DEATH SUMMONS MISS SASSEEN

Former Resident's Body to
Be Sent Here From
Charlotte, N. C.

Word was received here late yesterday afternoon of the death of Miss Ruth Sasseen, a former resident of the city, at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday, in Charlotte, N. C. Miss Sasseen's death followed by only a few weeks the decease of her father, Phelps Sasseen.

Although Miss Sasseen lived here for only a few years, her father was reared in the county, and there are a number of relatives of the family residing in and near Henderson. The only immediate survivors are her mother, Mrs. Phelps Sasseen, and a sister, Miss Grace Sasseen.

The body will be shipped here for burial, arriving in Henderson Thursday morning. Funeral services will be held at St. Paul's Episcopal church at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon, the Rev. William Bannan officiating.

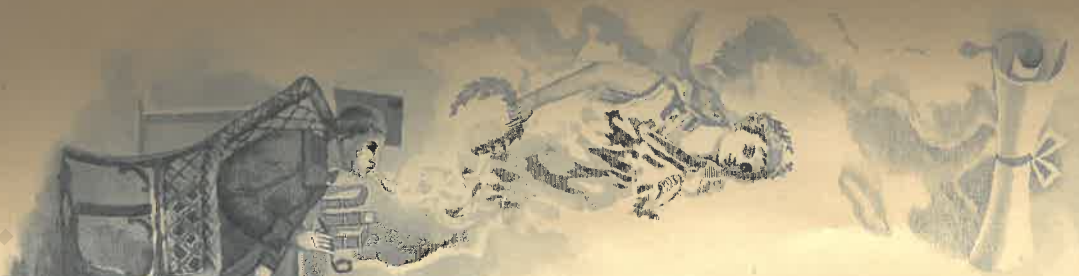

Genealogy of Walter Alves Towles of Henderson Ky

The first Towles of whom I have been able to get any knowledge was Henry Towles of Accomac Co. Virginia (who is supposed to have been the emigrant, He married Ann Stokely, (but whether in America or England is not known) but supposed they came from Lancashire England).

His issue was Henry, who married Hannah Thorott, in Accomac Co. He was born 1698

Henry² Towles and Hannah Thorott came to Lancaster Co. Va. about 1711, and settled on a point of land at the junction of the Rappahannock and Corotoman rivers, where the town of Millenbeck now stands.

It is still known as Towles Point, and is yet owned and occupied by the descendants of the first owner.

(H. J. Rich who married Mary King Towles, daughter of James Towles & Josephine Isabella Whittington. this was Oct. 1802)

Henry Towles settled "Towles Point" Lancaster Co. Va 1711. He and his wife Hannah Throott came from Accomac Co. Va.

Stokely Towles lived "Towles Point" from his Parents and lived and died there.

Col Thomas Towles settled at Millbrook Spottsylvania Co. Va and was a prominent man there.

Judge Thomas Towles came to Henderson Ky in spring of 1806, was twice married first to Ann Taylor Hopkins, in 1807, 2nd to Elizabeth Alvis.

Major Kinsey is full of reminiscences pertaining to the lower end of the State. Speaking of lawyers, he said: "I think **SEE** on Towles was the finest lawyer Kentucky ever produced, though he was not more than 37 years old when he died, which was in 1850. He was from Henderson, his father being a Judge of the Circuit Court. Tom Towles had the best memory I ever knew. He forgot nothing. He was an inveterate reader and student and his mind was simply an immense reservoir without a leak. He knew what the law was and knew the case, the page and the volume where it would be found. It can almost be said of him that he never lost a suit. It amounted to a perversion of justice to have him close the argument when he was on the wrong side. He was one of the wittiest, most eloquent men I ever heard talk, and had he lived to middle age he would have been famous. Like a great many similar men he had no idea of the value of money and was too fond of drink. At his death it was thought that he was worth nothing. A careful administrator was appointed and examined the records on the circuit where Towles practiced law, and the result was the dead lawyer's estate amounted to over \$100,000.

"TOWLES' father had been married twice, Tom being the only child by the first wife. There were two or three children by the second wife. When the father was on his deathbed he made his will, leaving nearly all of his estate to Tom. The latter heard of it and went to his father and protested against any such partiality, and declared that he would not touch a cent of the property if the division was not equally made, and the will was changed."

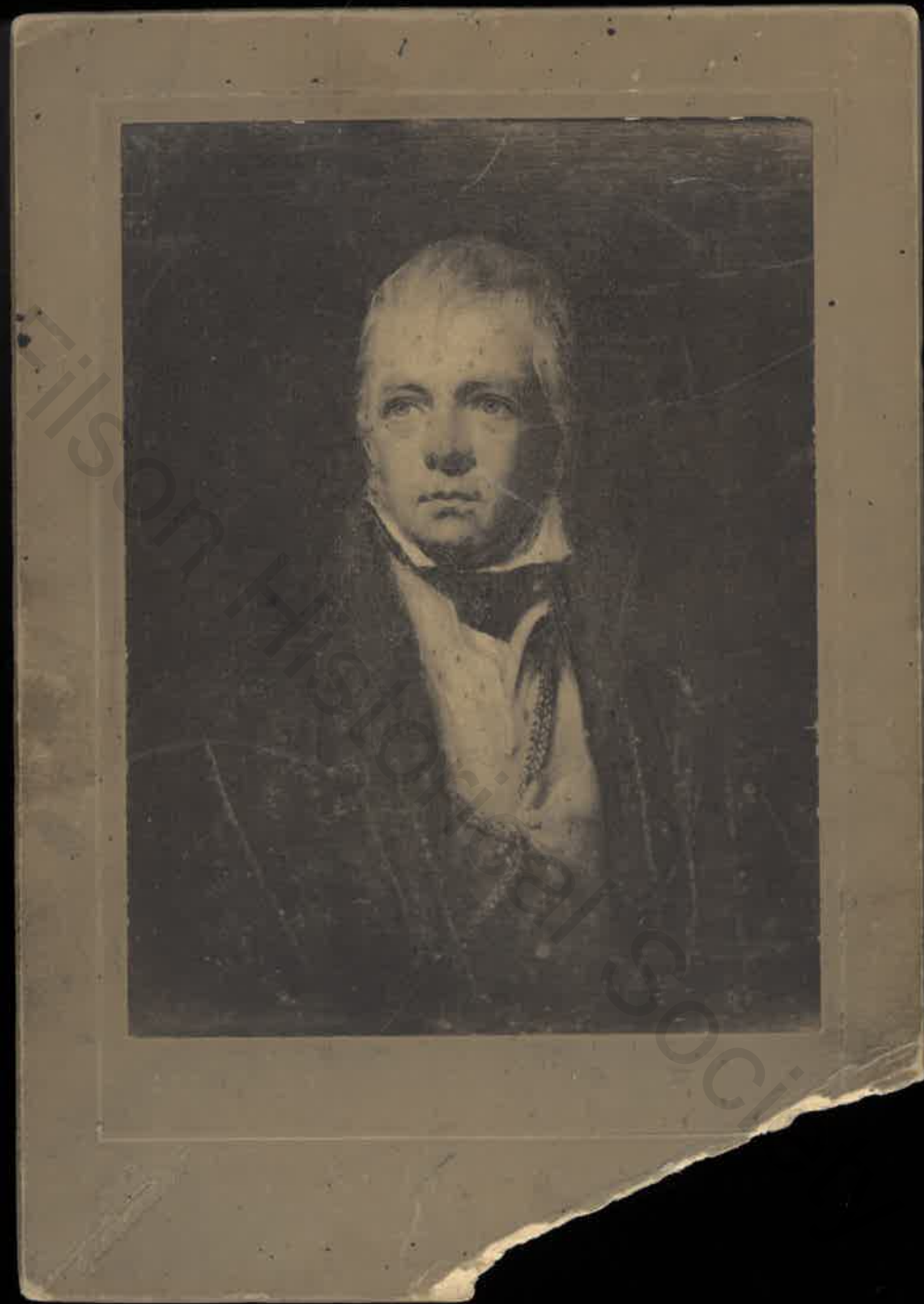

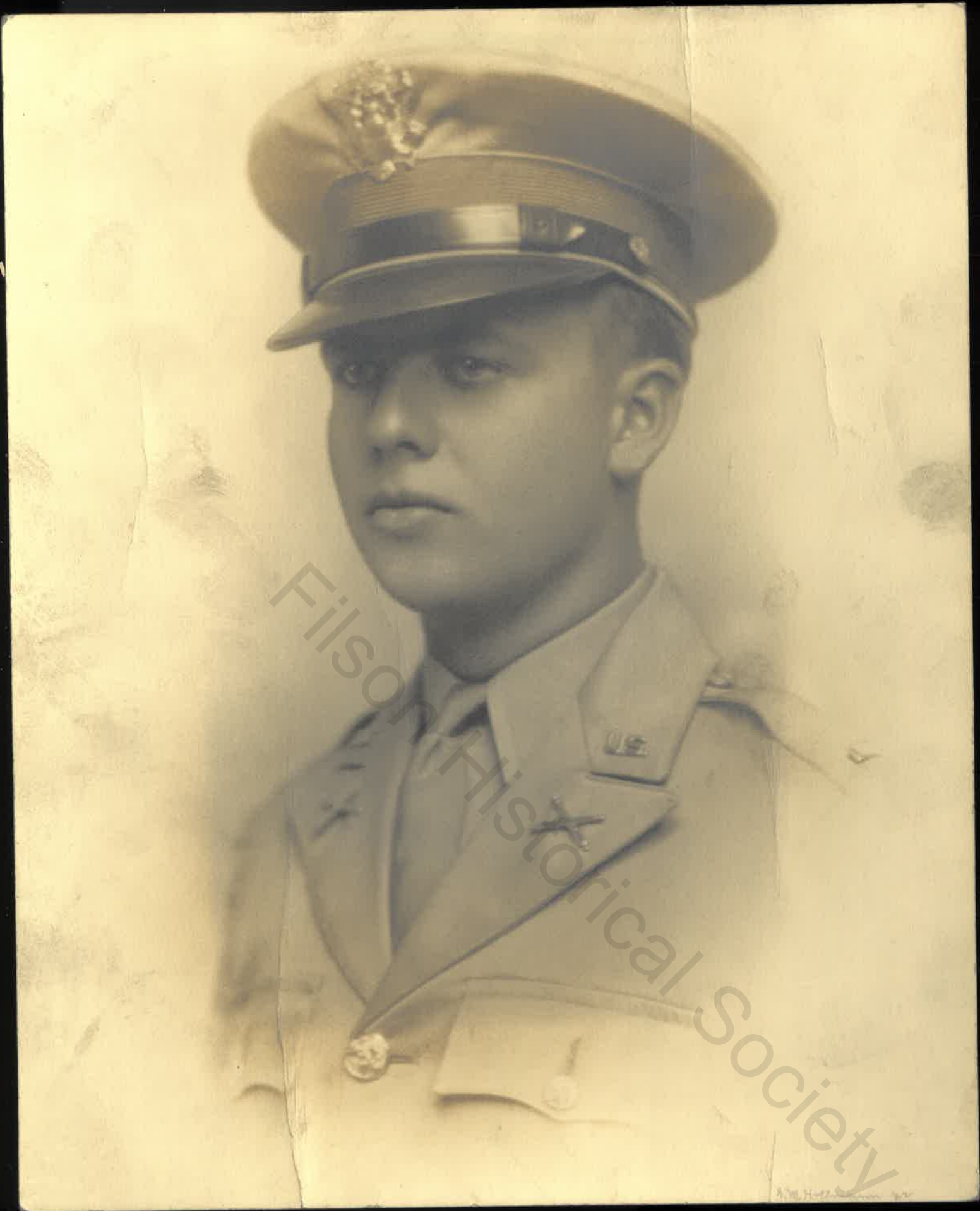

 corruption. A new era is now opening
 upon us, an era which promises much

 now stand upon their own merits, and
 nefarious projects can no longer be sup-
 ported by a name.

"When a retrospect has been taken of
 the Washington administration for eight
 years, it is a subject of the greatest
 astonishment that a single individual
 should have cankered the principles of
 republicanism in an enlightened people
 just emerged from the gulf of despotism,
 and should have carried his designs

History of the Branches OF THE First Colored Baptist Church OF HENDERSON AND VICINITY By REV. B. F. JOHNSON, Founder.

In the year 1866 the Colored Baptist Church was organized.
 In the year 1878 Rev. Nois drew out from the First Baptist
 Church. B. F. Johnson and Rev. Grant then took charge, B. F. Johnson held it until Rev. Chessware took charge, B. F. Johnson held it until the Rev. Canady took charge of it, when Rev. Canady dismissed himself from the church, B. F. Johnson then took charge and held it until Rev. White took charge; Rev. White served a year and six months when he resigned from the church; Rev. B. F. Johnson then took charge of it again and turned it over to Rev. Mitchell.

Rev. B. F. Johnson founded this bill assisted by the following brothers, James Delane, Richard Trent, Martin Delane and George Towles.

When there were no services being held in the country I saw that there was no probability of my mother and other elder people hearing any preaching except calling to mind some one who had died some twelve months or more before.

I was living where the Catholic cemetery is now and had taken Christ for my Savior. To Mrs. F. Alves who had raised me from a child and owned me as a slave we owe the privilege of having meetings on her farm six miles from the city, when asked for the privilege her answer was, yes, to be sure, build you a school house on my farm at the bluff. We first assembled in a grove under an oak tree, I called the neighbors together and told them what a privilege I had they readily agreed with me and we went to work.

There was no missionary church at Corydon, St. John, Walnut Bottom, Walnut Hill, Mt. Zion on the Madisonville road, New Hope, on the Noblace road at Lick Creek on the Owensboro road nor on the Spottsville road at Greenridge nor at Race Creek. All the officers of these different branches had to meet once a month at the city church.

You must take into consideration the most arduous task that fell to my lot in carrying religion into those designated places, and I felt that I could not do enough for the Lord, being called upon to preach the gospel and harmonize it the best I could.

At that time my family was in very poor health my wife's sickness covering a period of ten years she often told me she was going to live with Jesus, and that it worried her greatly, that she hindered me in my preaching, but I continued to preach the gospel of God regardless of man or the devil. My wife told me to take care of our children and educate and keep them out of the hands of the white people. I promised her I would and have tried to keep my word. We had three children, all girls, the youngest one was crawling when her mother died, if she misses heaven it will be her own fault for I have tried to lead her in the right path. I lost all I had at two different times by fire but I continued preaching and have been greatly blessed by the Lord.

The following is the list of deacons Henry Smith, Thomas Guines, John Maccay, Peter Harris, Jordon Dallam, Randol Bibbs, and A. Carr, Senior, Charlie Livas, church clerk, Washington Stanley, pastor. This was satisfactory to all the deacons and they highly recommended Brother Burl Johnson as a minister.

When the colored people were allowed to vote, Rev. Gable Grant, Rev. Joseph Bells and Pro. Haird requested of me to get them a place in the country, the opening speech was made at the Bluff to let the colored people know they were granted full citizenship with the right to vote without fear.

William Eskridge Towles, born in Staunton Va. March 15-
1837. He was prepared in the best Classical Schools
of Virginia, and at the University of Va. 1854-1860
graduated A. B. 1857, A. M. 1858, B. L. 1860, returned
home and entered a law office, when the Civil war
broke out, he joined the 1st City Rifles, Col. Wm
of Louisiana Regiment, was ordered to Richmond
arrived too late to take part in the first battle of
Manassas. He was transferred to the 2nd Mississippi
Regiment.

After seeing some service, he was for a time, at his
own request appointed acting Volunteer Aid to
Gen. J. E. B. Stuart May 1862, where he greatly distin-
guished himself, and was highly Commended for his
courage and gallantry by his Commander

at Williamsburg May 5-1862 he volunteered and
successfully accomplished a most daring capture
which was acknowledged by Gen Stuart in his official
report Vol X, Part 1 page 590 as follows

"Williamsburg, May 5-1862,"
reconnoiter the ground "at day light I rode down to
reconnoiter the ground, and beyond it, from which the
enemy had been repulsed the evening before.

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I directed a company (Capt Hobson) of the 5th Virginia Cavalry near by, to proceed cautiously down the Telegraph road, and reconnoiter the position, and movements of the enemy - I had not proceeded far, before meeting with one of the enemy, who surrendered on the spot, and I returned to question him, I had scarcely emerged from the woods, when a brisk fire was opened by the enemy's skirmishers along the woods to my left.

Appreciating at once the danger of the company which I had just started down the Telegraph road, diverging from the other at this point, I asked who would volunteer to run the gauntlet to bring back Capt. Hobbs company?

Capt. W. E. Towles my volunteer aid promptly accepted the service and performed it with credit and success.

As he returned with the company, he found the enemy's infantry in his road, but nothing daunted he pierced the midst of the mass, one and bore it off in triumph with an entire regiment of the enemy's infantry close to his left.

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In returning home on a furlough, he was drowned in the Chickasaw Bay river in a rail road wreck Feb. 9, 1863. His body was recovered by his faithful servant, William Williams, carried home, and buried at Weyanoke Plantation.

John Turnhall Towles Jr. Born in Staunton Va. Dec 26 1808 was also educated in the first Classical School of Va. Went to the University of Va. 1834 and in two sessions graduated in Greek, Latin, Modern Languages, and Chemistry.

Returned home to Louisiana, and began the study of medicine when the tide of war was poured, he immediately joined the Jeff Davis Guards, Capt. W. S. Brandon 21st Mississippi Infantry, was ordered to report for duty at Richmond May 24 1861, On the 19th of July 1861 the regiment was ordered to march, but arrived too late to take part in the battle of the 21st.

A few days after reaching Manassas, typhoid or enteric fever broke out, and he was among the first to take it. His attack was apparently light, and he was thought to be convalescent, when a stoppage furlough was obtained to visit his friends in Charlottesville, and recruit his strength. Soon after his arrival at his uncle's R. F. W. D. where he relapsed, and after a painful and protracted illness, died Sept 5-1861. His remains were taken by his brother to Louisiana and interred at Weyanoke plantation.
