Sir,

I return herewith the communication from Mr. McCreque of Louisville, which you referred to me on the 17th inst. wherein he requests a patent may issue to him for one of the allumens (No. 97) of land oil apart by being for the ~~combustible~~ application of French emigrants. The want of which has already been very prejudicial to his interests. Mr. McCreque further states that he acquired this property by regular deeds of conveyance from Charles Studier, Attorney, which he can produce "as also a deposition from Mr. Sturman to prove "that the conditions of the contract with the Government" for the cultivation of the land he has been duly & satisfactorily "complied with on said land."

I have the honor to state that the allumens referred to by Mr. McCreque as his evidence of title have now been transmitted to or made known to this office his present letter being the first intimation of the existence of such a claim to that tract.

This allumens was entered and paid for, as he states, by the Wilson stockland to whom the Register issued his certificate.

The issuing of a patent in her name has hitherto been

suspended for the want of proof that she was in the actual occupancy and cultivation of the land on the 31st of October 1832 as required by the provisions of the act of 19th Feb: 1833 - such proof having become apertial from the circumstance that the original stipulations entered into with the Treasury Department by the emigrants were not complied with by the claimant in this case, as shown by the Report made on those lands by the agent, Mr. Adams, who was appointed to examine them.

If Mr. Fiquet will have transmitted to this Office the evidences of title he says he can produce with proof either, of occupancy and cultivation on the 31st of October 1832 or that the original stipulations for planting the vine and olive were complied with - a patent will then be forwarded to him without delay. —

Dear Sir

About the 10th of February at the request of Mr John May I wrote you relative to your two hundred & forty acres of land lying in the County of Green Township ~~Range 4~~ Range 4 Section 34 this I believe is the right Township Range & Section. I am writing from recollection but you know the numbers.

In my last I stated to you Mr May's proposition (viz) to give you a draft on Philadelphia or New York for \$800 & pay you the remaining \$400 in January next if it suited you, he agreed to give you the \$1200 that you wrote me you would take but you did not state the time of payment, and he still will give it if he can get the title, the money is ready & has been & will be paid to your agent as soon as he gets the title.

Since I last wrote you he May has purchased a good deal of land.

On the reception of this he wants you to write your determination for if he does not get the land he wants to use the money that he kept to pay you.

In the course of three or four months I am going
to leave the State, therefore if you write me
the sooner the better, It will afford me pleasure
to assist you in any way that I can, and I
before stated to you that I am not interested
in the affair neither directly or indirectly
no farther than sending you & Mr May
& I here reiterate to you that I am not
you may rely upon it that I am not.
The land does not join any person but May
and a man by the name of Walker & neither
of them wants the whole of it if they could
get a small portion without taking the whole
and Walker will not buy all of it because
it would not suit him to do so.

May would have written you himself but
he says that he is not acquainted with
you. He resides about ten miles from
me he has the ability to pay & can and
will do so if he purchases without any
trouble or difficulty whatever &
Mrs May wishes to be remembered to your
daughter whom she says she was acquainted
with in early life & also Mrs Herstein
