The sick are well taken care of, everywhere is most wonderful order, plenty of medicants, underwear and an immense depot of provisions. Excellent food - Next to the hospital is established a free dispensary for sick people, where daily come hundreds of people, get medical treatment, the sick are also furnished free with medicine.

I assure you again that after you leave the country the relations between you and us will remain the most friendly, I gave orders about an uninterrupted use of American and Czech telegrams.
