

# THE CARRICO FAMILY

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## FOREWORD

The progenitors of the Carrico family in America, according to tradition and such small amount of documentary references as has been found, were Peter of Carrico Hope in Bryantown Hundred, Charles County, Maryland, and Abel of Charles County and also of Fairfax County, Virginia. A tradition, stoutly asserted by some Carrico descendants, is that an earlier Peter Carrico, father of Peter and Abel, came to the Colonies under the auspices of the second Lord Baltimore.

Without doubt Peter and Abel were brothers, as their marriages in Maryland were within a few years of each other. Although there has been no written record found, tradition has it that the two brothers had a sister, Jane, who married John Moore, a brother of the English poet Thomas Moore. From whence the Carricos emigrated to the Colonies is shrouded in the mists of the years. Every branch of the family has its tradition as to the original homeland of the family.

France, Italy, Spain, England and Scotland have their proponents. Those who favor Scotland base their claim upon a somewhat tortuous evolution of the name from "McFearchar." It is feared that those who claim Spain are guilty of an assumption based upon the Latin sound of the name. Those who assert that France was the home of the family maintain that many of "The Old Folks" spoke French fluently. This group claims that the name was originally "Carriceau" or "Carricoits" and that a Nun named Carricoits attained sainthood in France.

Those who claim Italy as the old world home of the family have two unrelated incidents to reenforce their tradition. The first was a letter received by the author of this article in 1930 from Leander C. Carrico of Fort Smith, Arkansas, who stated, "Our family has always claimed that the family came from Northern Italy where there was a village named 'Carrico.'" The other incident occurred in the later years of World War II when a man who described himself as a former Italian prisoner-of-war, but whose status then was that of a co-belligerent, telephoned Miss Stella Carrico in Louisville, Kentucky, and in the course of the conversation stated that "My mother's maiden name was Carrico and she lived in a village named 'Carrico' in Northern Italy."

The Carrico name is found in nearly every state in the Union, and all or most of the migration to the Central and Western states was through Kentucky. The name has a number of variations in spelling, the most usual form being C-a-r-r-i-c-o, which is used throughout this article. Other spellings found have been: Carico, Caricoe, Carricoe, Carracho, Calico, Callico and Cerico.

The Carricos were and are adherents of many religious sects—Catholics, Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians, and Mormons have been encountered.

It is regrettable that so many blanks appear in the genealogical data of the Carrico family here presented. It is hoped that the information given will prove to be an incentive to others to furnish the author, Colonel Homer E. Carrico, AUS Ret., 6703 Country Club Circle, Dallas 14, Texas, with additional data which is very much desired and will be greatly appreciated.

#### ABEL AND PETER CARRICO

The names of Abel and Peter Carrico appear in Maryland records early in the seventeen-hundreds. The earliest date found, as yet, is 1707, when Peter Carrico of Charles County, executed a deed conveying some property to Walter Story.<sup>1</sup> In 1730 Peter deeded to Abel a property in Charles County.<sup>2</sup> In 1764 Peter, Sr., executed a deed to Peter, Jr.<sup>3</sup> It is interesting to note, in further confirmation of the tradition that Abel and Peter were brothers, that Abel named one of his sons Peter, and that Peter named a son Abel. Peter, Sr., lived out his life in Bryantown Hundred, Charles County, Maryland, while Abel later removed from Charles County to Fairfax County, Virginia.

#### ABEL AND ELIZABETH (SIMMS) CARRICO

ABEL CARRICO, SR.<sup>4</sup> The date of Abel Carrico's birth is not known. He married Elizabeth, daughter of Marmaduke Simms,<sup>5</sup> about the year 1730 in Charles County, Maryland. Family tradition has it that he was a man of small stature and that he was a Huguenot. In 1785 he was residing in Fairfax County, Virginia, the head of a family of nine "white souls."<sup>6</sup> He died about 1790 while visiting his son, William Carrico, at Galax, Grayson County, Virginia,<sup>7</sup> and is buried there.

The children of Abel and Elizabeth (Simms) Carrico were:

(2-1) Rev. William Carrico, born in Maryland; died in Galax, Grayson County, Virginia. He was a prominent Methodist minister for many years. He, after leaving the old home in Fairfax County, Virginia, first went to North Carolina, where he mar-

ried Jane Taylor. He later removed to Galax where he lived until his death, about 1805.<sup>8</sup>

(2-2) Abel Carrico, Jr., married Ann Kent, daughter of Benoni and Jean Kent, in Fairfax County, Virginia.<sup>9</sup> Several children were born to them.

(2-3) Mary Ann Carrico, born July 4, 1757,<sup>10</sup> married William O'Nan (1754-1825) in 1777, son of James O'Nan of Culpeper County, Virginia. She died about 1830, in Henry County, Kentucky. For a time they lived in Greenbrier County, Virginia, where their first son, Dennis, was born, September 25, 1778. In 1793, becoming impressed with the glowing description of Kentucky, William and Mary Ann (Carrico) O'Nan, together with six children, joined the tide of settlers in emigrating to that "Paradise Land" to take up land eagerly sought by thousands for homesites. Here in Kentucky, in that portion of Jefferson County which later became Henry County, they settled permanently and spent the rest of their lives.

#### PETER AND ANN (GATES) CARRICO

PETER CARRICO, SR. ( -1765), place of birth unknown; died at Bryantown Hundred, Charles County, Maryland. He married first in 1720, in Charles County, Ann Gates (7-23-1690: circa 1737),<sup>12</sup> the daughter of Robert and Dorothy Gates<sup>13</sup> of St. Marys County, Maryland.<sup>14</sup>

Born to this marriage of Peter Carrico, Sr., and Ann (Gates) Carrico were:

(2-1) Peter Carrico, Jr., born about 1722 in Charles County, Maryland. He was living in Benedict Hundred, Charles County,

in 1775-78.<sup>15</sup> He subscribed to the Oath of Loyalty and Support in Charles County in 1778.<sup>16</sup> His name was shown as No. 300 in Peter Wood's Company, Charles County Militia, in 1778.<sup>17</sup> He was residing in Montgomery County, Maryland, in 1790.<sup>18</sup> Born to Peter Carrico, Jr., and wife (unknown) were:

(3-1) Joseph Carrico,<sup>19</sup> born about 1744 in Charles County, Maryland. He died in Preston County, West Virginia, after 1803. He subscribed to the Oath of Loyalty and Support in Charles County, Maryland, in 1778.<sup>20</sup> His wife's name is not known. Their son was:

(4-1) Albert Coleman Carrico, born April 9, 1792, in Montgomery County, Maryland. He died March 2, 1869, at Rowlsburg, West Virginia. He married Sibbeth Holbert who was born in Loudon County, Virginia, May 2, 1797. She died February 24, 1874, in West Virginia. The marriage date was not transmitted, if known. Their children were:

(7-1) Mearle Hardesty, born April 21, 1894, married William Corbly Lemly (1896- ) in Morgantown, West Virginia, June 28, 1922.

(3-2) Alexander Carrico<sup>21</sup> was born about the year 1750 in Charles County, Maryland, and died about 1840 in Indiana.

He married Sedgewick of Virginia. He was a Revolutionary Minute Man and was awarded a farm in Montgomery County, Maryland, for his services. He resided for a time in Daviess County, Kentucky, and later moved to Poplar Bluff, Missouri, and from there moved to Indiana. Eight children were born to this marriage:

#### PETER AND MARGARET (GATES) CARRICO

PETER CARRICO, SR., married second, about 1738, in Charles County, Maryland, Margaret Gates, probably a cousin of his first wife, Ann Gates. Margaret was the daughter of James and Jaynet (Boarman?)<sup>22</sup> Gates,<sup>23</sup> of Charles County, Maryland. Peter left a will<sup>24</sup> signed April 14, 1764, which was probated in Charles County, October 18, 1765. In this will are named his wife, Margaret, and five sons, who according to family history were born to this second marriage.<sup>25</sup>

It was customary in colonial wills to name children in the order of their birth. An approximation of the birth dates of these sons has been arrived at, based on this custom and the birth-date of Thomas Ignatius, the second son, given as 1741 in the census of 1776 of Prince Georges County, Maryland, which gave the ages of both him and his wife, Elizabeth, as 35 years.

The sons of Peter and Margaret (Gates) Carrico, as named in his will, were:

(2-1) John Carrico, born about 1739 in Charles County, Maryland. He subscribed to the Oath of Loyalty and Support, 1778, in Charles County.<sup>26</sup> He inherited one-fourth of the property called "Maidstone" at the death of his mother, under the terms of his father's will. We know that he was married and that he died prior to 1790, because the census of that year of Charles County lists Monica as the widow of John Carrico. It is probable that Monica's maiden name was Bryant, as we find that Theresa (Bryant) Hagan willed some sheep to Monica,<sup>27</sup> and John Carrico was on the bond of Catherine Bryant, widow and executrix of the estate of John Bryant of Charles County, Maryland, March 5, 1758.<sup>28</sup> The only positively identified issue of John and Monica Carrico was:

(3-1) James Carrico (circa 1760- ), who was designated as James "of John" Carrico in records of Charles County when he subscribed to the Oath of Loyalty and Support in 1778.<sup>29</sup>

(2-2) Thomas Ignatius Carrico was born 1741 in Charles County, Maryland, as evidenced by the census of 1776 of Prince Georges County, Maryland, which gave his age as 35 years. It also gave the age of his wife Elizabeth as 35 years. He married Elizabeth Kirby, daughter of Enoch Kirby, about the year 1768 in Montgomery County, Maryland.<sup>30</sup> Both Thomas Ignatius and

his father-in-law, Enoch Kirby, subscribed to the Oath of Loyalty and Support in 1778 in Montgomery County, Maryland.<sup>31</sup> 1790 finds him and his family in Washington County, Maryland,<sup>32</sup> where in 1805 he was road supervisor. It is presumed that he and his family emigrated to Kentucky late in 1805 or early in 1806 as he disposed of property in Washington County, Maryland, in 1805,<sup>33</sup> and removed to Nelson County, Kentucky, where he died sometime between April, 1813, and June, 1813, as evidenced by the facts that he signed a deed in April, 1813,<sup>34</sup> and an administrator's report of the settlement of his estate was made in June, 1813.<sup>35</sup>

The children of Thomas Ignatius and Elizabeth (Kirby) Carrico were:

(3-1) Joseph Carrico, born in Montgomery County, Maryland, about 1772, the eldest son according to family history,<sup>36</sup> and died sometime before February 26, 1821, in Spencer County, Kentucky.<sup>37</sup> He was married to Amelia Butler on November 11, 1804, in Montgomery County, Maryland, by Rev. Du Hammell.<sup>38</sup> The children of Joseph and Amelia (Butler) Carrico were:<sup>39</sup>

(4-1) William Carrico, born 1806; married Nancy Wheatley in Washington County, Kentucky, October 9, 1825.<sup>40</sup> She was born in 1807.<sup>41</sup> The children of William and Nancy (Wheatley) Carrico were:<sup>42</sup>

(5-4) William Carrico, Jr. (1839-1915) married Mary E. Hardesty (1848-1901)<sup>43</sup> in 1865. Their son was:

(6-1) James Madison Carrico, born September 14, 1866, at Chicago, now St. Francis, Kentucky; died March 2, 1946, at South Bend, Indiana, with burial in South Lawn Cemetery.<sup>44</sup> He married January 6, 1895, at Louisville, Jefferson County, Kentucky, Lucy Cecilia Hancock. She was born December 29, 1876, at St. Marys, Kentucky, the daughter of Samuel O. and Appalonia (O'Bryan) Hancock. The Children of James Madison and Lucy Cecilia (Hancock) Carrico were:

(7-1) Mary Esther Carrico, born May 6, 1896, at Lebanon, Marion County, Kentucky. She is connected with the University of Notre Dame, Notre Dame, Indiana, and lives with her widowed mother at South Bend, Indiana.

(3-2) Vincent Carrico, son of Thomas Ignatius and Elizabeth (Kirby) Carrico, was born about the year 1773 in Montgomery County, Maryland.<sup>50</sup> He married Mary Elder, in Nelson County, Kentucky, on January 27, 1807.<sup>51</sup> The marriage cere-

mony was performed by Reverend Father Nerick. Mary (Elder) Carrico died September 23, 1865, in Nelson County, Kentucky. Born to this marriage were:<sup>52</sup>

(4-1) John Carrico, died young and unmarried.

(4-2) Mary Carrico (January 24, 1810- ).

(4-3) Lucinda Carrico ( - ) married first, Bertrand, second Gootee. Gootee was a Judge and a member of the Indiana Legislature. He named the town of Loogootee, Indiana, for his wife, Lucinda.<sup>53</sup>

(Carrico) Luckett (1801-1846).<sup>57</sup> Julet A. Carrico was a descendant of Basil Carrico. See *infra*. He married second, Elizabeth Peak (1828-1906), November 3, 1891.<sup>58</sup>

He married in Washington County, Maryland, in 1803,<sup>64</sup> Harriet Neal, a cousin,<sup>65</sup> the daughter of Theodore and Sarah (Kirby) Neal.<sup>66</sup> The children of Levi and Harriet (Neal) Carrico were:

(5-1) Harriet Frances Newman (1844-1888) married Dr. William Tull ( -1900). She died in Carroll County, Missouri.

He was in the mercantile business in Louisville, Kentucky, 1831-1834, and removed to Vigo County, Indiana, about 1834.

I. James William Carrico (4-4) married first, Elizabeth Littlejohn, May 31, 1831, in Nelson County, Kentucky. Their children were:

(6-1) John William Carrico, born September 16, 1858, at Racine, Wisconsin. He married Mary Frances Bledsoe (1859-1920), August 24, 1888. She was the daughter of Mose and Louisa (Williams) Bledsoe. Their children were:

(2-5) Basil (Bazzil) Carrico, the fifth son of Peter and Margaret (Gates) Carrico, was born about 1747 in Bryantown Hundred, Charles County, Maryland.<sup>147</sup> He was married about 1768, probably in Montgomery County, Maryland, but the most intensive research has failed to disclose the name of his wife. He emigrated to Kentucky between the years 1794 and 1806,<sup>148</sup> as he disposed of property in Washington County, Kentucky, and is shown on tax rolls of Shelby County, Kentucky, between these two dates.

(4-4) Benedict Joseph Carrico, born June 12, 1812, in Nelson County, Kentucky; died January 28, 1872, in Hardin County, Kentucky.<sup>156</sup> He held several county offices in Hardin and Meade counties, including that of sheriff. On October 13, 1840, he married Mrs. Eleanor (Burcham) Wooldridge, widow of Isaac Wooldridge.<sup>157</sup> The children of Benedict Joseph and Eleanor (Burcham) Carrico were:<sup>158</sup>

(4-7) Augustus Carrico (1818- ) never married.

(3-4) Theresa Carrico (1790-1858), daughter of Basil Carrico, was born in Maryland, and died as Sister Theresa of The Sisters of Charity at Nazareth, Kentucky. She was one of the founders of this order in 1812 at Nazareth, under the auspices of Bishop David. In the notes of William Mason Phillips we find the following entry: ". . . when unfolding his plan (for the founding of The Sisters of Charity of Nazareth) to the congregation in Washington County, the Holy Ghost enkindled in the heart of one of his listeners the desire to offer herself for the work. This was Miss Theresa Carrico, a member of a family well known to-day in different parts of the country. The family of Carricos had settled in England from either Spain or Italy sometime before Lord Baltimore set out to colonize Maryland . . ."

(3-5) Augustus Carrico (1792- ) never married.

(3-6) Rebecca Carrico (1793- ) married John O'Nan in Shelby County, Kentucky, August 2, 1813. John O'Nan was a descendant of Mary Ann Carrico, daughter of Abel Carrico of Virginia. (See Abel Carrico's descendants, supra).

(3-7) Thomas Ignatius Carrico (1808- ) married Julianna Wathen, Nelson County, Kentucky, November 9, 1830.

Charged with the triple crime of murder, rape and arson, the three devils were arrested and convicted of the crime.
