Isaac Craig, 1742?-1826 Letter book, 1801-1811

Scope and Content Note

Major Craig, commandant of the garrison at Fort Pitt, was appointed to direct the construction of Fort LaFayette in Pittsburgh, Pa., in 1792. In 1801 he was appointed army paymaster at Fort LaFayette. He also was a co-owner of a glass-manufactory in Pittsburgh, supervised the construction of gun carriages in Pittsburgh and supervised farming activities in lands that he owned in western Pennsylvania. The collection consists of approximately 300 letters written by Craig and hand copied by him or unknown clerks. Most of the letters concern his duties as Paymaster and day-to-day operation of his glassmaking and farming endeavors. Several letters mention the arrival and departure of military and government officials and his repeated attempts to obtain payment for previous employment in the Quartermaster Department and personal debts owed him by various individuals.

Biographical Note

Isaac Craig was born ca. 1742 in Ireland and emigrated to the United States as a young man in 1765. After first settling in Philadelphia, Pa., working as a house carpenter, he later moved to western Pennsylvania. In 1775, he enlisted as a 1st Lt. in the Continental Marines and later served as Captain in the 4th Continental Artillery Regt. He retired from active duty as a major in 1783. In 1785, he married Amelia Neville, daughter of a Revolutionary War veteran, Gen. John Neville. They had 10 children. Craig was appointed a deputy Quartermaster General and military storekeeper in Pittsburgh in 1792, serving under Quartermaster General James O'Hara. That same year he supervised the dismantling of Fort Pitt and the construction of its replacement, Fort LaFayette. Craig and O'Hara founded a glassmaking company, Pittsburgh Glass Works, in 1796, producing window glass and bottles. In 1801, Craig was appointed as paymaster at Fort LaFayette. Craig purchased several acres of land in western Pennsylvania and employed several tenant farmers who worked the properties. Craig was elected and served as Chief Burgess of the Borough of Pittsburgh from 1802–1803. He died in 1826 in Montour's Island and was buried in Pittsburgh.
