him impounded, except in the case provided for in the fifth section hereof, to be paid out of the fund appropriated for the execution of this ordinance, and the remainder of said fund shall be paid over by the pound keeper into his hands within three days after the City Council shall have passed an ordinance to that effect, but the owner of any impounded animal may, at any time within said thirty days, on proving his right of property to the satisfaction of the Mayor, receive the remainder of said fund or the order of the Mayor after deducting therefrom all the costs of the proceedings to prove said right of property lawful for any person finding any animal or animals of the hog kind running at large within the limits of the city, to drive the same to the pound, and it shall be the duty of the pound keeper to receive the same, and to pay to the person delivering the same any sum not exceeding twenty-five cents for each and every such animal so delivered, and the sum so paid for each animal shall be deducted out of the fifty cents heretofore allowed to the pound keeper for impounding said animal, and to that amount reduce his allowance therefor.

Sec. 5. Any person who shall wilfully obstruct, hinder or delay any person or persons engaged in driving to the city pound any animal or animals of the hog kind, or who shall break open or in any manner directly or indirectly aid or assist in breaking open the city pound, or unlawfully remove or release or aid or assist directly or indirectly in removing or releasing any such animal from the pound, shall, on conviction thereof before the Mayor, be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars, or be imprisoned for a term not more than ten days, or both, at the discretion of the Mayor.

Sec. 6. Any person who shall wilfully obstruct, hinder or delay any person or persons engaged in driving to the city pound any animal or animals of the hog kind, or who shall break open or in any manner directly or indirectly aid or assist in breaking open the city pound, or unlawfully remove or release or aid or assist directly or indirectly in removing or releasing any such animal from the pound, shall, on conviction thereof before the Mayor, be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars, or be imprisoned for a term not more than ten days, or both, at the discretion of the Mayor.

Sec. 7. The city shall not in any case be liable to the pound keeper for or on account of any fees or expenses due to him on account of any animal which may be impounded, and whenever any such animal shall be sold and shall not bring enough to pay the penalty, fees and expenses, the deficiency may be recovered of the owner of any such animal by suit before the Mayor or any other competent authority. The Mayor or any other competent authority may, in his discretion, cause the balance of the pound keeper's account so recovered shall be retained by him, his own account so recovered therefor, and he shall be liable to render the authority of the City Council, at the expense of the city, a pound, to be under the charge of the Clerk of the Market, who shall be the pound keeper, and whose special duty it shall be to see that this ordinance is enforced, and he may appoint and substitute persons who shall be deemed in said ordinance to be the pound keeper, and who shall be deemed to be the pound keeper, and his compensation as well as the expense of procuring food and subsistence for said animal or animals shall be computed in and constitute a part of the expense of subsistence for said animals so confined, and shall be paid either by the owner of said animal or animals, or by the same as out of the proceeds of the sale of said animals, or collected by suit from the owner of the
