The additions include two new building wings, containing a library, kitchen, and servant dining room. Though no date is shown, these likely date from 1911 when Mr. Wm. Marshall Bullitt began work to expand the existing residence. Preceding these drawings is an “as-built” plan of the first floor of the existing residence, created as a basis for Gray’s design proposal. It likely dates from 1906 when Gray began work on the home for Mr. Bullitt. Building listed on National Register of Historic Places, 1976.

Of Lousiville). Building listed on National Register of Historic Places, 1983.

The design featured a central "Court of Honor" bound by decorative railings and floral arrangements around which exhibit areas were arranged.

No date is shown on the vehicular bridge design. Residence is listed on National Register of Historic Places, 1983.

Of note are two property surveys from 1911 which show the property boundaries, proposed subdivisions of the property, and apparent changes in ownership with adjacent property owners. Adjacent property owners include W.R. Belknap, W.F. Woodruff and Alfred Brandeis.

Stadium designed by the French architecture firm Buisson and Giffard. All text written in French. Also included is a site plan of the adjacent French railroad depot, as well as a multi-colored diagram. This diagram appears to be traffic impact study for the stadium and its surroundings. A French military camp is shown, as well as a nearby chateau and fort, presumably Chateau de Vincennes.
